*Leipsick, August 10. N.S.* Since the Arrival of Count *Wratisslaw* there have been very frequent Conferences between the Ministers employed in the Mediation and those of *Sweden*, in order to find out Expedients for composing the Differences between the Imperial and Swedish Courts. King *Stanislaus* interposes in this Affair with as much Application as if his Crown depended on the Success of their Councils. But the Ministers of *Sweden* in the last Debate on that Subject made certain Demands, which the Mediators cannot answer till they receive new Instructions. In the mean time the 4 Swedish Regiments remain in *Silesia*, though Count *Wratisslaw* insists upon their being immediately recalled. The Time when the Swedes will march out of this Country is still undetermined: But we are assured their Field-Marshal *Reinschild* has received Orders from the King his Master to be in a readiness the latter End of this Week to march at the Head of a very great Detachment. On Saturday last the University of this City held a publick Act in Honour of the Queen of Great Britain, on Occasion of the happy Union of England and Scotland. All the Foreign Ministers were invited to be of the Audience. The Ceremony opened with a Consort of Musick: After which the Professor *Menhemius*, who is a Member of the Royal Society in *England*, introduced the Performances, which were to follow with an elegant Oration. The Exercises were performed with much Grace and Order. Mr. *Robinson*, the British Envoy, made his Compliments to the Society for so remarkable an Instance of their Veneration and Respect for Her Majesty; and after the whole Ceremony was concluded entertained the Foreign Ministers, the chief Members of the University and City, with several other Persons of Distinction, in a very splendid Manner.

*Copenhagen, August 13.* Letters from *Schonen* bring Advice, That the Swedish Detachments, one of 3000 Men, designed for *Finland*, and the other of the same Number, for *Germany*, were ready to be transported. The Emperor's Resident received yesterday a final Answer, That his Danish Majesty could not give the *Holstein-Contingent*, till the States of the Circle of *Lower Saxony* were assembled, and that Matter determined in its proper Method: But that Minister was at the same time told by the Ministers, That the King of *Denmark* having not paid the Sums due for his *Oldenburg-Contingent* for these two or three Years last past, his Majesty was willing those Sums, which amount to about 70000 Crowns, should be immediately deducted out of the Payment of Subsidies due to him from the Emperor.

*Berlin, August 13.* The Prince Royal is ill of a Fever, which was for some time very violent; but yesterday the Fury of the Distemper seems to abate. One Monsieur Chevalier is arrived here Express from Neufchatel, with Dispatches from Count Metternich, the Prussian Ambassador there, who desires to have the positive Orders of this Court about the Point of Ceremonial between him and the Prince of Conti, and upon some other Matters of Moment. Monsieur Chevalier expects to be sent back from hence by Tuesday next, that he may be at Neufchatel the 24th Instant, before the Tribunal meets again, which was adjourned to the 26th. The Great Treasurer of Lithuania, Sapiens, who fell dangerously ill since his Arrival here from Saxony, died last Night, in the 67th Year of his Age. He is to be embalm'd, and interred in Lithuania. We hear, that Monsieur Bonac, the French Envoy, who hath been long at Dantzick, was going from thence to Warlaw, to wait upon the Czar, and, in his Master's Name, offer a Mediation of Peace between his Czarish Majesty and the King of Sweden. His Prussian Majesty having written to the Electoral of Hanover, in granting him a *Vote* concurrence in the Diet of the Empire, in granting him a *Vote* and *Seat* in that Assembly, in behalf of the City of Meurs, which was lately erected into a Principality, his Electoral Highness hath answered his Majesty in the most obliging Manner, and sent suitable Instructions to his Minister at Ratisbon. We are advised, that Count Zober, passed lately through Francfort on the Oder; so that it is likely he is at present at Sterin. He seemed extremely afflicted, and unable to support himself under the Weight of his present Afflictions. Letters which came in this Afternoon from Warlaw of the 5th Instant tell us, the Czar is perfectly recovered from his late Indisposition, and applies himself to Business with great Vigour. The Parties which were countermanded in his Sickness are to march into Polish Prussia and Great Poland with all Expedition, to execute these Orders they had formerly received. His Majesty of Prussia intends to go next Week to Copenhagen, where there is a great Hunting prepared for his diversion. The Toiles are already set round a large Lake; and his Majesty, with his Attendants, are to be in Boats, and shoot the Game from the Water. The Margrave of Brandenburg-Culmbach, who hath yielded his Right of Succession to Bareith, and other Tenures, to the King, is now in this Court; and his Majesty hath ordered one of his Coaches and Six Horses, and a Gentleman of his Chamber, to attend him during his Stay.

*Hague, August 19. N. S.* Monsieur de Waffenaer is to command as Vice-Admiral in the Place of Monsieur Vanderges, who died on the Coast of Provence: He sets out tomorrow for the Fleet, by the Way of Italy. Our Advices from Hanover inform us, that his Electoral Highness had determined to begin his Journey on the 20th, in order to put himself at the Head of the Imperial Army. The Prince Electoral is fallen ill of the Small-Pox; of which Distemper his Princes is lately recovered. Count Dhona, who was taken Prisoner at the Battle of Almanza, is arrived here, with a French Passport for 6 Months. The Letters which we received to day from Paris report, that there have been no new Attempts made in Provence since their former Accounts; and they give out at Versailles they are only in Apprehension of a Bombardment of Toulon. They add, that the Dukes of Burgundy and Berry are to command the Army in Provence. The States General have resolved to put the Prince of Nassau in Possession of his Command as General of the Foot; he having arrived at the Age in which, by their own Resolution, he is incapacitated to execute the same.
