Rome, Febr. 5. N. S.

THE 2d Instant was observed here as a Day of Publick Thanksgiving, for this City's being delivered from an Earthquake which happened in these Parts that Day was 4 Years. The Cardinal de la Trimouille having received by an Express from France the News of the Birth of the Duke of Bretagne, had Audience of the Pope the next Day to acquaint him therewith. The Duke di Sora, Prince of Piombino, died the first Instant of a Fit of Apoplexy, in the 65th Year of his Age. They write from Naples, That they had begun to exact, with great Severity, the Tax of Two per Cent. which the Government there have laid upon all real Estates in that Kingdom, which falls very heavy upon the Landed Men in that Country, and adds to their general Dislike of a French Government.

Venice, February 11. The Imperialists have posted some Troops along the Po, to secure a considerable Convoy of Provisions lately bought for their Use in the Mark of Ancona, which is to be brought by Sea to Mezzola, and thence up the Po to the Imperial Quarters. The French have lately seized a great Quantity of Corn belonging to the Duke of Parma and his Subjects, and carried it to Mantua: His Highness has sent a Message to Monsieur Medavi, desiring it might be restored; but could obtain no other Satisfaction, than a Promise that it should be paid for. The French Horse in the Mantuan suffer extremely for want of Hay and Forage, the Imperialists having cut off their Communication with all Places from whence they might be supplied therewith. Our Letters from Modena give an Account, That the Garrison of the Castle of that Place being reduced to the last Extremity, Monsieur de la Barre, the Governor, had sent out a Message, with an Offer to surrender upon honourable Terms; but it was not accepted: And the Duke of Modena's Agent here has just now received Advice by an Express, That his Highness having Notice sent him that the Place was capitulating, left Bologna the 5th Instant, where he has resided some time, and is returned to his Residence at Modena.

Milan, February 12. The Treaty for the Surrender of our Castle being entirely broken off, and our Magistrates having refused to renew the Cessation of Arms with the Garrison there, and to supply them with Provisions, they fired this Day some Cannon-shot against the Town, but have hitherto done little Damage. The Imperialists in the mean time are working with all possible Application upon 4 Batteries, intending, as soon as they can be got ready, to attack the Castle with great Vigour. A French Lieutenant and 28 Men, who were sent out this Morning to view a Post, came over to us, who report, That some sort of Provisions and other Necessaries grow very scarce there; and that in all probability the Place cannot hold out long.

Lemberg, Febr. 2. Several of the Nobility of Poland are come hither, to be at the opening of the Great Council which is summoned to meet here on the 7th Instant. Prince Dolgoniski is also come hither, in order to assist at this Assembly on the Part of the Czar of Muscovy. Prince Menzicoff is continued in the chief Command of the Muscovite Forces in these Parts.

Pisa, Febr. 9. The 6th Instant an Order of King Stanislaus was published here, whereby all Subjects of this Kingdom are forbid, under very severe Penalties, to go to the Council at Lemberg, or to give any Countenance or Assistance to those who, contrary to this Order, shall repair thither.

Cracow, Febr. 9. The Saxon Troops which were quartered here having been joined by those that lay at Tycozin, they are marching together towards Saxony. Upon their evacuating this Place, the Crown General put into it a Garrison of his Troops, which are still here. We hear, that the Great

Council summoned to sit at Lemberg met for the first time the 7th Instant. The Muscovite Troops continue their March towards the Weiffel; and the Cossacks commanded by General Czeremet, who are quartered in Volhinia, have also received Orders to march the same way.

Warsaw, Febr. 11. The 2d Instant 2000 Men of the Muscovite Troops came to Praagh, and our Magistrates were obliged to furnish them with Provisions. The 4th, upon a Report that a Body of Swedes and Polanders was marching this way, the Muscovites retired from Praagh; but being informed that this Report was groundless, they are since returned hither; and General Rheen, their Commander, has taken his Quarter in our Castle, into which he has put a Garrison. The remainder of the Body under his Command, which consists of about 20000 Foot, is expected here in a Day or two.

Vienna, Febr. 12. Prince Gaston of Tuscany and General Kirchbaum are lately arrived here from Italy. Letters from Presbourg give an Account, That the Imperial Forces commanded by General Staremberg, and those under the Command of General Rabutin, are joined; and that, by the last Advices, they lay between Tois and Altenbourg. The Maledcontents in the mean time continue to make Excursions towards Presbourg and Raab.

Hague, Febr. 25. N. S. Yesterday the States General appointed Monsieur Renfwoude to be one of their Deputies to reside at Brussels. Monsieur Vandenberg is also named by the Council of State to remain there on their part; and they are both preparing for their Journey thither. The two Ambassadors from the Republick of Venice to Her Majesty of Great Britain embarked yesterday Morning at Rotterdam, with their Retinue, on board Her Majesty's Yachts, and set Sail for England. Letters from Italy give an Account, That the Castle of Modena surrendered the 5th Instant, the Garrison remaining Prisoners of War. We daily expect from Rome the News of the Pope's having confirmed the Election of the Bishop of Paderborn to be Bishop of Munster: The Congregation appointed to examine that Affair was to assemble the 12th Instant; and by Letters from Vienna of that Date we have Advice, That the Emperor had two Days before dispatched a Courier to Cardinal Grimani, with Directions not to make any further Opposition, or give any longer Delay to the Bishop of Paderborn's being confirmed. Monsieur Guarent, who was sent some time ago with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Ottoman Porte, arrived at Belgrade the 21st past, in his Return to Vienna, having, at his Departure, received Assurances from the Grand Signior and his Ministers, of their Resolution to maintain the Peace of Carlowitz. Letters from Paris give an Account, That the Chevalier de Villars having carried a Reinforcement to Fort St. Philip in the Island of Minorca, which was hard pressed by the Inhabitants of that Island, who had declared for King Charles III. he had relieved the Fort, and provided it with all Necessaries for its Defence. The same Letters add, That Sir Cloudesly Shovell arrived before Alicante the 30th past with the Fleet under his Command, and the Land Forces commanded by his Excellency the Earl Rivers.

Falmouth, Febr. 15. On the 12th Instant sailed hence the Expedition Packet-Boat, Captain Clyes Commander, for Lisbon. The 13th put in here the Green-Fish and Dove Dogger from Waterford, laden with Butter. Yesterday came in 4 Coasters from Plymouth; and two small Vessels from London, with the Nostra Senioria de Rosaria, Bartholomew d'Armelio Commander, bound from thence to Bilbao.

Plimouth, Febr. 16. The 15th Instant sailed hence Her Majesty's Ships the Lancaster, Guernsey, Winchelsea, Child's-Play, and Elephant, and about 30 Sail of Ships bound for Ireland and the West-Indies, and the Litchfield for St. Helena, the Great St. Christopher for Cadiz, and the Antego Packet for the West-Indies: At the same time came in the Jane of Jersey from Lisbon, bound for London; a Dutch Ship from Rochell, and the William and Sarah of Boston from Jamaica. The 14th came in the New-Indith from London, bound for Venice, and the Guernsey of this Place from Guernsey. This Evening were put back by contrary Winds the above-mentioned Men of War and Merchant Ships. The 15th came in the Dolphin of London, Captain Carnaby Commander, bound for Guinea, the Swallow for Plimouth from Guernsey, and a Dutch Ship from Bourdeaux. This Day came in a Swede for Rochell, and the Southampton Transport-Ship bound for St. Maloes.
