From Field-Marshal-General Count Rabutin's Camp at Terras in Upper-Hungary, Nov. 8. N. S. The 10th of September we decamped from Zolnock, and marched to St. George; the 11th to Gafparino, where we rested the 12th. One of our Parties fell in with about 50 of the Malecontents, of whom they killed 14, and took 4 Prisoners; who reported, That a Body of their Horse, commanded by Count Berzeni, had lately been in that Neighbourhood, but retired upon our Approach, and were marching to join another Body of Malecontents, at whose Head was Prince Ragorzi. The 13th we marched to Mura. A Party of our Men brought in a good Booty, and two Prisoners, who informed us, that Berzeni with his Troops was on this side Hatuan, and that 4000 Malecontents lay not far from us. The 14th we encamped at Macklar, within a League of Erla: Two thousand of the Malecontents last mentioned marched into that Place, and the rest joined Count Berzeni. They burnt the Village of Macklar, and destroyed the Forage and Provisions in those Parts. The 15th we proceeded to Formas. The 17th we advanced from thence to Kerestes; and Major-General Count Karaffa was sent before with a Detachment to Miscoz, to prevent the Malecontents destroying the Mills and Provisions in those Parts. The 18th we came within a League of Miscoz, where we encamped the next day. Colonel Teckely having been out with a Party of Horse, brought home 3 Standards and some Prisoners he had taken from a strong Party of the Malecontents which he had met, and put to flight, about 60 of them being killed upon the Spot. These Prisoners reported, That Count Berzeni lay encamped near Gongies, and was then about 8 or 10000 strong. The 22d we marched from Miscoz to Sixo; the 23d to Forro, where we had Intelligence, by a Prisoner we had taken, that Count Berzeni followed us, and was within two days March of our Camp. The 24th we came to Karadna; and the 25th to Tornos-Nemeti. One of our Parties met with two of the Enemy's, and routed them both, killing above 400, and brought in a Major and several other Prisoners: We were informed by them, that Count Berzeni, with 10000 Malecontents, continued to follow us; and that Count Caroli, with another Body of them, lay at Cassovia, and had sent out one Szaz, an Officer of Note among them, with a Detachment to observe our March. The 27th we came within half a League of Spina. The next day a Party of our Men defeated one of the Malecontents, and killed 30 of them. The 29th we advanced within half a League of Cassovia, and it was resolved to attack that Place, in hopes the Malecontents would have attempted its Relief, and we might by this means have drawn them to an Engagement. We accordingly took Post the next day on the Hill called the Mount of Justice, and made the necessary Dispositions for a Siege; and the first of October we opened our Trenches: But after having been 11 days before that Place, it being so well fortified, the Garison so strong, and so well provided with all Necessaries for their Defence, our Provisions being almost spent, and no appearance of the Enemy's coming to a Battle, we decamped the 11th, and came within half a League of Spina. One of our Parties killed 20 of the Malecontents, and took 4 Prisoners. The 12th we marched to Goncz, where we rested the two following days, and saw several Villages on fire on that side towards which the Malecontents judged we would direct our March. The 15th we encamped at Ger, and the Baron di Tige was detached in the evening towards Tockai with a Body of Horse, to preserve that Place, by preventing a Detachment of the Malecontents, commanded by one Rete, who burnt and ravaged the Country before us, in order to deprive us of the Provisions we might have found there, and to attack Count Caroli, who lay with 5 Regiments beyond the Podrock. This Design succeeded so well, that we received an Account the next day from the Baron di Tige of his having forded over the River before break of day, and fallen upon the Enemy, who lay about a Mile further, and were entirely routed, leaving behind them their Tents and Baggage, 16

Standards and Colours, and a Pair of Kettle-Drums, besides 500 of their Men slain, and many taken Prisoners, among whom were a Lieutenant-Colonel and a Major, who were sent to our Camp the next day, together with the Colours and Standards. The 18th we marched to Tockai. Three or four days were employed in making Bridges over the Tibifcus, and the 23d we passed that River. The 25th we came to Locke; the 26th to St. Michaels; and the 27th to Dop, from whence Colonel Viard was sent with 1000 Horse towards Czege. The 28th we proceeded to Bulgar. The 30th we decamped from thence, and came to Czege, where we found Colonel Viard, who had taken about 1000 Head of Cattle from the Enemy, that proved a seasonable Supply to our Troops, which began to want Provisions of that kind. The 31st we encamped at Foret; and Major Wagoner was sent from thence with 400 Foot, and all the Corn we could spare, to Zolnock. The 3d we came to this Camp; and yesterday we were re-joined by Major Wagoner, who brought with him from Zolnock 300 German Horse, and as many Rascians; the Foot he carried thither remaining in that Place to strengthen the Garison.

Whitehaven, Dec. 1. On the 30th past, and this day, came in here the Sloop, Michael Williamson, the William and Mary, Joseph Lawrence, the Scallow, Lewis Powe, and the Nightrigale, Joseph Dixon, Masters; all homeward bound from Virginia, but last from Ireland.

Falmouth, Dec. 2. Her Majesty's Ship the Medway Prize, Captain Hughs Commander, arrived here yesterday, and under her Convoy the Richard and Mary, Captain Frankland Commander, from Nevis; the Golden Lion, Captain Gunner, and the Quare Frigate, Captain Cowell, Commanders, both from Antegoa, and bound for London.

Yarmouth, Dec. 6. On the 4th Instant 3 or 4 Dutch Doggers, and several small Vessels belonging to this Place, laden with Malt and Herrings, failed out of our Road for Holland.

Portsmouth, Dec. 5. Yesterday failed from Spithead two Dutch Men of War, with the St. Peter of Bilboa, a Spanish Pink, and about 50 Sail of Merchant-men and Coasters, under their Convoy, for Holland.
