Your Majesty has had the singular Felicity to unite Your Two Kingdoms into One Body, and to take the only sure Method of uniting all Your People to be of One Mind; having in Your Majesty's Wisdom already made it their mutual Interest to agree in these Measures that make for the Common Peace and Prosperity, and in bearing with one another in their Differences in these Things, from which, if it be possible that any Hurt should arise, yet at least none can to any but themselves.

We make no Question, but the same Greatness of Mind, that has carried Your Majesty to make so just an Improvement of the Advantages that is pleas'd Almighty God to give us over Your Enemies, will engage Your Majesty to redouble Your Efforts, where it has pleas'd God to Divine Providence to send us a Check to the Glory of Your Undertakings, till Your Majesty put King Charles the Third into the quiet Possession of France and Spain.

Algiers, June 2. N. S. A Body of our Forces have lately invaded and subdued a Colony of the Arabs that were under the Protection of the Spaniards at Oran, and open'd all the Avenues which lead to that Place. The Dey hath since sent an Army thither to invest it, and intends himself to march at the Head of another to attack it in Form; by which means we are in Hopes of reducing the greatest Town the Spaniards are Masters of on this side the Mediterranean. We have Advice, That the Emperor of Fez hath order'd Alcaid Unhamet Ben Heddou Governor of Lranch, and Alcaffer El-quibier, to march with an Army of 4000 Men in order to reinforce the Troops that lie before Ceuta, and push the Attacks on that Place with all possible Vigour. It is hop'd the Siege will succeed better in the Hands of the present Alcaid, who is young, and of an active Temper, than it did under the Conduct of his Predecessor. We hear, that the Emperor hath finish'd his Admiral Ben Aisha to the Value of 11000 Ducats, for having taken Two British Vessels, contrary to the Treaty with that Nation; and hath deliver'd him into the Custody of the Alcaid of Tangier till he hath paid his Fine, and adjust'd that Affair with the Minister of the Queen of Great Britain.

Leghorne, July 4. Yesterday a Courier pass'd by Pisa in his way to Milan, who left the Imperial Army Four Days since at St. Germano. Six Posts from the City of Naples, whither they were marching without Opposition. The Matter of a Felucca that came hither in Seven Days from Messina says, That Four British Men of War were cruising in the Gulph of Naples, where they had taken Four Barks, one that was laden with Corn, another a Transport-ship full of Soldiers, a third which brought the

Coaches and Equipage of the Marquis de les Balzazes, nominated by the Duke of Anjou Vice-Roy of Naples, and the fourth empty. The same Person gives an Account, That on Whitsunday Five of the Grand Signior's Ships and Two Trigonies, having put out French Colours, landed at Siro near Cape Spartivento in Calabria, and carried off Men, Women and Children, to the Number of 1200 Souls. The Queen of Great Britain's Ships in this Port are preparing to sail, in order to join Sir Cloudesly Shovel; as did Two Days since the Norfolk, and Yesterday the Monmouth and Rye.

Offer'd, July 29. N. S. We have Letters from Toulon of the 16th Instant which advise, That the Duke of Savoy, after having forced the Passage of the Var, was advanc'd to Antibes, where he left 8000 Men to form the Siege of that Place, and continued his March with the main Body of the Army to Toulon; That the Marshal de Tessé had gather'd together what Forces he was able to oppose the Torrent which was breaking in upon 'em; but that the Enemy had made such a Disposition, that if he drew the Troops out of the Passes on the Valley of Aost to his Assistance, the Prince of Hesse-Cassel, who attends their Motions on that side of the head of a separate Army, would have a much shorter March thro' the Country of Nice to reinforce the Duke of Savoy. Our Advices from Paris of the 22d favour these Reports, and say, the King receives frequent Expresses from Provence, the Contents of which are kept very secret; and add, That this Expedition had given a great Damp to all the Diversions of the Court, and struck a Terror through the whole Kingdom.
