It is certain he has receiv'd no Detachment from the Army since the *Battle of Alentejo*. We recruit our Cavalry with the utmost Diligence; and most of the *Horses* in this City, as well as in the other Parts of the Kingdom, are taken into the Service; which will make a considerable Body. The Court has been for some time very anxious for the *Succours* from *Ireland*, which arriv'd on the 8th Instant, after having been 17 Days in their Passage from *Cork*. The Men are all in good Health, and will disembark next Week, in order to march for the *Flanders*, under the Command of the *Marquis de Montandre*. This desirable Reinforcement puts new Life into the People, and confirms the Court in their Resolution of working through their present Difficulties, and exerting themselves with Vigor against the Common Enemy.

It is said the Troops discover a general Alacrity and Assurance of Success from a Confidence in their Leaders, and a Belief that the Subjects of France are dispos'd to fall in with the Measures of his Royal Highness, and rescue themselves from their Oppressions. Advices from Milan of the 11th Instant inform us, That Count Thaur continues his March towards Naples with the Detachment under his Command; and that it was suppos'd he would arrive in the Abruzzo on the 6th Instant, where the People were universally inclin'd to the House of Austria. On the 30th past a Courier arriv'd from Barcelona with Dispatches from King Charles to Prince Eugene, the Contents of which are kept very secret.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Melders, June 20. On Saturday last the Right Wing of the Army made a general March over the Dyic, towards Gronendale: Some Squadrons of the Enemy appear'd; but, after having observ'd our Disposition, they retir'd without attempting any thing. This Day his Grace the Duke of Marlborough review'd the Horse and Dragoons of the Right Wing of the First Line. These of Great Britain appear'd for the First Time with their Colours; and the whole was very complear, and in good order. Baron Spar is order'd from hence to command the Body of Troops in Flanders, in the Place of Lieutenant General Fagel, who is dispos'd to go on. Deserters continue to come over to us in great Numbers. Our Army and that of the Enemy are still in their former Camps.

Hague, June 21. N.S. We hear from Vienna, That the Emperor has resolv'd to offer the Command of the Imperial Forces in Germany to the Elector of Hanover. By our last Advices they were encamp'd at Gemund, and had cast up strong Entrenchments on all sides of them, with a Resolution to expect the Enemy. The Marshal de Villars was still at Stur-gard having laid the whole Principality of Wirtemberg under Contribution. By our best Accounts his Army does not amount to 25000 Men, and is in Number inferior to that of the Empire; so that we have great reason to hope there will be a sudden Check given to his Successes. We have Advice from Paris, That the Dutches of Nemours died on the 16th Instant, in the 85d Year of her Age; and that the several Pretenders to the Government of Neuchatel were laying in their Claims to that Sovereignty. We hear the Subjects are most inclin'd to ravise the Title of the King of Prussia; and that the Cantons of Switzerland, who are very apprehensive of seeing the French establish'd on that side of Mount Jura, will take the State under their Protection till the Right of Succession be decided. A Squadron of Men of War is sail'd from the Texel and the Maeste, to cover the Herring-Fishers, and secure the Commerce of the North. We want two Poets from Italy.
