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Magdebourg, Nov. 24. N. S.

THE Princess Royal of Prussia arrived here the 22d Instant from Wolmentedt, having been received with great Respect in the several Towns in the King of Prussia's Dominions through which she passed. Her Royal Highness was met at some distance out of Town by the Nobility and other Persons of Quality of this Country; and as soon as she came in sight of this Place, was saluted with a Discharge of the Cannon of our Citadel. Her Royal Highness made her Entry here, attended by Lieutenant-General Fink and Monsieur Meding, and above 50 of the Nobility on Horseback, in rich Habits, with their Servants, who were very numerous, likewise on Horseback, and in fine Liveries, besides 44 Coaches, whereof 29 were drawn by Six, and the rest by Four Horses each. When she entered our Gates, the Cannon was again discharged, as it was a third time when she alighted at the Royal Palace. Our Burglers, who were in Arms, and lined the Streets thro' which she passed, and the Garion, which was drawn up in the great Place before the Cathedral, likewise gave three Volleys of their small Arms. Her Royal Highness received the Compliments of the States of Magdebourg; the Clergy, and the Magistracy of this Place. Yesterday she saw the Cathedral and other Curiosities of this City; and this Day she continued her Journey to Berlin, the same Honours being paid her at her Departure as had been at her Arrival here.

Berlin, Dec. 4. N. S. The 24th Instant the Princess Royal of Prussia continued her Journey from Magdebourg, and lay the Night at Ziegefer, and the next Day at Brandenburg; in both which Places, and in all the other Towns thro' which she passed, her Royal Highness was received with all possible Demonstrations of Joy and Respect. The 26th she came to Spandau, whither the King of Prussia, the Prince Royal his Son, and the three Margraves his Brothers, were come about an Hour before she arrived, who received her at her alighting out of her Coach, and conducted her to the Palace, where, after a short stay, they took their Leave of her; and returned to Berlin. Her Royal Highness made her Entry into Spandau with the same Magnificence as she had done at Magdebourg, and in other Places, being attended by the Nobility richly dres'd, with their Servants in fine Liveries, and a great Train of Coaches, some with Six, and the rest with Four Horses each, and being saluted at her Entrance by several Discharges of the Cannon of the Citadel. The 27th her Royal Highness set out from Spandau for this Place: She was met about half way by the King, the Prince Royal, and the Margraves; and they made their Entry here in the following manner: First came Field-Marshal-General Count Wartenleben's Regiment of Horse, consisting of three Squadrons; then 20 Led Horses belonging to the Officers of that Regiment; a Harbinger; one of the King's Coaches with Six Horses; 10 Coaches with Four, and 22 with Six Horses each, belonging to the Nobility and Gentry of this Place and the Neighbourhood; 36 Coaches of the Great Officers and other Persons of Quality at Court, 4 or 6 Footmen walking on the sides of each of them; two Coaches of the Great Marshal of the Court Count Wigtenstein, with his Footmen, being 24 in Number, in very rich Liveries, walking on each side; two Coaches of the Field-Marshal Count Wartenleben, two of the Great Chamberlain Count Wartenburg, 12 of the Margraves, two of the Prince Royal, and 13 of the King's Coaches: All these Coaches were drawn by 6 Horses each. Then came Margrave Christian Lewis's Gentleman of the Horse with 6 Led Horses belonging to his Highness, Margrave Albert's with 8, Margrave Philip's with 6, and the Prince Royal's with 12; one of the King's Gentlemen of the Horse, two of his Majesty's Pages; his Led Coach being 30 in Number, with rich Houplings; the Grand Vicar, or Chief Huntsman, with a Gentleman, and 6 other Huntsmen; the Governor of the Pages, followed by the Pages of his Majesty; and the Princess and Princesses of the Royal Family, being 32 in all; the Nobility and Gentry on Horseback; the 4 Troops of Horse-Guards, two Kettle-Drums; and 20 Trumpeters; the Footmen to his Majesty, the Prince Royal, and the Margraves, in Number 64; the Great Marshal, the Marshal of the Court, and Great Cup-bearer; the Chamberlains, the Field-Marshal-General, the Prince Royal, followed by Lieutenant-General Fink, and the Margraves: Next came the King and the Princess Royal, and the Margraves, in his Majesty's State Coach, drawn by 8 Horses, the Great Chamberlain and the Colonel of the Swiss Guards riding before the Coach; before and behind which, on each side of it, were the Swiss Guards on Foot: Her Royal Highness's Coaches followed, in which were the Ladies of her Retinue; and Monsieur Portail's Regiment of the Horse closed the Proceeding. The Burglers in Arms lined the Streets thro' which passed the Cavalcade; a Battalion of the Guards was drawn up before the Castle-Gate, and our Cannon was thrice discharged. The 28th in the Evening the Marriage Ceremonies were solemnized in the Royal Cha-

pel, Divine Service being performed by the Bishop Ursinus. Then the Company repaired to the Great Hall, where a Noble Banquet was provided; after which there was an Entertainment of Muick and Dancing. The next Day the Prince and Princess Royal received the Compliments of the Council of State, the Deputies of the States of the several Provinces, the Nobility and Clergy, and the Magistrates of this City; and the Days following have been chiefly spent in publick Entertainments, and other Diversions.

Falmouth, Dec. 9. Yesterday pass'd by this Place Her Majesty's Ships the Auguit and Nonfuch: The same Day came in the Arundel, and the Salamander Bomb-Ketch from Ireland, bound for Portimouth; and this Day the Victory of our Middlebourg, bound for Genoa.

Plimouth, Dec. 10. Her Majesty's Ship the Litchfield arrived here yesterday from Spithead to careen; and the Dolphin Galley of London from Denia for Hamburg. At the same time sailed hence Her Majesty's Ships the Lancaster and Tryton, and under their Convoy a Fleet of about 30 Merchant Ships, bound for Ireland and Portuagal.

Dartmouth, Dec. 11. The 9th Instant the Phenix, laden with Wheat for Oporto, Capt. Andrew Roach, the Lewis Sloop, with Bale Goods for Jamaica, Capt. Fernando, Commanders, arrived here from London; and the Denia of this Place, laden with Salt from Guernsey, James Guilon Master.

Yarmouth, Dec. 11. Yesterday and this Day the rest of the Hamburg Fleet, with their Convoy, came into our Road.

Cowes, Dec. 11. This Day came into our Road 7 or 8 Dutch Doggers, bound for Ireland; and a Swede for Cadiz.

St. James's, Dec. 10. His Excellency Baron Spanheim, Ambassador Extraordinary from his Majesty the King of Prussia, had this Day a private Audience of Her Majesty, in which he delivered a Letter from the King his Master to Her Majesty, notifying the Marriage between the Prince Royal of Prussia and the Princess of Brunwick, which was consummated the 28th of the last Month, N. S. After which he had Audience in like manner of his Royal Highness upon the same Occasion: Being introduced to both these Audiences by Charles Cottrell Esq; Assistant-Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, Dec. 12. An Express arrived this Evening from Lisbon, with Letters of the 29th past, O. S. giving an Account, That on Sunday Night the 24th the King of Portuagal was seized with an Ague, and continued ill till the 28th in the Morning, when his Majesty died, universally lamented by his Subjects, whose Love he had entirely won, by the Mildness of his Government, his Gracious and Affable Deportment, and his Zeal for the Common Cause; in the promoting of which his Arms have gained such Reputation. He is succeeded by Don Juan Prince of Brazil, his Eldest Son, who is in the 18th Year of his Age.
