Lisbon, August 17. N. S.

OUR Troops being gone into Quarters of Refreshment, the Generals have been summon'd hither, in order to find out proper Methods for putting the Portuguese Army under the same Regulation with the Forces of other Nations: To which End the King hath increas'd the Pay of the Officers; and order'd that of the private Soldiers to be continued throughout the whole Year; directing at the same time, That Desertion shall be punish'd with Death. Our Convoy, which was design'd to sail for England on the 7th Instant. is detain'd here, upon Advice, That there are Six French Men of War, from 26 to 72 Guns, cruizing off of this Harbour: They have taken a very rich Dutch Galley, call'd the Postillion of Smyrna, bound from Genoa to this Place, and put the Men ashore at St. Ubes, from whence they are come hither.

Muschatel, August 26. The Three States having met on the 24th. and resolv'd, That none of the Competitors for the Sovereignty should appear at their Tribunal in Person; the Prince of Conti refus'd to comply with that Regulation when it was notified to him, and the Day following presented a Memorial, desiring a Delay might be granted him till he could receive his King's Orders upon the Point in Dispute; because, as the Prince alledg'd, he had His Majesty's positive Commands to be Personally present at the Tribunal. This his Request was refus'd him Yesterday; but to Day, when the Tribunal met again, his Highness presented another Memorial to the same Effect, which, after an Hour's private Debate, hath produc'd an Adjournment to the 6th of the next Month.

Berlin, August 27. The King is return'd from Hunting at Kepnick; and the Court is at present at Charlottenburg, where the Prince Royal still resides. His Royal Highness is not entirely recover'd of his Relapse. We are inform'd, That Monsieur Heyserling, the Prussian Envoy to His Czars Majesty, has in a Memorial made an Apology for some Freedom of Behaviour in the Presence of that Monarch; and that he has excus'd himself to Prince Menzikow on the same Occasion: So that it is believed that Affair will be accommodated, and the Envoy's Revocation suspended; but this Court has not yet declar'd it self upon that Subject. Our last Letters from Saxony say, the Swedes began to move; and our Advices from Wittenberg inform us, that the Swedish Garrison had receiv'd Orders to march. Monsieur Imaelhoffe, the Muscovite Envoy to this Court, who was taken in his Journey from hence towards Poland, is remov'd from Saxony, where he has been a Prisoner for some time, and conducted to Stetin. Letters from Warsaw of the 19th Instant say, That General Benn has Orders to march; but whether towards Prussia, or Great Poland, is uncertain: The Prince of Darmstadt was to follow. They write from Lublin, of the 14th; That on the 11th, the Day appointed for resuming the Dyets, the Bishop of Cujavia, and some others met; but the greatest Part of the Senators and Deputies being absent, the Assembly was adjourn'd to

the Thursday following: Since which Time, the Crown-General, the Marshal of Lithuania, the Crown-Swordbearer, and Crown-Treasurer, were arriv'd. Monsieur Prebendow, the Great Treasurer of Poland, went last Saturday Night towards Saxony. 'Tis said he undertook that Journey to make his Submission to the King of Sweden and King Stanislaus, in order to an entire Reconciliation. The Recredentials of Monsieur Ashfeld, the Danish Envoy, were dispatch'd and transmitted to him last Post. The Present design'd for him, which is an Agraffe of Diamonds, and a Diamond Buckle for an Hat, valued at 15000 Crowns, is deliver'd to his Agent here.

Copenhagen, August 30. The Birth-day of the Queen Consort and the Princess Royal was celebrated at Yagersberg on the 28th. In the Morning Her Majesty and Her Royal Highness receiv'd the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and of the Persons of Quality of both Sexes belonging to the Court; and in the Evening were entertain'd with a noble Firework at Guldenuind, a pleasant Country-Seat, near the Seaside, where a magnificent Banquet was prepar'd for the whole Court. The British Squadron, under the Command of Rear-Admiral Whetstone, sail'd from the Sound last Sunday, being bound Homeward, and having under Convoy a Fleet of Merchant-Ships from the Baltick. The last Letters from Stockholm bring Advice, That the 6000 Recruits, consisting of 1000 Horse and 4000 Foot, were ready to embark on the Transport-Ships which are to convey them to Stralsund and Stetia, from whence they will march to join the Swedish Army.

