Turin, Nov. 6. N. S.

THE Enemy having laid aside their Design to return into Piedmont, which is become impracticable, by reason of the Sea being so far advanced, part of the Troops that were sent into the Valley of Aosta, to guard the Passes on that side, will shortly march from thence to the Milanese, to assist in reducing those few Places in that Dutchy and its Dependencies that remain in the Enemy's Hands. Our Duke has caused Cazal to be invested by a Detachment of his Troops; but the Weather of late has been so rainy, that his Royal Highness is obliged to defer the besieging of it in Form to a better Opportunity. The same Reason detain Prince Eugene with the Army under his Command at Alexandria, who intends, as soon as the Season becomes more favourable, to attack Valenza; and in the mean time has sent a small Body of his Forces to block up that Place. The Trenches and other Works which the Enemy had cast up before this City during the late Siege are quite levelled, and are now repairing the Damage they have done to our Fortifications. They write from Milan, That the Prince of Hesse-Cassell was come thither, and Prince Eugene was shortly expected there.

Paris, Nov. 22. N. S. Our Ministry are daily in Conference, to consult upon the Means of providing Men and Money in order to carry on the War the next Year, in which they meet with very great Difficulties. Several Projects have been laid before them upon this Subject; in one of which it is proposed, that all Persons of Quality and others shall be obliged to leave their Equipage; that all the Men Servants they can spare shall be sent into the Army; and that the Clergy, Nobility and other Persons, who have any Plate, shall be obliged to bring it to the Mint to be coined. The Difforders in Trade, occasioned by the Paper Credit, increasing daily, Monsieur Chamillard had lately a Meeting with several of our most eminent Merchants, to ask their Opinions concerning the Means of retrieving the Credit of the Money-Bills; but he is not yet come to any Resolution in this Matter. A great Council of War is shortly to be held at Versailles, for settling Measures against the next Campaign. Several of our General Officers are already arrived here from their respective Commands, in order to be present at it, and others are daily expected. Here is a Report, that the Island of Minorca is declared for King Charles III. They write from Marseilles, That the Horse and Dragoons of the Duke of Orleans's Army, that are now in Dauphine, are ordered to march from thence into Franche Compte, where they may be subsisted with less Difficulty, and will continue there this Winter.

Aix, Nov. 18. The Regiment of Plettenbourg is likely come into this Place, being to remain here this Winter. Six Battalions are come into Garrison at Menin, and 8 at Courtray. The Garrison of Ostend consists of 4 Battalions; that of Mechlen of 2 Battalions of the Dutch Guards, 2 of the Regiment of Friesland, and 1 of Hagen's, besides 2 Squadrions of the Regiment of Tilly, 2 of that of Ath, and 1 of the Dutch Horse-Guards; that of Dendermonde of 2 Squadrons of the Regiment of Schmettow; that of Dendermonde of 2 Danish Battalions of George's Regiment, 1 of Bloxer's, and 1 of Eysen's: The Battalion of Eys is in Garrison at Souttwe: The Regiment of Walef, consisting of 4 Squadrons, and those of Baldwin and Grovestein, of 2 Squadrons each, are quartered at St. Truyn and Ongeren. And in the whole 93 Battalions and 94 Squadrons of the Forces of the Allies, besides 12 Regiments of Spanish Troops, have taken their Winter Quarters in Brabant and Flanders, which are disposed in such manner, that a considerable Army may be

drawn together in a very short time, whenever there shall be occasion.

Maastricht, Nov. 19. N. S. The Forces that are to remain here in Garrison during this Winter are all arrived. The Earl of Albemarle is likewise come to Liege with all the Troops that are to Winter there; and 11 Battalions and 21 Squadrons of the King of Prussia's Forces passed the Maas lately at Ruremond, in order to march to the Winter Quarters assigned them between that River and the Rhine.

Falmouth, Nov. 25. Yesterday arrived here the Ann of and from Boston, laden with Tar, Turpentine, and Logwood, &c. having been 33 Days in her Passage from New-England: She came out in Company of 22 Sail of Merchant Ships, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the Dover, but had been separated from them in bad Weather.

Dartmouth, Nov. 25. Yesterday came in here the Mary-Fortune of Boston, Captain Hawksworth Commander, from Piscataway in New-England, laden with Sugar, Tobacco, Pitch, Tar, and Hops, for London: She came thence under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the Dover, together with two Mast Ships, and 19 other Merchant-men, homeward bound, but was afterwards separated from them.

Plimouth, Nov. 26. This Day sailed hence to the Eastward Her Majesty's Ship the Swiftsure, and under her Convoy about 30 Sail of homeward bound Merchant-men and Coasters, most for London.

Tarmouth, Nov. 29. On the 25th Instant came into our Road from the Northward a Fleet of laden Colliers and Coasters, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the Dunwich, Strombolo and Nightingale, which sailed hence the next Day to the Southward, except the Dunwich, that sailed the 27th to the Northward, having under her Convoy divers light Colliers and Coasters. This Day several laden Colliers came into our Road from the Northward.
