WE Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters and Scholars, of Your University of Cambridge, do humbly beg leave to testify our unfeigned Joy for the Accomplishment of the great and happy Union between Your Two Kingdoms of England and Scotland, to the mutual Advantages and Satisfaction of both Nations, and the Prevention of those Mischiefs that might hereafter have arisen, (as it has often happened in former Times past) whenever two distinct and independent Sovereigns should have reigned at once within this Island.

We are firmly persuaded, That Your Majesty's earnest Zeal in promoting so desirable a Work, was the Effect of that tender Concern for the Happiness of Your Subjects, which has appear'd in so many remarkable Instances through the whole Course of Your wise and gracious Administration.

And we beseech the Divine Providence, which has enabled Your Majesty to overcome those Difficulties that were thought insuperable, and which had baffled all former Attempts of this Nature, still to prosper all Your great and good Designs, and make every Year of Your auspicious Reign productive of new Wonders, as surprising as those we have already seen. May Your Arms be victorious abroad, and Your Government undisturb'd at home: May You long continue to reign over us; and late exchange this Earthly for a Heavenly and Eternal Crown.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

Be pleased to permit us, in all Dutifulness, to express the highest Veneration the loyalst of Subjects are capable of to Your Majesty's unparalleled Government, under the happy Administration whereof we have every Day new Proofs of Your Majesty's tender Affection for Your People.

Your repeated Victories have effectually secured us against Dangers from abroad; and Your Majesty's fortunate accomplishing the so much desired, and so often by the greatest of Your Predecessors unsuccessfully attempted, Union of Your Two Kingdoms, affords the agreeable Prospect of continual Tranquility in this Island to the remotest Posterity. And as we doubt not Your Majesty's Firmness for the certain establishing the Protestant Succession, so necessary for the Security of the Protestant Religion, has drawn down from Heaven upon Your Glorious Reign the many Blessings which we with thankful Hearts have acknowledged to Almighty God; so we earnestly pray, and have Reason to hope, that the same Providence will always attend and prosper Your Majesty's pious Designs for the Good of Your People, the Regard You shew for the Support of Your Allies, and crown Your Endeavours with the Honour of giving a safe and lasting Peace to Europe.

We humbly presume to assure Your Majesty, That we shall always, to the utmost of our Power, observe the Commands Your Majesty was lately pleased to lay upon us from the Throne, in order to enjoy the Fruits thereof, and wish Your Majesty many Years of an uninterrupted Prosperity, to receive the applause of the grateful World for the Benefits You shall have so liberally bestow'd upon it.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Naples, March 9. N. S. The Duke of Anjou's Ministry here, finding that the Money arising from the Tax of Two per Cent. which has lately been imposed upon all real Estates, comes in very slowly, are considering of new Projects for a more expeditious raising of Money to answer their urgent Occasions, and enable them to put this Kingdom into a posture of Defence, in case the Allies, having now reduced the other Spanish Dominions in Italy under the Obedience of our natural Sovereign King Charles the Third, should think of an Expedition this Way; And for this Purpose they have made some Proposals to the Nobility and the Deputies of this City, requiring them to return their Answers with all possible Diligence. In the mean time, to save the Expence of Garrisons, Orders are given for the dismantling of our Towns and Fortresses, except those of Capua, Gaeta, and some other Posts of greater Importance. A Contest has lately happened between the Chamber of the Finances here and the City: The latter having purchased for ever of the Duke of Anjou a certain publick Office, named del Portolano, for the Sum of 500000 Crowns, the Chamber pretends to take it from them again, under Colour that the City has by this time, by enjoying the said Office, got in their Principal, and a considerable Sum of Money besides. This fresh Instance of the Arbitrary Exercise of the Sovereign Authority by a Foreign Power, adds greatly to the general Dislike of the present Government. We have an Account from Sicily, That the States of that Kingdom have granted to the Viceroy a Subsidy of 200000 Crowns; one half to be employed in repairing the Fortifications, and storing the Magazines in that Island; the other in reforming their Coin, which is so much diminished by Clipping, that it proves a very great Prejudice to their Trade.

Paris, April 4. N. S. The Duke of Vendome's Departure for the Netherlands is put off till the 10th Instant. The Horse-Guards and other Troops of the Household which are to serve in the Army under his Command, have received Orders to depart forthwith. Colonel Guethem, who commanded the Party that lately came out of Aeth, and seized Monsieur Berlingen between this Place and Marly, but had the Mistourie to be discovered and taken Prisoner, is brought hither, and at his own Request is allowed to go to Troyes in Champagne, to remain there a Prisoner upon his Parole till an Opportunity is found to exchange him.

Brussels, April 8. The necessary Preparations are making in these Parts for the Approaching Campaign; in order to which the Forces in the several Garrisons are commanded to be in a readiness to take the Field upon the first Notice they shall receive.

Falmouth, March 31. Yesterday sailed hence the Margaret of Dram, laden with Deals for Bristol, Boyen Wilson Master; as did likewise 4 Dutch Doggers, which came from Bourdeaux, homeward-bound. At the same time came in here the Christian, Guldenleew Forbes Olsson Master, and the Jufro Catharina, Christian Camps Master, both laden with Deals from Norway for this Place.

Plymouth, April 1. Yesterday came into this Port Her Majesty's Ship the Ruby from Torbay, and 4 Dutch Ships from Bourdeaux, laden with Wine, and homeward-bound.

Hull, April 2. On the 30th past Her Majesty's Ships the Rochester Prize and Postillon failed hence for the River Thames, having under their Convoy about 40 Sail of Coasters and other Vessels, bound for London; but the Wind being contrary, they were detained in the Humber till yesterday about Noon, when they set Sail, with the Wind at W. S. W.

Yarmouth, April 2. Yesterday sailed out of our Road a Fleet of about 30 Sail of light Colliers for Newcastle, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the Nightingale and Queenborough; as did also at the same time Her Majesty's Ship the Tyger, bound for Humber. This Day several light Colliers more passed through our Road from the Southward.

Portsmouth, April 3. This Morning the outward-bound West-India Fleet set Sail from Spithead, under Convoy of several of Her Majesty's Ships, with a very fair Wind.

Whitehall, April 6. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough went on Wednesday the 3d Instant in the Evening on board one of Her Majesty's Yachts at Margate, and set sail for Holland, under Convoy of a Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships. The next Day they dropt Anchor off the North-Foreland: On Friday, by the help of the Tides, they got in Sight of Ostend, and afterwards arrived at Flushing; where his Grace landed the same Day.
