WHereas by the Two and twentieth Article of the Treaty of Union of the Two Kingdoms of England and Scotland, as the same have been Ratified and Confirmed by Two Acts of Parliament, the one passed in the Parliament of England, the other in the Parliament of Scotland, It is Agreed, That if We, on or before the First Day of May next, on which Day the Union is to take place, should Declare under the Great Seal of England, That it is Expedient, That the Lords of Parliament of England, and Commons of the present Parliament of England, should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of Great Britain, for and on the part of England, Then the said Lords of Parliament of England, and Commons of the present Parliament of England, should be the Members of the respective Houses of the said Parliament of Great Britain, for and on the part of England, and the Five and forty Representatives of Scotland, in the House of Commons of the Parliament of Great Britain, should Assemble and Meet respectively in the respective Houses of the Parliament of Great Britain, at such Time and Place as should be so Appointed by Us, and should be the Two Houses of the First Parliament of Great Britain: And We having taken into Our Royal Consideration the present Circumstances of Affairs, do Judge it to be for the Good of Our Kingdoms, That the Lords of Parliament of England, and the Commons of the present Parliament of England, should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of Great Britain, for and on the part of England; and the Lords of Parliament of England, and Commons of the present Parliament of England, are accordingly to be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of Great Britain, for and on the part of England.

Given at Our Court at St. James's the Nine and twentieth Day of April, Anno Domini 1707. In the Sixth Year of Our Reign.

Vicenza, April 23. N. S. The Earl of Manchester, Her Maj-
esty of Great Britain's Ambassador Extraordinary to the Repub-
lick of Venice, arrived here two Days ago from Franconfort,
and has received the Visits of the Foreign Ministers and other
Persons of Quality at this Court. There is an Account from
Hungary, That a Body of the Malecontents commanded by
Count Caroli, having attack'd one of 3500 Rascians near Kez-
kemet, the latter made to good a Defence, that the Enemy
were soon entirely routed; and retiring to Kezkemet, the
Rascians pursued them thither; and entering the Place with
them, made a great Slaughter of them, Count Caroli himself
narrowly escaping, and afterwards set fire to the Town.

Alt-Ranslad, April 27. N. S. On Sunday the 24th Instant in
the Evening the Duke of Marlborough took his Leave of the
Court of Hanover, and came away at 4 the next Morning:
His Grace lay that Night at Halberstadt, where he was com-
plimented by the Magistrates. Yesterday Morning he conti-
nued his Journey to Hall, where his Grace was met by Mr. Ro-
binson, Envoy Extraordinary from Her Majesty of Great Bri-
tain, Count Zinzendorf, Envoy from the Emperor, and Mon-
sieur Cranenberg, the Dutch Minister: After Dinner his Grace
received the Compliments of the Magistrates, and of the
University; then proceeded hither, accompanied by Mr. Ro-
binson and Monsieur Cranenberg: He went directly to Count
Piper's Quarters; and after some Conference with him, came
to the Quarters the King had ordered to be prepared for him.
This

This Morning my Lord Duke was complimented upon his Arrival by the Ministers and General Officers, and about 10 a Clock had his first Audience of the King, which lasted near two Hours; and after dining with his Majesty, his Grace had a second Audience, at which were Count Piper and Monsieur Hermeim, the two chief Ministers, and Mr. Robinson. Since this last Audience his Grace has spent the whole Evening in Visits to Count Piper, and the other Ministers and General Officers, and is perfectly satisfied with his Reception. Count Wackerbach, Lieutenant-General of King Augustus's Forces, and his Envoy to the Court of Vienna, came hither this Afternoon, with a Compliment from his Master, intimating, that he would be to Night at Leiplick, where his Grace intends to wait on his Majesty to morrow Morning, and to return hither to Dinner.

