Hague, Dec. 28. N. S. The States of Holland and West fissend have resolved to borrow. 3 Millions of Guilders, at an Interest of 4 per Cent. towards defraying the Expences of the next Campaign; and the 24th Instant they adjourned till the rath of next Month. The States General have resolved to augment their National Forces; by adding 8 private Men to every Troop of Horse and Dragoons. This Resolution is sent, in the usual manner, to the several Provinces for their Approbation, which four of them have already given; and the like is expected from the other three.
