Was truly sensible, that nothing can more effectually tend

Gracious Sovereign,
A wonderful Course of Providence, it fell on us, at Your
Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, at the same Place,
the Meeting, to be the first of Your Subjects in the West,
to publicly Address'd Your Majesty on that Occasion; and
we were so fortunate, as to Pre-aze, & it wroug, with a Pro-
phetic Spirit, what great Things were reserved for Your Maj-
esty's future Administration. We do now most humbly crave Leave
to dedicate our Selves to Your Majesty with Hearts fit'd with a
Zeal for Your Service, and transposed at the unparalleled
Triumphs of Your Glorious Reign: It
was but farre from us, to exceed our Expectation, and exceeded our Hopes,
when that joyfull o'mpact, did not we reflect back,
but carried us to an Attainment, the last Reward of Heaven to so immitable a Virtue
as to endear Your Majesty with.

And so many Instances, we should be wanting to our selves
for assistance at this time; express our most grateful Sens- and humble
Thanks for Your Majesty's most intelligent and tender Care of
the People of both Nations, by effecting and giving Your Royal
Assent to so Expedient a Work as the UNION; a Work
of great Difficulty and Niceness, and without it full a Pro-
tection for its Peace, Quiet and Security, of Your People, both in
Civil and Religious Rights, that will make Your Majesty's
Blessed Reign rememb'red, and spoke of hereafter with Honour
and Praise.

It remains only to assure Your Majesty, we will do our Endeavours to render it as effectual as recommended to us from the Time, by acting with all possible Respect and Kindness to our Master, and shewing such a Disposition of Love and Charitie, as may probably, by Your Majesty's bright Influence, dispel all Jealousies of Faction or disinteresse for the future.

Rouen, March 12. N. S. Letters from Maurua advise, that a Treaty was in a manner concluded for the French Forces evacuating that Place, and all the other Towns and Cities they possess in Italy. The Duke of Savoy has taken possession of Alexandria, and put a Gaulen into that Town. One hundred German Recruits passed by this Place last

Vienna, March 12. Captain Pableek arrived here the 10th instant from Transilvania, being dispatched by the Baron de Tiege, who lately marched thither with a Detachment of the Imperial Army in Hungary. He brings an Account, That they met between Claufenbourg and Hermanstadt a Body of Malecontents, much superior in Number to the imperialists, who however attacked them, and after an obstinate Fight obliged them to retire, with the loss of 1300 of their Men: The imperialists had not above 50 kill'd, and about the same number wounded. General Rabutin is with the Imperial Troops under his Command near Stein, and has ordered a Line to be made near St. Gotthard, to cover the Frontiers of Stiria.

Berne, March 16. By Letters from Milan of the 12th instant, which are just now come in, we have an Account, That an Agreement was concluded for the French Troops quitting all the Places they remained posted in Italy; and that in pursuance thereof, the Hostilities between the Town and Castle of Milan ceased at 4 a Clock that morning; at which time Monsieur St. Peter, a French Officer, sent for that purpose by General Medavi, went with several German Officers into the Castle, to settle Matters in order to the evacuating of that Place. The Enemy were likewise to withdraw their Troops from Mantua, and all the other Places they held in those Parts, and they were to be conducted to Safi.

Frankfort, March 20. The Garrison of Landau is now very numerous, and sufficiently provided with all necessaries for its Defence, and a great number of Workmen are daily employed in perfecting the Works lately added to its fortifications. The like Care has been taken to provide for the Safety of Philippsbourg; and the Confederate Troops on this side being every where up in their Guard, so that it will be very difficult for the Enemy to make any Attempt, they seem to have laid aside the Preparations they were making in Alsace, and continue very quiet in their Quarries. They write from Savoy, That a party of 800 Germans having passed the Mount St. Bernard, had made an Incursion into the French Territories and carried home a considerable Booty. The Deputies of the Circles of the Upper Rhine continue assembled here, to consult upon the Methods of providing, without any loss of time, the Ammunition, and other Necessaries which they are to turnish towards the Service of the next Campaign on the Rhine.

Hague, March 25. N. S. The Earl of Manchester, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Ambassador Extraordinary to the Republick of Venice, arrived here yesterday from England, and intends in 3 or 4 days to proceed on his Journey. A Fleet is lately come from England into the Macie, with Recruits and Horses, which have been Landed at Williamstad. There being Advice, That the French Troops were in Motion upon the Frontiers in the Netherlands, Orders have been sent to our Troops which are quartered along the Macie, to be in a Readiness to March up the first Notice they should receive; and a Reinforcement of 2000 Men was sent to the Garrison of Courtray: But by the Letters which came in this Day, we hear, the Enemy are quiet again. Letters from Italy confirm the News of an Agreement between Prince Eugene and Montiour Medavi, in pursuance of which, the French Troops were to evacuate all the Places they were yet possessed of, either in the Milanese, or the Mantuan, by the 15th instant. The States of Holland and Westfrisia will Adjourn to morrow for a fortnight.

Plimonth, March 14. Yesterday came into this Port three
Dancs bound for Lisboa, the Europe for Fluitizing from the
West-Indies, and Her Majesty's Ship the Kent from the
Downes.

Dartmouth, March 14. The Hooker Galley, Captain Barker Tillet, the Ann Galley, Captain Martin Culford, the Eagle Galley, Captain Street, the Ginne Galley, Captain Bolton, the Mary Galley, Captain Cuthbertson, and the Neptune Privateer, Captain Fenny, Commanders, sailed hence last evening all bound for London.

Cowes, March 15. This Morning was brought in here by a Privateer of Middburgh, called the New Dolphin, Capt. John Christianson Commander, of 16 Guns and 105 Men, the Duke of Savoy, a French Privateer, of 10 Guns and 75 Men, which he took on Thursday last off at Portland.

Whitehall, March 17. Her Majesty has been gratified to create Sir Christopher Wandesford, of Kinkellington, in the County of York, Esq. a Baron and Viscount of Kilcullen, in the Kingdom of Ireland, by the Names, Style and Titles, of Baron Wandesford, and Viscount Cathercomer, in the County of Roscommon, in the said Kingdom.
