They have some Years endeavour'd, by all manner of Artifices, to alarm the Port with Jealousies against the Muscovites, and engage them to a Ruptune with that Nation. The Tartar Han lately sent hither his First Minister for that Purpose, but his Institutions had no other Effect than the deposing of his Masser; the Port having sent the Emperor's First Master of the Herse with a Commission for a new Cham. However these Importunities have awaken'd the Turks, and put them upon tortifying their Frontiers. They last Year sinisted the Castle or Kern, which commands the Passage of the Streights of Crimea into the Black Sea; and began the Fortification of Bender, situate on the Mouth of the River Niester, which they now continue; and for that Purpose Four Frigars are already said thither with Provisions, Artislery, Anns, and Ammunition. The P. inces of Wallachia and Moldavia were order'd thicker, with 2000 Men each, to work at the Fortifications; but they have ransem'd themselves from that Service. Listen, June 1. N. S.
