

# The London Gazette.

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*Falmouth, Jan. 5.*

**T**he *St. Peter of Rouen*, a vessel of 60 Tuns laden with Corn and Linnen, was met about seven days since by a vessel of *Dartmouth* coming home from *Portugal*, in extraordinary distress by the late violent storms, in which she had lost all her Masts, the men despairing of safety in their ship, were received on board the said vessel of *Dartmouth*, after whole departure their ship immediately sunk to the bottom.

Many of the ships which put in here homewards bound are sailed hence with a fair wind, but the two *East-India* ships continue here, expecting the settlement of the weather.

*London, Jan. 7.* On Wednesday and yesterday sailed hence the greatest part of the Fleet of Merchant ships; the rest expecting a greater abatement of the wind.

*Rome, Dec. 28.* The Funeral solemnities for the deceased Pope were continued for Nine days together in *St. Peters* Chappel with extraordinary ceremony and shew of Devotion. The Cardinals in their courses with their habits of Ceremony and Miters, going up the steps of his Tomb which was there erected for him in form of a Temple raised up on Pillars and abundantly lighted, where they sprinkled him with Holy water, offering both their Incense and their Prayers; over his Tomb on a high Pedestal was placed his Triple Crown, and on the sides of the Pedestal were Four inscriptions to the praise of the deceased Pope; one as from the Roman Church for the peace he had wrought amongst the Christian Princes and the zeal he had infused into them against the Turks. A 2d from the Roman people, for many Arts he had found out tending to their advantage. A 3d from the people under his Ecclesiastical Dominion for their relief by his distribution of Corn, and the lessening of their Gabels. And the 4th by Widows and Orphans by him liberally provided for. The last day of this solemnity was closed with a Funeral Oration which was pronounced by Signior *Augustino Favonini*: his body after the continuance for a year and three days in *St. Peters*, according to custom, is by his Will to be removed thence to *St. Marias the Great*, where his entrails were buried, and there laid into the earth with a plain stone over him and as plain an Inscription.

The Friday following being the 30th Instant in the morning after a Mass of the Holy Ghost, sung by Cardinal *Barbarino* the Dean, and a speech made concerning the future Election by Signior *Arcangelo Adoncelli* a Gentleman of *Pisa*, 26 of the Cardinals went in solemn Procession into the Conclave, and were the same Evening followed by the rest: being met in the Chappel they were to observe the constitutions of the Bull about the election of Popes, and not to alienate any thing belonging to the Church, add. were that night shut up, having first taken leave of the Ambassadors, Princes and Prelates which there attended them.

The same day the Duke de *Savelli* with a Party of 300 Soldiers, set a Guard about the Conclave, other Guard being set about the City, the Gates kept shut and chained, and the Rounds diligently walked as in time of War, to prevent all disturbances.

The next day the Cardinals visited all parts of the Conclave, and took notice of all their Officers, and that day began their first Scrutiny.

On Sunday the Cardinals *Caraccioli* and *Barbarigi* entered the Conclave, and on the Wednesday following Cardinal *Lissa* and *Borromeo*, the whole number of the Con-

clave being at present 62 Cardinals. The Cardinals *Ludovico* and *d'Elis* are not yet entered. The Cardinals *Grimaldi*, *de Rex*, and *de Bouillon*, not yet arrived from France; and 'tis believed, the Cardinals *d'Arragon*, *de Moncada*, and *Portocarrero* cannot arrive timely enough from Spain, though the height of the several Election persuade us the Conclave may have a long continuance.

*Venice* Jan. 3. The last week we were advised from *Ravenna*, that the good ship called *The Redeemer of the World*, which was a little before sent from hence with presents and Moneys designed for the Grand Seigneur and his principal Ministers, was cast away between *Rimini* and *Pasaro*, and only 12 of her Men saved out of 70 that were aboard her, besides several Gentlemen, and other persons passengers, which perished with her. Since this case has been taken to fish for her Lading, which they had recovered to a considerable value, and were now searching after the Moneys, and hoped also to weigh her Guns. I hey had also the good fortune to recover the Body of Signior *Ottavio Labja*, which they have deposited in a Church at *Rimini*, who has by this misfortune put an end to the Voyage he designed for the *Levant*, *Jerusalem*, and other places, for the expence whereof he had taken with him a considerable sum of Moneys.