Leiplick, April 30. The 28th Instant his Grace the Duke of Marlborough came hither from Alt-Ranstad, to wait on King Augustus, with whom he had a Private Conference of about half an Hour, and then returned to Count Piper's Quarters, where he dined. In the Evening his Grace supped with Felt-Marshal Reinschield. The 29th his Grace was visited by Count Piper, Felt-Marshal Reinschield, Felt-Marshal Ogilvi, and several General Officers and Persons of Quality; and after having dined with Baron Gorz, had his Audience of Leave of the King of Sweden. Before it was ended King Stanislaus came in, and was complimented by his Grace, who soon after took his Leave, came hither, and thence, without making any Stay, proceeded on his Journey to Berlin.

Berlin, April 30. The King of Prussia came yesterday to Charlottenbourg from Linum, where his Majesty has been diverting himself with Shooting. The Prince and Princess Royal removed likewise yesterday to Charlottenbourg, with their whole Court; and his Excellency the Lord Raby, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Ambassador Extraordinary, is also gone thither. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough is expected there this Evening from Leiplick; and Preparations are made for his Reception.

Brussels, May 5. Monsieur d'Auverquerque has been indisposed, but is now upon Recovery. The 3d Instant Monsieur Geldermallen, Monsieur Goings, and Baron Harvelt, three of the Deputies from the States-General that are to be with the Army, set out from hence, in order to give the necessary Directions for the entire demolishing the Lines and other Fortifications the French made in these Countries while they were in their Possession. The Enemy are making great Magazines of Corn and other Provisions at Mons. Their General Officers are ordered to be there by the middle of this Month, about which time they give out that they shall take the Field. Letters from Madrid of the 18th past say, the Allies have made themselves Masters of Villena, a Town in Valencia. There are Reports at Mons of an Action in Spain, in which it is said the Confederates got the Advantage.

Hague, May 6. N. S. Mr. Howe, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary to the Elector of Hanover, arrived here from thence the 2d Instant. Our Advices from the Netherlands say, the Preparations were continued on both sides for opening the Campaign. Letters from Paris say, a Declaration had been published there, relating to some new Orders about the Money-Bills, which had given so general a Dissatisfaction, that it was believed the Court would be obliged to repeal it. These Letters give an Account of the Death of Monsieur Pointis, and of the Chevalier d'Aubeterre, which last was the eldest Lieutenant-General in the French Service.

This Day his Excellency Ahmed Ben Ahmed Cardenash, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Emperor of Fez and Morocco, &c. had a private Audience of Leave of Her Majesty; being introduced by the Rt. After which he had a like Audience of Leave of his Royal Highness: To which he was likewise conducted by Dr. Inglis, Marshal of the Ceremonies.

William Lord Cowper, Keeper of the Great Seal of England, and the Lord Chancellor of England, or Lord Keeper of the Great Seal of England for the time being; Sidney Earl of Godolphin, Lord High Treasurer of England, and the Lord High Treasurer of England for the time being; Thomas Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, President of Her Majesty's Council, and the President of the Council for the time being; his Grace John Duke of Newcastle, Keeper of Her Majesty's Privy Seal, and the Lord Keeper of the Privy Seal for the time being; the Lord High Admiral of England that hereafter shall be for the time being; the Rt. Hon. Charles Earl of Sunderland, One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; Thomas Earl of Stamford; Robert Harley Esq; One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries for the time being; the First Commissioner of the Treasury that hereafter shall be for the time being; the First Commissioner of the

Admiralty that hereafter shall be for the time being; the Rt. Rev. Father in God, Henry Lord Bishop of London, and the Bishop of London for the time being; the Rt. Hon. William Lord Dartmouth, Henry Lord Herbert of Chertbury; Henry Boyle Esq; Chancellor and Under-Treasurer of Her Majesty's Exchequer, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer for the time being; and Sir Philip Meadows Kt. Geo. Stepney, John Pultney, and Robert Monkton, Esqs; or any Three or more of them, for Promoting the Trade of this Her Majesty's Kingdom, and for Inspecting and Improving Her Majesty's Plantations in America and elsewhere.
