Berne, April 9. N. S. Mr. Stanyan, Her Majeffy of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary, returned hither laft Night from Coire, where he has concluded a Treaty with the Grifons; for a free Paffage to be allowed thro' their Territories to fuch Troops and Convoys as the Emperor and his Allies may have occasion to fend into Italy. Count Metternech, the King of Pruffa's Minister, who has resided here during the Winter, fet out the first Instant for Zurich, in order to deliver his Letters of Credence to that Canton; but will shortly return hither. They write from Turin, That the Evacuation of Final was put off till the 2d Instant; and that Prince Eugene had appointed Monsieur de la Mar, Lieutenant of his own Regiment of Dragoous, to take possession of that Place for the King of Spain, and to be Governor there. The Letters from Milan fay, the Enemy were the same Day to evacuate Mantua, Cremoria, Sabionetra, and all the other Places which they liad not yet quitted. The Garison of the Castle of Milan, which marched out the 20th pass, and did then consist of 700 Men, is said to be reduced to 300, all the Spanish, Italian and Swift Soldiers, having quitted the Enemy's Service; and those of other Garisons will probably do the like. Letters from Lions give an Account of a great Insurrection in the District of Querci.

Hague, April 19. N. S. The Duke of Marlborough landed at the Brill the 16th Instant at Night: His Grace arrived here the next Day about Two in the Afternoon, and dined with Mr. Stepney, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary, who was lately returned from Brusslels; after which his Grace made a Visit to the Great Pensonary, and another to the President of the Assembly of the States Came to coafer with

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with his Grace at his Ledgings, where he had another Conterence with them this Evening. To morrow his Grace intends to fer out for Hanover, and thence to Saxony, to meet the King of Sweden. Monaeur d'Amvérquerque went from hence this Day for Bruffels. The Troops which were quartered along the Macle are marching towards Bruffels, and will be quartered between that City, Mechlen and Louvain, from whence they are fhortly to march towards Flanders, our main Army being to rendezy as on that fide. The French Troops have been in motion towards Namur; but ours being every where upon their Guard, the Enemy did not think fit to make any Artempt. They work very hard upon their new Lines, and are getting together all the Provisions they can to ftore their Magazines at Mons, Douay and Tournay. Our Advices from thoic Parts fay, the Duke of Vendoline arrived at Liffe the 14th Initiant, and would be at Mons the 16th. The States of Holland met the 13th, and among other Things have under Consideration the rating of 700000 Florins, to be advanced by way of a Loan, to the King of Spain, upon fonc of his Revenues in the Netherlands. Our Convoy for Liebon, with Recruits and other Supplies for our Forces in 130fe Parts, will fail with the next fair Wind. They write from Vienna, that it had been intimated to the States Minister there. That the Emperor would give no further Opposition to the See of Muniter, but would leave that Matter wholly to the Pope's Determination.