We have also Advice of several other Shipwrecks, and by the Ruines of some which have been driven to shores have some reason to suspect the loss of a Ship returning home with some of the remaining Forces which had been sent by the Pope for the defence of that place.

General *Barbaro* has happily escaped the late violent tempests, and is safely arrived in *Dalmatia*, landing at *Zara*, where all the Artillery proclaimed his welcome, and is taking possession of his charge, so that we may suddenly expect the return of General *Piuzi* his predecessor in that employment.

The Clergy which were transported hither from *Candia*; having finished their Quarantine, were on Wednesday last admitted to the Colledge appointed for their Reception, and their Reliques received with much Ceremony; About 80 Soldiers of the Brunswick forces which were employed in the service of this Republick at *Candia* having also finished their Quarantine, are dismissed the service with liberty to return home.

From *Candia* we are told, that notwithstanding former reports of the departure thence of the Grand Visier for *Morea*; he still continues his abode there as formerly; but that the Emperor has by fresh Letters invited him to come to *Am*, by the addition of his forces to strengthen him that he might march with a more formidable power into *Constantinople*, to be a greater terror to such as have in his absence disputed his Commands; but that the Visier still excuses himself, by shewing the necessity of his continuance where he is for the security of his new Conquest, and that he should with more readiness obey him in this point which regards only his own honour, did he not know his stay would conduce much more to the service of the Sultan and his Monarchy.

On Monday last arrived here Prince *Ernest* of *Brunswick*, expecting upon the arrival of his Train to depart hence for *Rome*.

*Brussels*, Jan. 9. The last week arrived here a Courier from *Rome*, dispatched by the Colledge of Cardinals to Monseignor *Avoldi* the Internuncio, with a full account of the Popes death, upon which he put himself and Fa-

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mply into mourning, and has since received the Compliments of the Court upon that subject.

The French Officers from *Aeth* and other places of their late conquests make their visits here with much freedom & nor have we any discourse of any sudden war or disturbances many of the French soldiers pretending to desert their Colours go for *Munster*, where they hope to meet with entertainment.

This last week has been mostly spent in Devotions and Thansgivings for the delivery of these Countreys from the infection of the Plague.

On Saturday last the *Sieur Toquet* arrived here from *Spain* and is to be admitted to the Charge of President of the Parliament of *Medines*, he has since been to attend the Constable of *Castille*, and has received the Compliments of his friends upon his promotion.

In *Luxembourg* some progress has been made in the reformation of the forces, and particularly in the Regiments of *Beramben*, *Beaumont* and *de Greange*.

After several conferences and debates, the States of *Artois* have agreed upon the payment of the subsidies demanded of that Province, and upon the number of forces which are to be maintained by them, but the Province of *Hainault* has not yet fixed upon their number, neither is *Brabant* yet come to a resolution upon this point.

This evening was brought in here prisoner from *Lorraine* by the Marshal General and his Officers one Captain *Vander pere*, formerly a Captain of Horse in the Marquis *de Vadens* Regiment, accused of several crimes.

From *Lile* they tell us, that they have made a large place of Arms before the Cittadel which is newly finished, the Gates fixed, and Wall well lined with earth in a condition to receive their Canon.

*Rambourg*, Jan. 10. As yet the Deputies for the considering of the pretensions to the County of *Oldenburg* have not had any conference about that affair, expecting first the arrival of a Commissioner from the Emperour; this Town is much thronged upon this occasion, where are also arrived 12 of the principal Nobility of *Holstein*.

Letters of the 5th instant from *Lipsich* inform us, that Prince *Maurice of Saxony* has by the Emperours Order wanted to be there seized, the person who called himself by the name of Prince *Cigala*, and pretended to be nearly related to the Grand Seigneur, and under that notion had visited *France*, *England*, *Flanders*, *Holland*, *Denmark* and that place; it being now affirmed that he is an Impostor and a Jew, and tis believed will be sent to *Vienna* for a farther examination.

From *Poland* they write, that the King intends to have His Marriage solemnized at *Czestochowa* about the 18th of the next month, to which place the Emperors Dowager intends to conduct her Daughter the intended Queen.

And from *Koningsberg* that Prince *Bogislav Radzivil* died there after very few hours sickness, on the 8th instant, to the great affliction of the protestants in *Poland*, whole great Patron and Protector he was.

