

# The London Gazette.

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Dublin, July 7.

**T**HIS Day his Excellency Thomas, Earl of Pembroke went with the usual Solemnity to meet the Lords and Commons of this Kingdom assembled, in Parliament; and being seated in the Throne, made the following Speech to both Houses:

My Lords and Gentlemen,  
**T**HE Queen, thro' the whole Course of Her Glorious Reign, has not only shown Her great Care for the Preservation of the Liberties of Europe, but has been always intent on whatsoever may contribute to the Good of all Her Subjects; and, to the utmost of Her Power, has endeavour'd to unite them in Love and Affection: And now, in particular, to manifest Her tender Concern for you, of this Her Kingdom of Ireland, She has again call'd you together, to consider of such Laws as may be thought necessary for the further Prosperity of this Her Realm; and, in things to provide for the Security of it against Foreign and Domestic Enemies. And, in order to the attaining of these Blessings, I am commanded by Her Majesty to recommend to You (unanimously amongst your selves; and to inform you, That Her Majesty, considering the Number of Papists in this Realm, would be glad of any Expedient for the Strengthening the Interest of Her Protestant Subjects in this Kingdom.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,  
The Publick Service requiring that several Regiments upon the Establishment should be sent Abroad; I am commanded by Her Majesty to inform you, That She intends to supply the like Number of Forces for the Security of this Kingdom; and I don't doubt, but you will make Provision of the necessary Supplies for Payment of the Army, as well for the defraying the Charges of the Government: And that you may have a perfect View of what is owing, I have order'd the proper Officers to prepare and lay before You an exact State of the Revenues.

My Lords and Gentlemen,  
In order to the attaining and establishing the Safety and Welfare of this Kingdom, I should think my self extremely happy, if, in my Administration, all Matters should be conducted with Temper and Prudence, as may justly intitle You to the Confidence of Her Majesty's Affections: For my own part (tho' a great Honour to serve in this Post) I can propose no Satisfaction to me without Your Happiness and Prosperity; the which I shall sincerely endeavour to promote, and hope (but chiefly by your Assistance) to secure the Good of this Kingdom; and shew, in several Instances, that we are united in our Affections to each other, as well as in Duty to the best of Queens.

### To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

May it please Your Majesty,  
**A**mongst the many inestimable Happinesses we enjoy under Your Majesty's auspicious Reign, we Your most dutiful and loyal Subjects beg Leave to Congratulate Your Majesty upon the glorious Accomplishment of the Union between Your Kingdoms of England and Scotland: A Work too great for Your Royal Predecessors to attain, tho' aim'd at with the most ardent Inclinations and Endeavours imaginable. The Success in this boundless Difficulty, Madam, seem as if Providence particularly design'd it for an Addition to the mighty Blessings Your Subjects have receiv'd since Your ascending the Throne: And as the desired Effects Great Britain will have by it can't yet fully appear, we heartily wish and pray, That Your Majesty's Life and Reign may be long and prosperous; and that Your Majesty may see the glorious Advantages Your united Kingdom will possess by so great and generous an Undertaking. In Testimony whereof, we have caused the Common Seal of the said Corporation to be hereunto affix'd, the Sixth Day of July, in the Sixth Year of Your Majesty's most Auspicious Reign. All which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Leghorne, June 27. N. S. Dr. Newton, Envoy Extraordinary from Her Majesty of Great Britain, arrived here from Genoa the 24th Instant in a Galley of the Republick. During his Residence there, he receiv'd all possible Marks of Esteem, and an immediate Compliance with whatever he propos'd in Behalf of the Queen of Great Britain. The Republick omitted no Occasion of recommending themselves to Her Majesty's Friendship; and the Senate order'd all manner of Provisions necessary for the Fleet commanded by Sir Cloudesly Shovel to be sent on board without Delay. A Felucca came in here yesterday from Naples with an Account, That the Viceroy, finding it was in vain any longer to oppose himself against the universal Inclination of the People, has retir'd with his Treasure and more valuable Furniture to Gaeta; and that all things tended to a Revolution in that Kingdom. This Advice is confirm'd from Naples by another Felucca arriv'd this Morning. The Count de Thaur hath retir'd Rome with 200 Horse, where the Pope seems also to fear a Revolution of the Government by an Insurrection of the People. It is reported, that Cardinal Grimani is excommunicated.

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*Genova, July 11. N. S.* His Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy hath hitherto only kept the Enemy under a continual Suspence and Uncertainty which way his March is intended. He some Days ago sent half of his Household to Saluces, and another half to Yvrea: Each part of his Family being dismiss'd with such particular Orders, as made 'em believe his Royal Highness would certainly come where they were directed to attend. We have just now an Account, that he went as far as Yvrea with all the diligence imaginable; but unexpectedly he chang'd about, and march'd back towards Nice. The French are with great Reason under Apprehensions for Toulon, not having Forces sufficient for the Defence of it: Besides, that it is constantly reported, the People are so ill satisfied with their present Condition, that they will not take up Arms to support their own Oppression. We are to receive 100 Men from Zurich for the Safety of this City, besides the 300 from Berne, who 'tis probable may garrison this Place for the whole Year. The Body of Divines and Professors of our Academy, have return'd the King of Prussia a Letter of Thanks, for the Favour of communicating his Royal Intentions to unite the Lutheran and Reform'd Churches; very much extolling his Majesty for so Pious and Christian a Design. All the Princes who make Claim to the Sovereignty of Neuchâtel are Personally there, or represented by their respective Deputies. The Ambassador from his Prussian Majesty made a magnificent Entry, every way suitable to the Wealth and Greatness of his Master. The Magistrates have order'd a solemn Fast to implore the Blessing and Assistance of Almighty God in their Choice of a Sovereign; and both Magistrates and Citizens have oblig'd themselves by Oath neither directly nor indirectly to receive a Present from any of the Competitors.

*Paris, July 15. N. S.* Our Court was no sooner convinc'd of the Duke of Savoy's Design on Provence, but they immediately turn'd all their Thoughts to the securing of Toulon: For which purpose Orders were given to sink 12 or 15 large old Vessels at the Entry of the Port; but these Directions have been since countermand'd; and it is thought a more proper Method to fortify the Harbour, by planting on each side 100 Pieces of Cannon, and making in the midst of it a Staccado of Six Men of War of between 70 and 80 Guns. Monsieur de St. Pater commands the Land-Forces, and Monsieur Langéron the Marine. Ten Battalions and 15 Squadrons are marching thither out of Languedoc, and will be follow'd by a Detachment of 6000 Men from Monsieur Medavi's Army, who were on their March into Spain by Bayonne. A Regiment of Swiss, and that of Castellau, design'd for the same Service, embark at Chalons on the Saone, in order to fall down by Lions. Our greatest Difficulty is to furnish those Troops with Money, which we are oblig'd to do by inviting the Gentry to deliver their Plate into the Mint. The Province of Languedoc borrow Two Millions of Livres for the King, which are advanc'd by the Republick of Genoa. By our last Intelligence, the Fleet of the Allies was at Oneglia, where they have taken in very great Quantities of Ammunition and Provisions. The Gallies are gone from Marseilles to Toulon; from whence our Letters of the 6th say, some Ships of the Enemy appear'd off the Port. Advices from Naples inform us, the Viceroy wholly despairs of being in a Condition to make a Defence against the Germans, and hath dispos'd all things for retreating with his Effects when the Danger approaches. 'Tis believ'd the Pope will be oblig'd to grant the Investiture of Naples to King Charles.
