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Dublin, July 7.

THIS Day his Excellency Thomas, Earl of Pembroke went with the usual Solemnity to meet the Lords and Commons of this Kingdom assembled, in Parliament; and being seated in the Throne, made the following Speech to both Houses:

My Lords and Gentlemen,
THE Queen, thro' the whole Course of Her Glorious Reign, has not only shown Her great Care for the Preservation of the Liberties of Europe, but has been always intent on whatsoever may contribute to the Good of all Her Subjects; and, to the utmost of Her Power, has endeavour'd to unite them in Love and Affection: And now, in particular, to manifest Her tender Concern for you, of this Her Kingdom of Ireland, She has again call'd you together, to consider of such Laws as may be thought necessary for the further Prosperity of this Her Realm; and, in things to provide for the Security of it against Foreign and Domestic Enemies. And, in order to the attaining of these Blessings, I am commanded by Her Majesty to recommend to You (unanimously amongst your selves; and to inform you, That Her Majesty, considering the Number of Papists in this Realm, would be glad of any Expedient for the Strengthening the Interest of Her Protestant Subjects in this Kingdom.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,
The Publick Service requiring that several Regiments upon the Establishment should be sent Abroad; I am commanded by Her Majesty to inform you, That She intends to supply the like Number of Forces for the Security of this Kingdom; and I don't doubt, but you will make Provision of the necessary Supplies for Payment of the Army, as well for the defraying the Charges of the Government: And that you may have a perfect View of what is owing, I have order'd the proper Officers to prepare and lay before You an exact State of the Revenues.

My Lords and Gentlemen,
In order to the attaining and establishing the Safety and Welfare of this Kingdom, I should think my self extremely happy, if, in my Administration, all Matters should be conducted with Temper and Prudence, as may justly intitle You to the Confidence of Her Majesty's Affections: For my own part (tho' a great Honour to serve in this Post) I can propose no Satisfaction to me without Your Happiness and Prosperity; the which I shall sincerely endeavour to promote, and hope (but chiefly by your Assistance) to secure the Good of this Kingdom; and shew, in several Instances, that we are united in our Affections to each other, as well as in Duty to the best of Queens.

This great Work was always encompass'd with such Difficulties, which in former Reigns were insuperable: But Your Majesty's approv'd Wisdom and Councils are such, that all Your Endeavours, ever employ'd for the Good of Your People, during the whole Course of Your Reign, have been successful. To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

May it please Your Majesty,
Amongst the many inestimable Happinesses we enjoy under Your Majesty's auspicious Reign, we Your most dutiful and loyal Subjects beg Leave to Congratulate Your Majesty upon the glorious Accomplishment of the Union between Your Kingdoms of England and Scotland: A Work too great for Your Royal Predecessors to attain, tho' aim'd at with the most ardent Inclinations and Endeavours imaginable. Leghorne, June 27. N. S. Dr. Newton, Envoy Extraordinary from Her Majesty of Great Britain, arrived here from Genoa the 24th Instant in a Galley of the Republick. During his Residence there, he receiv'd all possible Marks of Esteem, and an immediate Compliance with whatever he propos'd in Behalf of the Queen of Great Britain. The Republick omitted no Occasion of recommending themselves to Her Majesty's Friendship; and the Senate order'd all manner of Provisions necessary for the Fleet commanded by Sir Cloudeffly Shovel to be sent on board without Delay. A Felucca came in here yesterday from Naples with an Account, That the Viceroy, finding it was in vain any longer to oppose himself against the universal Inclination of the People, has retir'd with his Treasure and more valuable Furniture to Gaeta; and that all things tended to a Revolution in that Kingdom. This Advice is confirm'd from Naples by another Felucca arriv'd this Morning. The Count de Thaur hath retir'd Rome with 200 Horse, where the Pope seems also to fear a Revolution of the Government by an Insurrection of the People. It is reported, that Cardinal Grimani is excommunicated.
