HE French who are in Garison at Mantua lately fent a Detachment towards Ponte di Lagos Scuro, to furprise some Artillery which the Imperialists had there; but found the Troops that had been left to guard it so well disposed to receive shem, that they did not think fit to purfue their Defign. The Prince of Hesse-Cassel is gone of Milan; and it is said, Prince Eugene is shortly expected there. The Duke of Savoy has caused Cazal to be invested, and is making Preparations to besiege it in Form; and Prince Eugene is likewise preparing to lay Siege to Valenza; but the very bad Weather we have at present obliges them to defer the Execution of those Designs to a more proper Season.

Cologne, Nov. 27. General Lottum is come to Aix la Chapelle with 5 Battalions of the King of Prussia's. Forces, which are to remain in Garison there this Winter: The rest of his Prussian Majesty's Troops that served in Flanders are arrived upon the Frontiers of this Electorate, being most of them to quarter in the Parts. They have already begun to raise Recuits in our Neighbourhood for the Service of the Confederates. Letters from the Upper Rhine give an Account," That the French Army on that side being reired within their Lines, and their Troops having begun to march into Winter Quarters, the Imperial Forces under the Command of General Thungen borces under the Command of General Intingential repailed the Rhine, the Enemy, tho' much superior in Number, not attempting to give them any Disturbance, and were marching to the Quarters affigued them, which are disposed in such manner, that a lifticient Body of them may be drawn together in a very short time, to prevent any Attempt the Enemy sight make during the Winter.
