cessors, is a Blessing as justly calls for our Praises to God, and
our Acknowledgments of Your Majesty's unparalleled Pru-
dence and Care.*

*That this Success may add Peace, Strength and Prosperity, to
Your Kingdom, and to Your Majesty's other Dominions; That Your
Majesty may long enjoy the Fruits thereof; and that all
Your Subjects be ever so united in their Hearts and Resolutions,
to be as true and loyal as the most loyal and most obedient to Your Ma-
jesty, is the fervent Prayer of us, Your Majesty's most loyal and
affectionate Subjects.* Jerley, June 3. 1707.

Her Majesty received very graciously.

June 30. N. S. His Swedish Majesty is so perfect-
ly well, that he lately went into the Lower Lusatia to
review some of his Troops, which are quarter'd there, from
whence he return'd last Friday, and immediately made a Vi-
sitation to King Augustus, who resides here. The Perplexity
of the intended March increases more and more; but the
Field-Marshal Reinschild has given Orders to

the Guben to brew a great quantity of Beer,
and to provide all sorts of Provisions, raises a Belief that
the Army will soon assemble into a general Camp. The
Orders were on their March towards Brabant when
they receiv'd the Duke of Marlborough's Orders, which com-
manded them to the Upper Rhine. Their Route was regulat-
ed yesterday, and we suddenly expect to hear they are near
the Rhine. The Danish Ambassador Monsieur Van Jessen, who
last Year follow'd the Court of King Augustus, as he
represents this of Sweden, has receiv'd Letters of Revo-
cation. He designs to depart as soon as he has had his Au-
thority of Leave of the Two Kings. Baron Groot, Chamber-
lain of the Elector of Hanover, arriv'd here last Night, in
company with Monsieur Van Oberg, who expects to be re-
turn'd to Vienna. The Courier who lately came hither from Vienna
brought Letters from Count Wratislaw, desiring Permission to
return to the King of Sweden, return'd last Night without
any Answer. Last Sunday the Title of King of Po-
merania was omitted in the publick Prayers for King Augustus.

Afternoon he set out for Dresden; and 'tis believed the
Army of Sweden will soon follow, to review some Troops in
the Parts. Letters from Poland of the first Instant inform
us, that the Deputies of Lithuania are arriv'd at the General
Assembly at Lublin, and have propos'd that the Primate should
declare a Vacancy of the Crown, in order to
bring on an Election of a King. The Muscovite Horse
that lie upon the River Vistula have not of late made any
show of Consideration. Their Foot is in Volhinia, where
the Elector has given Orders for pillaging the Lands and Pos-
sessions of Prince Wisniowewski, who has lately declar'd him-
self in Favour of King Stanislaus.

July 2. Tho' the Ministers of Hanover do not ac-
knowledge that their Matter is dispos'd to take upon him the
Command of the German Army, they are very sollicitous to
know with what Troops this Court will reinforce those of
the Emperor at this Juncture. It is generally believed his
Majesty's Highness is not displeas'd with the Invitation to be
Commander of the Imperial Forces, but willing to hear from
the several Princes on what Strength he may certainly de-
pend, before he engages in so doubtful a Conjunction his
good Reputation for Wisdom and Valour. We are very well
satisfied of the Concurrence of this Court in all that may
conduce to the Common Cause. His Prussian Majesty has al-
ready nam'd for the Service on the Upper Rhine the Regi-
ment of Carabiniers of Warftenleben, consisting of 550 Men,
the Royal Regiment of Dragoons of 735, and a Battalion of
Nassau-Dillenburg of 745, the Officers of each inclusive;

the whole amounting to 2030. The Swedish Ambassador is so
highly pleas'd, by reason of his great Age, that the Weight
of his Office fails on the other Minister, who extremely
wishes that the Limits of Pomerania may be settl'd. He
represents it as a Matter of much Difficulty; but is ob-
serv'd to be importunate for the Conclusion of it while his
Majesty is at the Head of an Army in the Neighbourhood.
The Sub-Marshal's Regiment of Horse has Orders to march

out of Pomerania to this Place, where they will receive fur-
ther Orders. The Battalion of Nassau-Dillenburg, which lies
in the Country of Bareith, is to assemble at Blaffenburg;
and the Royal Regiment of Dragoons about Cleves is di-
rected to be in a readiness to march, and expect Instructions
where to join the Imperial Army. There is great Uncertainty
in our Accounts from Poland: But they report from Wilda,
That the Muscovites in those Parts were forming the Siege of
Bychow, to revenge the Affront they had receiv'd from the
Sieur Seimiki. General Bayer had already Orders to attack
the Place; and Prince Galliezin marching with many Thou-
sand Muscovites near Polock and Minsk, was believ'd to
make that Motion with a Design to surprize Seimiki. They
add, That his Czarist Majesty went to Lublin on the 20th of
the last Month, in order to incline the Council to remove
their Session from that Place to Warsaw.

