Bricionz, June 9. N. S. Our Misfortune at Almanza leth not produced fuch fatal Confequences as we at first apprehended. The Body of Troops which were left in Valencia, to reduce that Kingdom, have attempted nothing of moment but the Siege of Xariva, where they have lost stea Numbers, and are not yet Masters of the Castle. The Duke of Berwick having spent Eight Days in observing the Approaches to Tortosa, did not think fit to make any Attack upon it, but is march'd to join the Duke of Orleans, who had enter'd Arragon with a separate Body. The Enemy in this manner have lost near Seven Weeks without having reap'd such Advantages as they promis'd themselves from ther Visory. In the mean time we have taken all the Precautions we are able to put Tortosa and Lerida into

a good Posture of Defence, and to secure this Kingdom against an Invasion. Our regular Troops, in conjunction with the Miquelets and Militia, are entrench'd among the Passes which lead into it; and we doubt not but we shall make so good Use of the natural Disticulties of the Country, make fo good Use of the natural Difficulties of the Country, as to keep the Enemy at a stand till we receive our expected Reinforcements. The Catalans are animated with a more than ordinary Zeal for the Preservation of their Country, since they find, from the Treatment which the neighbouring Kingdoms have mer with, what Terms they are to expect, who were the first that rescued themselves from a French Usurpation, and the most active Promoters of the Interests of the House of Austria.

There is a new Declaration issued concerning the Money-Bills, which, it is feared, will have no better Effect than the former. The Marquis de Torcy hath written to the Regency of Neuschatel, declaring, that his Masser approves of the Resolution they had taken of continuing Moniteur Melodin for their Governor; and resolves not to interest himself in the Pretensions of any of the Competitors to that Sovereignty. We have Advice however, That Moniteur de Puisieux hath said openly, hat the King expected they should choose into it one of his Subjects. The Envoy of Prussia declares, his Master will use the Authority of his Allies to maintain the Right of the People to a free Election.
