THE following Address from the Borough of Wendover was presented to Her Majesty by Richard Hampden Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Sunderland, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

The humble Address of the Inhabitants of the ancient Borough of Wendover in the County of Bucks.

May it please Your Majesty,

THE Consideration of the signal and continued Success that has attended Your Majesty, ever since Your happy Accession to the Throne, entirely removes the Surprise that would otherwise have been caused, by the Conjunction of so nice and difficult an Undertaking as an Union between England and Scotland; and convinces all the World, That nothing that Your Majesty shall undertake may be conducive to the Good of Mankind in general, and of Your Subjects in particular, can fail having its desired Effect, as far as Prudence, Policy and Courage, can bring it to Perfection.

We beg Leave to assure Your Majesty, That we will never, in the least, be necessary to the weakening or dissolving what You have so happily accomplish'd; but shall contribute, to the utmost of our Power, to the supporting an Union, that will tend so essentially to the Removal of those Occasions of Dispute that have frequently interrupted the Peace and Quiet of the Two Kingdoms; and the fatal Consequences attending them: An Union that has added such new Lustre to Your Majesty's Reign and Government, and will, by conducting so considerably to the Protection and Maintenance of our Religions, Laws and Liberties, procure us a firm and lasting Security against the Enemies of our common Welfare.

We have most just Cause to be persuaded, that the same Hand of Divine Providence, that has so eminently appear'd in the beginning of Your Reign, will accompany the whole Course of it; and as it has assisted You in justly putting a Restraint to the restless and unlimited Desires of an ambitious and insatiable Monarch, so will enable You to restore a safe and honourable Peace to Europe, and will long continue You to be the Support of the Protestant Religion, and a Protection and Blessing to Your secure and happy Subjects at home.

The following Address from the Borough of Bedford was presented to Her Majesty by William Farrer Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament.

May it please Your most Excellent Majesty,

WE Your Majesty's dutiful Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Bayliffs, Common-Council Men, and other Inhabitants of our Majesty's Corporation and Borough of Bedford, do humbly congratulate Your Majesty upon the happy Union of Your Kingdoms of England and Scotland; by which, as we hope, the malicious Designs of Your Majesty's Enemies, to Destroy Your Majesty, and Subvert the Government, will be frustrated: So we desire not, but by it, the Glory, Honour and Power, of Great Britain, will daily more and more increase and flourish; and Your Majesty's wise Administration, by which, under the Divine Providence, this great Work (so often by Your Predecessors vainly attempted) was accomplish'd, will, by the present, and all future Ages, be admir'd, and Your Majesty's Name remembered, with the greatest Veneration, until Time shall be no more. May the same Almighty Power, which hath hitherto, still protect and guide Your Sacred Majesty thro' the whole Course of Your Reign, which we earnestly pray may be long and prosperous; and that we may contribute what in us lies to make it so, we pray resolve, as 'tis our Duty, to be steddy in our Loyalty to Your Majesty, and, as You have been graciously pleas'd to advise us, to live as becomes us, in perfect Love and Friendship with our fellow Subjects. In Witness whereof, the said Corporation have hereunto affix'd their Common Seal, and the other Inhabitants have set their Hands, the 16th Day of April, and in the Sixth Year of Your Majesty's Reign.

Both which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Valentia, March 17. N. S. Our Troops are preparing to take the Field, so soon as the Magazines which are providing for their Subsistence can be got ready. They are much superior in Foot to the Enemy. The King of Spain went from hence lately to Barcelona. Mr. Stanhope, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary, is on his Departure thither to attend his Majesty.

Paris, April 14. The Duke de Noailles arrived here the 11th Instant from the French Court. The next Day Orders were dispatched to all the French Troops quartered in these Parts to take the Field, and he marched with them towards Tury; but was soon after obliged to send them into

Quarters for want of Forage. We have an Account from Barcelona, That King Charles III. of Spain arrived there the 22d past; That the States of Catalonia being summoned thither, met the 24th, and granted a Subsidy to his Catholic Majesty for the raising of four Regiments of Foot and one of Horse; and that he had given Orders for the reinforcing of the Garrison of Gironne to 3000, and that of Lerida to 2000 Men.