Leipsick, August 31. The Imperial Minister, who hath been detain'd in this City by reason of some new Demands of the King of Sweden upon the Emperor, hath omitted nothing which could contribute to the renewing a good Correspondence between the Two Courts; and, in all Appearance, that important Affair, from which so ill Consequences have been apprehended, will very suddenly be brought to a happy Conclusion. His Swedish Majesty, with the Troops which are still in this Country, is preparing to follow, within Five or Six Days; those that are march'd. We hear from Dresden; That King Augustus hath been much indispos'd for some Time; but that His Majesty is resolv'd to visit the King of Sweden, when he hears that he will pass the Elbe. The 29th Instant they began, by Order of the King of Sweden, to repair the Fortifications of the Castle of this City, which have been damag'd by the Swedish Garrison; and as soon as that Work is finish'd, the Castle will be deliver'd to the Officers of King Augustus.

Paris, September 2. By a Courier who came from Toulon on the 25th, and arriv'd here on the 30th, of the last Month, we are inform'd, That the Bombardment had done much more Damage to the Place than was at first reported, above 300 Houses being shatter'd, and as many burnt to the Ground: That Ten Ships were destroy'd in the Harbour, besides the Two formerly mention'd, and several others render'd wholly unserviceable: And that Fifteen Men of War had been sunk, which they fear'd could

could not be weigh'd. On the 23d the Duke of Savoy arriv'd at Pignan, Eight Leagues from Toulon; and on the 25th pass'd the Argents near Frejus, Prince Eugene commanding the Rear. The Troops which were detach'd out of Flanders to serve in Provence, being now in Burgundy, are countermanded, and it is said they will be sent to reinforce the Marhal de Villars. The Duke of Berwick was come to Marseilles, on his Way to Toulon, but there met with Orders to return into Spain. Twelve Battalions and Six Squadrons, which were on their March from thence, were also commanded back. The King appears very much displeas'd at a late Brief receiv'd from the Pope, on Occasion of His Majesty's exacting Money of the French Clergy without the Concurrence of the Apostolical Chair.

From the Camp at Detegem, Sept. 5. On Saturday the 3d Instant the Army march'd from Attre, and having pass'd the Dender over several Bridges made for that Purpose near Ysiers, encamp'd at Nèderbraekel, where we join'd the Artillery and heavy Baggage; from thence we continued our March Yesterday to Ecname on the Schelde, which River the Artillery and Baggage pass'd Yesterday, as the Army did this Morning, a little below Audenarde, and came to this Camp, with the Right at Outegem, and the Left near this Place. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough, upon our passing the Dender, sent from the Army to Brussels two Regiments of Foot and 200 Horse; besides which, there will be a further Detachment of Horse and Dragoons sent thither in few Days, for the Security of that Place; while the Army is in Flanders. The French give out, they will come to the Camp d'Espierre; but 'tis not believ'd they will venture so far.

Brussels, September 5. Letters from Paris acknowledge, That Toulon hath very much suffer'd by the late Bombardment; and that the Two Forts of St. Louis and St. Marguerite are entirely ruin'd. His Excellency Don Quiros hath receiv'd from Milan Letters of the 24th of the last Month, which inform him, That the Duke of Turin hath declar'd for King Charles, with the Tén Gallies under his Command, Four of which belong to Naples. These Vessels will very much facilitate the Reduction of Gaeta, which is batter'd by Fifty Cannon and Five Mortars. The Kingdom of Sicily is universally dispos'd to submit, and only waits for the Appearance of some Troops of the Allies to declare for King Charles. By other Advices, which his Excellency hath receiv'd from Spain, we hear, That Denia hath withstood 4 Assaults, wherein the French have lost 4000 Men. Letters from Paris inform us, That the Dutchess of Anjou was deliver'd of a Prince at Madrid the 25th of the last Month.

Hague, Sept. 6. N. S. We hear from Paris, That the Duke of Savoy had receiv'd no manner of Loss in his Retreat from Toulon; and that the Fleet sail'd from before that Place on the 23d. The same Letters add, That the Damage which the Town and Ships had sustain'd was so industriously conceal'd, that as yet they had no just Account of it. Our last Advices from Saxony assure us, That the Differences between the Emperor and the King of Sweden were wholly terminated; and that His Swedish Majesty was preparing to enter on his March for Poland. They write from the Upper Rhine, That the Elector of Hanover was expected at Franckfort on the 6th Instant. Monsieur Schultz, who commands the Danes under the Duke of Wirtemberg, has receiv'd his Dismission from the King of Denmark, according

to his own Request, in order to serve His Czarian Majesty in Quality of Velt-Marthal.

Kensington, August 30. Her Majesty and his Royal Highness came hither on Thursday Morning, and this Day return'd to Windsor.

Whereas the Men belonging to Her Majesty's late Ship the Hampton-Court were some time since order'd on board the Salisbury; but she being now Maimed, His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c.
