The following Address from the County of Surrey was presented to Her Majesty by Isaac Shardi Esq; High Sheriff; being introduced by his Grace the Duke of Cumberland, Lord Lieutenant of the said County.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace and Gentlemen, assembled at the Assizes held for the County of Surrey, at Kingston upon Thames, March 12. 1706.

Your Gracious Sovereign,
We humbly crave Leave to congratulate the many Glories of Your most Excellent Reign, to acknowledge the infinite Blessings Your Subjects enjoy under Your wise Administration, and by the happy Agreement between Your Majesty and

which (next under GOD) we own the Securing the Succession of the Protestant Line, the Reducing the Exorbitant Power of the Nobles, and the Uniting the Two Kingdoms of England and Scotland.

We truly sensible, that nothing can more effectually tend to the Honour and Safety of Your Majesty, than to support Your Majesty's Law established both in Church and State, and to give Your Majesty's such Strength, Wealth and Safety as may render Great Britain more formidable abroad. In every Occasion we assure Your Majesty, of our Disaffection and Intestines to any other People in Affection and Intestines to Your Majesty and the Established Government, and our Zeal for Popery and a French Pretender.

The Address which follows, from the County of Wilts, was presented to Her Majesty by the Right Honourable the Marquis of Dorchester.

The humble Address of the Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Esquires, Licutenants, Gentlemen, and Freeholders, of the County of Wilts, at the Assizes held at the City of New Sarum, on the 8th Day of March, 1706 7.

Your Gracious Sovereign,
By a wonderful Course of Providence, it fell on us, at Your Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, at the same Place, and in the same Manner, to be the first of Your Subjects in the West, to humbly Address'd Your Majesty on that Occasion; and we were so fortunate, as to Pray, as it were, with a Protestant Spirit, that great Things were reserved for Your Majesty's future Administration: We do now most humbly crave Leave to assure Your Majesty, that Your Majesty's Hearts fill'd with a Zeal for Your Service, and transported at the unparalleled Triumphs of Your Glorious Reign: It has not only surpass'd our Expectations, and exceeded our hopes, but will carry us to an Assurance, did not we reflect back, that it was the just Reward of Heaven to so inimitable a Prince, that he should endue Your Majesty with

As to many Instances, we should be wanting to our selves, to express our most grateful Sense and humble Thanks for Your Majesty's most benign and tender Care of the People of both Nations, by effecting and giving Your Royal Majesty to suspend a Work as the UNION; a Work of great Difficulty and Niceness, and without so full a Provision for the Peace, Quiet and Security, of Your People, both in Civil and Religious Rights, that will make Your Majesty's blessed Reign remember'd, and spoke of hereafter with Honour and Glory.

Both which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Roanoke, March 12. N. S. Letters from Manrua advise, that a Treaty was in a manner concluded for the French Forces evacuating that Place, and all the other Towns and Castles they possess in Italy. The Duke of Savoy has taken Possession of Alexandria, and put a Garrison into that Town. Eight hundred German Recruits pass'd by this Place last Week towards the Milanese. Letters from thence say, That the Genoeve refusing to pay the Contributions demanded of that Republick, a Detachment of Imperial Troops was ordered to march towards their Frontiers: Those which the Territories of the Ecclesiastical State are to pay being retired, the German Troops that had taken Quarters in the Bolonise, are retired from thence.

Vienna, March 12. Captain Pableck arriv'd here the 10th Instant from Transilvania, being disparted by the Baron de Tiede, who lately march'd thither with a Detachment of the Imperial Army in Hungary. He brings an Account, That they met between Claufembourg and Hermantad a Body of Malecontents, much superior in Number to the Imperialists, who however attack'd them, and after an obstinate Fight oblig'd them to retire, with the loss of 1300 of their Men: The Imperialists had not above 60 kill'd, and about the same number wounded. General Rabutin is with the Imperial Troops under his Command near Stein, and has order'd a Line to be made near St. Gothard, to cover the Frontiers of Sciria.