From *Vienna* they advise us, that the Emperour has been much distempred with a Double *Tertian* Ague, which has since hindered him from mixing in any publick Affairs, but is upon recovery, to the great satisfaction of His Court.

The Polish Ambassador having seen the Contract of Marriage between the King his Master and the Princess *Eleonora* the Emperours sister, signed by all the parties therein concerned, is returned back for *Poland*, to give the King his Master an account thereof, and of the Emperours resolution that the Princess shall set forwards on her way for *Poland* the 28th of this Instant *January*.

*Naples*, Jan. 21. The discontent of the Nobility and Gentry of this Kingdom are much encreased upon the imprisonment of *Don Cesare* and *Don Antonio Caraffa*, who were supposed to be over-busie in promoting an accusation against *Don Pedro d' Arragon* our Viceroy, who has since given order for the beheading of an Italian Captain with his Son, who have (it seems) had their fingers too much dip in the publick Moneys.

The news of the Popes death was received here with extraordinary sadness, upon the receipt whereof Cardinal *Caraccioli* our Archbishop, ordered all the Bells throughout the City to be rung, the Cathedral to be hung with mourning, and solemn service said for him; which ended, he hastened away for *Rome* to be present at the Conclave for the election of a successor, but upon the way met with a disturbance from the Banditti, who forced him to buy his liberty at the rate of 200 piols in Gold: upon the payment of which sum he obtained from them a promise to rest satisfy'd as well as paid, and to give him no farther trouble in his journey, but tis feared they may not excuse his Baggage at so ealy a rate, which was following the same way.

*Paris*, Jan. 15. The King seems resolved at the beginning of the spring to make a solemn Progress into *Flanders*, and to carry with him the greatest part of his Court, to take a view of the Fortifications and Alterations made by his Order in several places of his late Conquests.

*Hague*, Jan. 16. We are much fallen of late from our apprehensions of any sudden attempts from the Bishop of *Munster*, his Forces being mostly those of his own country, and but few of those new Levies; however fresh Forces are ordered for the security of our Frontier Towns, both on *Flanders*, *Guelderland*, and *Overyssel*, and the *Heer Moris* is gone thither by the States Order, to sound the Intentions of the Bishop.

From *Amsterdam* they tell us, that the *Heer Van der perre*, a person Related to many Magistrates of that and other Cities of the United Provinces was lately accused and convicted there of the Forgery of false Bonds and Obligations from the State, which he had sold to several persons, and was for that crime condemned to lose his Head upon a Scaffold, which Sentence is to be executed on him the 18th Instant, the Scaffold to be hung with black, and the Execution of the other Malefactors deferred for a week longer.

*Brussels*, Jan 18. Count *de Broun*, of the house of *Spinola*, a Knight of the Golden Fleece went the last week to acquaint the Constable of the signing a Couract of Marriage between the Baron his Son and Madamoiselle *de Montmorency*, Daughter to the Prince *de Robec*, since this he fell into a violent disemper, of which after three days time he died on Tuesday last, his body was for two days after exposed in State, and the last night in an open Chariot accompany'd by all the Nobility and Gentry in the City to the Carmelites, where it was deposited unburied, till his Relations can obtain leave from the French to carry him to *Tournay* to be there enterr'd by his Lady.

The Count *de Solre*, another Knight of the same Order is lately fallen ill, with little hopes of his recovery.

On Monday last arrived here the *Heers Vander Vocht* and *Vrybergen* deputed hither from the States-General of the United Provinces, to Treat principally about the composition of all disputes with the States of the Admiralty of *Ostend* in relation to several prizes taken by the privateers of that place during the late wars between *England* and *Holland*.

*Weymouth*, Jan. 8. Here is arrived one vessel of this Port from *Eurdeaux*, and two ships from the *Canaries*, both of them belonging to *Topsam*, but over-shot their Port.

*Dever*, Jan. 10. An English Merchant ship lately returned from the *Canaries* was by the late extraordinary violent wind cast away near *Callis*, but the men saved. One vessel of this place perished off the Buoy in the *Nore*, besides these, we hear of divers other vessels which ran the same fate, but their names not yet told us.

*Deal*, Jan. 12. This day arrived here the two East India ships from *Falmouth*, the *Francis* Frigate from the *Streights* and one other a Merchant ship from the *Canaries*, but made little stay, having a fair wind and good weather.
