The following Address was presented to Her Majesty by the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London.

To Her most Excellent Majesty the QUEEN of Great Britain, France and Ireland.

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons, of Your Majesty's City of London; in Common-Council assembled.

May it please Your Majesty,

As we do, with the utmost Gratitude to Almighty God; and to Your Majesty, (His Vicegerent over us) seriously reflect upon the many great and signal Blessings that have attended Your Majesty's pious Endeavours at Home throughout Your Reign; and upon the wonderful Successes of Your potent Arms, to establish the Rights of Princes Abroad, and a lasting Peace in Europe: We humbly beg Leave most heartily to congratulate Your Majesty upon those, and all other the Blessings we now enjoy, under Your Majesty's Wise and Gracious Government; and particularly upon the happy Union of Your Majesty's Two Kingdoms of England and Scotland into One entire Monarchy of Great Britain: A Blessing (tho' often attempted) yet too great to be desired by Your Royal Predecessors, but reserved by Heaven to be accomplish'd by Your Sacred Majesty, the true and sincere Love of Piety, Unity and Concord.

We beseech Your Majesty, That we will endeavour, to the utmost of our Power, to render this Blessing most Effectual; and And we pray, That Your Majesty may live long to enjoy the Blessing and Glory thereof.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses, of Your Majesty's ancient Corporation of Portsmouth.

WE Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses, of Your Majesty's ancient Corporation of Portsmouth, humbly beg Leave to congratulate Your Majesty for the great Blessing, the Union of England and Scotland; and to assure Your Majesty, That we will not only stand by, but oppose, all Hears and Animosities, which divide and weaken Your Majesty's Interest, and the Good of Your People. To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Common-Council, and others, Gentlemen and Inhabitants, of the Town and County of Haverford-West,

Most Gracious Sovereign,

Permit us, Your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects of Your Majesty's ancient Corporation and Town and County of Haverford-West, to congratulate Your Majesty upon the Union of the Two Kingdoms that has been so long wish'd for, and so necessary for the Good of the whole Island.

We beg Leave to tell Your Majesty, That it's a Grief to us to live in a Place situated the most remote of any from Your Majesty's Royal Person: It occasions our being the latest in hearing, and consequently the latest in letting Your Majesty know the Satisfaction we have at any Good that happens in Your Majesty's Reign.

But happy may we think our selves to be, to live in a Reign where Matters are so well concerted, and to see this that in former Ages was in vain attempted, (and of it self so nice) in that of Your Majesty so well concluded.

Wonderful had it been in any other Reign than that of Your Majesty; for Demonstration tells us, that Difficulties for the Good of Great Britain were left to be compleated in the Reign of so great, so good, and so gracious a Queen.

And that Your Majesty may live to see the Effects of so great a Work; and that Your Reign may be long and prosperous, shall be the constant and hearty Prayers of, May it please Your Majesty, Your Majesty's most humble, most obedient, and most faithful Subjects.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Lisbon, May 4. N. S. The Portuguese are in a readiness to act with Vigour; and their Forces, when assembled at Ciudad-Rodrigo, will consist of about 8000 Foot and 2000 Horse complete. The Troops of the Province of Almeida are in a very good Condition; and those that are to join 'em from Alentejo are on their March thither. The Cavalry from Lisbon, consisting of 340 Horse, are gone towards the Frontiers; and the Duke of Cadaval, who expects every Day the Arrival of the Regiments from Ireland, has fix'd his Departure to the 10th Instant.

Turin, May 4. The Hereditary Prince of Hesse-Cassel arrived here from Genoa on the first Instant; and it is believed he will stay with us till the opening of the Campaign. All our Advices from France say, That the Enemy have countermanded 12 Battalions of their Troops, which were on their March for Spain, to reinforce their Army in Dauphine. His Royal Highness being somewhat weak after his late Indisposition, designs to go to-morrow to one of his Country Seats, with the Dutchess Consort, and the two young Princes, for the Benefit of the Air, and Recovery of his Strength.

Berlin,

Berlin, May 12. Letters from Poland say, That the Czar's Army was encamped on the Banks of the Vistula, with a Design to oppose the Passage of the Swedes over that River; and that he had another Body of 30000 Men in reserve on the Frontiers of Poland, in order to supply his Army from time to time with necessary Recruits, or to reinforce it in case of a Defeat. These Advices add, That the Czar was preparing to go in Person to the Congress, in hopes he might incline the Poles to a new Election. We are assured that the King of Sweden will suddenly evacuate Saxony; and that his Majesty is on his Departure for Poland. The Prince of Anhalt left this Place on Thursday last, and designs very suddenly to enter upon his Journey for Italy, and there put himself at the Head of the Prussian Troops.

Paris, May 16. There is nothing new in our Advices from Spain, excepting only that my Lord Galway, who was reported dead, is now said to be living, and to have retreated with a Body of his Forces. We are afraid on other Accounts, our Victory was not so compleat as at first represented, since we hear our Army was not in a Condition to march till the third Day after the Battle, tho' our Generals had resolv'd to lose no time, the hot Season being very far advanc'd, and the Campaign drawing to a Conclusion. Our Court is in great Perplexities by reason of the Tumult and Disorders which encrease in the Heart of the Kingdom, and the powerful Armies which threaten its Frontiers. It is said, the Duke of Savoy prepares to invade Dauphiné at the Head of 40000 Men; and that a separate Army of 20000 are to fall into Provence under the Command of Prince Eugene. We have only 28000 Men in those Parts, who are to entrench among the Mountains, and oppose their Passage. Monsieur de Medavi, who has already taken Leave of the Court, is to command a Body of those Troops, independent of the Marshal de Teste, and subject to no Orders but from the King or the Ministry. We are very apprehensive of Revolts in case the Enemy should meet with Success on that side. The Execution of the late Edict relating to the Money-Bills is suspended for the present, by reason of the Confusions which it has occasion'd among the People, and the general Opposition which it meets with in all the Towns of Trade. The Intendant of Languedoc has represented, that nothing less than an Army of 50000 Men can force the Currency of these Bills in that Province. The Commotions in Quercy are not yet appeas'd. In some of the Villages where the King's Officers demanded the Capitation, the Peasants rose upon 'em, to the Number of 5 or 600, declaring themselves unable to pay it; but two Troops of the Regiment of Ferraon being order'd thither, fell upon 'em without Mercy, and put above 150 to the Sword. At Bourdeaux three Persons were put to Death by Order of the Marshal Montrevel, for having said that the Enemy would be welcome whenever they came into that Country. This Execution has had no other Effect but further to exasperate the Minds of the People. The Government has sent thither the Regiment of Dragoons of Verac, with some other Troops; which coming out of Italy in a very ill Condition, had been ordered into Quarters of Refreshment in Poitou.

Brussels, May 19. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough holds his Resolution of joining the Army on the 21st Instant, when we shall soon see whether the French are so willing to give us Battle as they pretend. They are said to consist of 75000 Men, and expect in few Weeks a Reinforcement from Rouffillon.

Dartmouth, May 10. We have Advice, That Sir John Leake met with a Dutch Merchant-man of Rotterdam, which came from Brest, but last from Camerottam: He left the former the 13th past, N. S. and 13 Days after, being Wind-bound in Camerottam, he saw a Squadron of 15 Sail go into Brest, (as he judges) from 50 to 70 Guns, and is the same that met the Swiftsure and outward-bound Lisbon Fleet. He was since in at Brest with his Boat, and says, they are getting them ready with all expedition to go to Sea again.