Copenhagen, July 5. The Report which was maliciously
spread here of a separate Peace made by the Emperor with
France, is utterly vanish'd. Some Persons who sent that
News from Ratisbon and Dusseldorp have retract'd the Scan-
dal, and acknowledg'd it groundless. His Majesty is very
much recover'd; but the Season being far advanc'd, his in-
tended Progress is laid aside for this Year. Count Raventlaw,
General of the Foot, was dispatch'd the third Instant with
Orders to make the several Reviews. That at Ringstead,
where there are 7000 Men, was to be on the fourth and fifth.
From thence he is commanded to proceed to the Island of
Fuhnen, and so into Jutland. It is doubted whether he will
go into Holstein, his Majesty having but two Regiments, one
of Cuirassiers, and another of Dragoons, in that Duchy, except
what lie in Garison. Before the General was command-
ed on the Review of these Forces, the Emperor's Resident
had sollicit'd his Danish Majesty to send his Quota to the
Upper Rhine.

Frankfort, July 7. We hear by Letters from the Imperial
Army, That on the 30th past it was resolv'd in a general
Council of War to march towards Philippsbourg, that we
might be in a readiness to pass the Rhine as soon as we are
join'd by the Troops which are advancing towards us from
several Parts. The Enemy had no sooner receiv'd Advice of
our Motion, but they immediately resolv'd to follow us, which
they did with great Precipitation: They gave out that it
was their Design to attack us; but we have reason to believe
that they were afraid of having their Retreat intercepted,
and such Detachments cut off as they might have occasion
to send to any of their Armies, as well as their Country ra-
vag'd, had they continu'd at so great a distance from their
Frontiers. The Marshal de Villars has sent Monsieur de Vi-
vans into the Lines between Croon-Weyssenburg and Lauter-
burg with a Body of Eight Battalions, Three Regiments of
Dragoons, and Four of Horse. His Head-Quarters are at
Durrach, the rest of the Army being post'd at Crezingen,
where it is said they will halt some Days to observe our Mo-
tions. Our Army is at present encamp'd near Philippsbourg,
having the Rhine in our Rear, and a large Morass in our
Front, and the only Avenue which leads to us cover'd by the
Fortress of Philippsbourg. We are going to lay a Bridge of
Boats over the Rhine near Losheim, half a League from
Spire. The Palatine Forces that had join'd the Army are se-
parated from it, and return'd towards Mannheim. Abundance
of Deserters come over to us daily, who receive Passes for
Saxony, with a Design to enter themselves into the Service
of the King of Sweden. We hear that the Troops of Saxony
and Lunenburg are marching with all expedition to reinforce
us, and that the Elector of Hanover has accepted the Com-
mand of the Imperial Army; so that the Face of our Affairs
is very much chang'd; and the Enemy, who so lately
threaten'd to over-run the whole Empire, are now retiring
to their Frontiers, to prevent the Invasion of their own
Country.

From the Camp at Muldert, July 7. His Grace the Duke
of Marlborough, upon Intelligence that the Enemy had form'd
a Design to fire the Magazine at Brussels, has sent two Bat-
talions more to reinforce that Garrison. Reports from the
Enemy's Camp give us reason to hope they have receiv'd
Advice, That the Duke of Savoy and Prince Eugene have
already penetrated into Dauphin.

From the Camp at Muldert, July 11. Our Camp is so well
supply'd with all sort of Necessaries, that we have no Ap-
prehensions of being oblig'd to alter our Situation, but as it may
be thought advantageous to the Service, the Enemy continu-
ing at Gemblours; and having detach'd only Three Bat-
talions and Five Squadrons to Germany, he without any seeming
Intention to decamp.

Hague, July 12. N. S. Letters from Paris say, That a Cou-

their Courier arriv'd with the same Advice. We hear, by our last Letters from the Imperial Army on the Rhine, that they intended to pass that River on the 5th Instant, in order to encamp at Spire. The Marshal de Villars is return'd to Dourlach; from whence we have Advice, that he has detach'd 6000 Horse for Dauphiné. The States of Holland have appointed Monsieur de Nortwick Bailiff, and Dylkgrave of Rhenland, which Office was vacant by the Death of Monsieur Duyvenverde. To Morrow will be publish'd an Order to prohibit the Currency of the French Money-Bills, and the Exportation of Gold and Silver in Specie. It is said, Monsieur Huguetan propos'd this Method of sinking the Credit of France; and a late Accident convinces us how sensible that Court is of the Disadvantages which must arise to them from his Proposal. A Band of Ruffians, who, according to their own Confession, were to have had a Reward of 30000 Pistoles, had engag'd themselves, under the Conduct of one Gautier a French Officer, to bring into France the said Monsieur Huguetan: For the Execution of their Project they had laid in Horses at several Stages between this Place and Aix la Chapelle, under Pretence of conveying thither a distracted Perple of Quality; but with a Design of carrying their intended Prisoner to Namur. The Pensionary having private Intelligence of the whole Affair, order'd Gautier to be apprehended; as also a Servant of Monsieur Huguetan, who had been hir'd to betray his Master. They both confess'd the Fact: And there are Directions sent to the Frontiers, to take the rest of their Accomplishments; which have been so well executed, that they have already seiz'd another of them, besides 14 of their Horses, and a Calash, that were to be employ'd on that Occasion. Our last Letters from Milan say, Prince Eugene had detach'd Four German Regiments, consisting of 8000 Men, to be embark'd at Genoa, and transported to Provence.