Turin, April 13. Count Thauri arrived here the 8th Instant from Milan, and has had several Conferences with our Duke, upon the Measures to be taken for the more effectual prosecuting the War the next Campaign. The Preparations for that purpose are carried on in these Parts with all possible Diligence and Application; and all the Military Officers in his Royal Highness's Service are ordered to be in their respective Posts before the 10th of next Month. A considerable Magazine of Provisions and Ammunition is erecting at Coni; where there is also to be an Hospital for the Use of the Confederate Troops. The Enemy being apprehensive that an Interruption into Dauphine is intended, are fortifying several Places on the Avenues of that Province. We hear they have undermined the Fortifications of Suza, with design to blow them up, if they should find themselves oblig'd to abandon that Place.

Milan, April 16. This Day Prince Eugene took possession of this City and Duchy, and received the Oaths of Allegiance of the Deputies of the several Courts of Justice, and other Bodies of the Inhabitants of this City, in the Name of our lawful Sovereign King Charles III. and upon this Occasion *Te Deum* was sung, and a treble Discharge was made of our Cannon, with other publick Demonstrations of the general Joy of the People here, for their Deliverance from the Oppression of a French Government. The Enemy have withdrawn their Garrisons out of Cremona, and all the other Places they were possess'd of: Those Troops are now marching towards Dauphine; and this Duchy, with that of Mantua, and the neighbouring Countries, enjoy a perfect Tranquility.

Vienna, April 16. Count Guido Staremberg set out from hence the 13th Instant for Hungary, in order to assemble the Imperial Forces on that side, and to carry a new Supply of Provisions and other Necessaries to Leopoldstad, Great Waradin, and some other Places. We hear from Hungary, That Prince Ragotzi, having taken upon him the Title of Prince of Transylvania, caused himself to be Proclaimed as such in several Places of that Country on the 28th past; and that he has put off the great Council of the Chief of his Adherents, which was to have been held at Onod on the first of next Month, to the first of June.

Hague, April 29. N. S. A Squadron of the Regiment of Saxe-Norbouurg came into this Place the 26th past, being to remain here in Garrison in the room of the Horse-Guards, which marched yesterday for Brabant. The Duke of Wurtemberg, Baron Hompefch, and several other Officers who were in Town, are gone to their respective Commands. The Deputies of the States General, and of the Council of State, that are to be with the Army this Campaign, are also gone for Brussels.

Falmouth, April 19. This Day arrived here Her Majesty's Ship the Cambridge, Captain Lutleron Commander, having on board the Earl Rivers and the Earl of Essex, with some other Officers, and Her Majesty's Ships the Seaford and Eubbs Yacht: They sailed from Lisbon the 2d Instant.

Falmouth, April 19. On the 16th Instant put in here the Herring-Fishery of Rotterdam from Sharratt, Jacob Rose Master, laden with Wine; and the Good-Merchant of Zurick from Bourdeaux, laden with Wine, Cornelius Arjunt Post Master. The 17th came in the Dimrick, a Privateer of Jersey, Philip Shoornith Commander. This Day sailed hence the Queen Packet-Boat for Lisbon, Captain Culverdine Commander.

Plymouth, April 20. On the 16th came in here a Dane from Dram, bound for this Place. The 17th arrived here another Dane, bound for Bristol. The 19th put in here two Danes from Bergen, bound for St. Ubes; and this Day sailed two Danes for Dram, and a Dutch Ship from France.

Bristol, April 19. Yesterday sailed out of Kingroad Her Majesty's Ship the Lizard for Milford, and the Success for Glasgow. This Day arrived here the Samuel of this Place from Waterford, but left from Minehead.

Tarborough, April 21. On the 19th Instant came into our Road Her Majesty's Ship the Dunwich from the Southward, and under her Convoy several Ships bound for Stockholm, who continue here, with several other light Colliers, waiting for a fair Wind. Yesterday passed through our Road a Fleet of laden Colliers to the Southward, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the Nightingale and Queenborough.