Berne, March 16. By Letters from Milan of the 12th Instant, which are just now come in, we have an Account, That an Agreement was concluded for the French Troops quitting all the Places they remained possess'd of in Italy; and that in pursuance thereof, the Hostilities between the Town and Castle of Milan ceas'd at a Clock that morning; at which time Monsieur St. Paré, a French Officer, sent for that purpose by General Medavi, went with several German Officers into the Castle, to settle Matters in order to the evacuating of that Place. The Enemy were likewise to withdraw their Troops from Mantua, and all the other Places they held in those Parts, and they were to be conducted to Saft.

Frankfort, March 20. The Garrison of Landau is now very numerous, and sufficiently provided with all Necessaries for its Defence, and a great number of Workmen are daily employed in perfecting the Works lately added to its fortifications. The like Care has been taken to provide for the Safety of Philipsbourg; and the Confederate Troops on this side being every where upon their Guard, so that it will be very difficult for the Enemy to make any Attempt, they seem to have laid aside the Preparations they were making in Alsace, and continue very quiet in their Quarters. They write from Savoy, That a Party of 800 Germans having pass'd the Mount St. Bernard, had made an Incursion into the French Territories and carried home a considerable Booty. The Deputies of the Circles of the Upper Rhine continue assembled here, to consult upon the Methods of providing, without any loss of time, the Ammunition, and other Necessaries which they are to furnish towards the Service of the next Campaign on the Rhine.

Hague, March 25. N. S. The Earl of Manchester, Her Majesty's of Great Britain's Ambassador Extraordinary to the Republick of Venice, arriv'd here yesterday from England, and intends in 3 or 4 days to proceed on his Journey. A Fleet is lately come from England into the Maëc, with Recruits and Horses, which have been Landed at Williamstad. There being Advice, That the French Troops were in Motion upon the Frontiers in the Netherlands, Orders have been sent to our Troops which are quartered along the Maëc, to be in a Readiness to March upon the first Notice they should receive; and a Reinforcement of 2000 Men was sent to the Garrison of Courtray: But by the Letters which came in this Day, we hear, the Enemy are quiet again. Letters from Italy confirm the News of an Agreement between Prince Eugene and Monsieur Medavi, in pursuance of which, the French Troops were to evacuate all the Places they were yet possess'd of, either in the Milanese, or the Mantuan, by the 16th Instant. The States of Holland and Westfriesland will Adjourn to-morrow for a fortnight.

Plimouth, March 14. Yesterday came into this Port three Danes bound for Lisbon, the Europe for Flushing from the West-Indies, and Her Majesty's Ship the Kent from the Downes.

Dartmouth, March 14. The Hooker Galley, Captain Barker Tillier, the Ann Galley, Captain Martin Cullford, the Eagle Galley, Captain Street, the Ginne Galley, Captain Bolton, the Mary Galley, Captain Curmbertson, and the Neptune Privateer, Captain Fenny, Commanders, sail'd hence two days ago, all bound for London.

Cowes, March 15. This Morning was brought in here by a Privateer of Middleburgh, called the New Dolphin, Capt. John Christianfon Commander, of 16 Guns and 105 Men, the Duke of Savoy, a French Privateer, of 10 Guns and 75 Men, which he took on Thursday last off at Portland.

Deale, March 18. On the 16th Instant Her Majesty's Ships the Warwick and Lark sail'd towards the River. Yesterday the Ginne Galley, Capt. Bolton Commander, arriv'd here from Lisbon, but last from Dartmouth.

Whitehall, March 17. Her Majesty has been graciously pleas'd to create Sir Christopher Wandesford, of Kirklington in the County of York, Bar. a Baron and Viscount of Her Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, by the Names, Styles and Titles, of Baron Wandesford, and Viscount Castlemoyle, in the County of Wickinny, in the said Kingdom.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c. Lord High Admiral of England, Ireland, &c. is pleased to direct, That all such Men as were removed from Her Majesty's Ship Ranelagh to serve in the Hampton-Court, which are in or about Town, do forthwith repair on board the said Ship Hampton-Court at Chatham, otherwise they will be taken up and try'd as Deserters; His Royal Highness having given Directions for their being paid the Wages due to them in the Ranelagh on board the said Ship Hampton-Court, before she sails from the Buoy of the Nore.
