Lisbon, August 26. N. S.

TH E Marquis de Fronteira, being very much indispos'd, has obtain'd the King's Leave to lay down the Command of the Army; which His Majesty has been pleas'd to confer on the Conde de Alvor. All Things continue quiet upon our Frontiers.

Venice, August 25. We hear from Naples, That the Duke of Atri hath still a Body of Troops in Abruzzo; but that he has made Proposals of Submission to Count Martiniz, which have been rejected. Great Quantities of Plate, belonging to the late Viceroy and Partizans of the Duke of Anjou, which were conceal'd in Convents, have been discover'd and seiz'd. We hear likewise, That several Letters had been intercepted, by which it appear'd that a Conspiracy was carrying on by some of the Religious Orders against the House of Austria; but that the Leaders in it being sent out of the Kingdom, the Influence they might have had on the People hath been seasonably prevented. Count Martiniz hath receiv'd Orders to send a Detachment of Troops into Catalonia; if the Duke of Savoy shall have no Occasion for them. There are several Letters from Turkey, which say, the Janizaries have depos'd the Grand Seigneur, and set his Nephew upon the Throne, who is a Youth of about Sixteen Years of Age, and is to act under the Direction of Four Vissers during his Minority: But this Advice not coming from Constantinople, we cannot wholly depend upon it. This City is very uneasie at the Account we have lately receiv'd of a dreadful Pestilence that rages at Viarbo, which has already swept away great Numbers of People; and is said to have been occasion'd by the draining of a Lake. The State hath sent thither to be inform'd of the particular Condition of that Place, and in the mean time have prohibited all Correspondence with the Inhabitants.

Berlin, Sept. 1. The Count de Maffey, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Savoy to this Court, had Yesterday his Private Audience of Leave, and designs to be going from hence in few Days, having receiv'd the Duke his Master's Orders to return to the

Army in Brabant. Monsieur Schlundt, Colonel of the Artillery, who is Prisoner at Spandaw, hath been brought to his Tryal before a Court Martial; which hath condemn'd him to lose his Employments, and remain in Prison during the King's Pleasure. The Countess Piper, upon her Arrival here, having desir'd to know when she might have the Honour of waiting on the King, His Majesty was pleas'd to come to the Apartment of the Grand Chamberlain's Lady, where he understood she was to dine, and honour'd her with his Company at Table. After Dinner His Majesty invit'd the Countess to his own Apartments, where he oblig'd her with the Sight of his Crown and Jewels, and at her taking Leave presented her with a Bracelet of Diamonds. By Letters from Warsaw of the 28th of August we hear, That the Dyet at Lublin was adjourn'd again to the 22d. Deputies from that Assembly have solicited the Czar to recall the Orders he had given to General Henske, for burning and ruining the Estates of the Partizans of Sweden in Great Poland; which His Czarish Majesty comply'd with, to remove some Jealousies that had been conceiv'd of his designing to make a general Ravage through the whole Kingdom.

Leipsick, Sept. 3. The King of Sweden left his Head Quarters at Ransstadt about Break-of-day on the First Instant, without having communicated to any of his Domesticks his Design to march till very few Hours before the Trumpets sounded to Horse. His Majesty arriv'd that Day at Walkenwitz, where Count Wratislaw presenting himself, the Treaty between the Emperor and His Majesty was mutually sign'd and exchange'd before the Ministers of the Mediation. His Majesty is advancing by slow Marches directly towards Poland, intending only to halt in Silesia till he receives the Emperor's Ratification of the Treaty, with which Count Wratislaw is gone Post to Vienna. His Majesty having declar'd that no Foreign Minister should attend him in his present Expedition, Monsieur de Buzenval and the Count of Monasterole, the French and Bavarian Envoys, offer'd to lay aside their Characters, and follow the King as Volunteers; but His Majesty rejected that Proposal.

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Paris, Sept. 5. We hear the young Prince of Asturias is to be baptiz'd by the Name of Louis, having been born on St. Lewis's Day, and His Majesty is to be his Godfather. This Day the Ambassador of Spain makes a magnificent Entertainment, to celebrate his Birth; which will be accompanied with Variety of Musick, and concluded with Illuminations and Fireworks. There are the like publick Demonstrations of Joy preparing in many Parts of the City; but the great Difficulties under which the People labour for Want of Money, hath left them very little Relish for such Diversions. The whole Revenue of this Year being long since expended, and the Funds of the Years 1708 and 1709 being already anticipated by Loans and Assignments, the Ministry are under inexpressible Complexities for raising Money, and supporting the Publick Credit. A Courier who left Provence on the 28th brings Advice, That the Duke of Savoy was to repats the Var on the 30th, and that 6000 Men were posted there to secure his Passage; so that we despair of giving him any Disturbance in his March. The Duke of Orleans is disposing all things for the Siege of Lerida; and the Court not being able to supply him with Money for that Enterprize, his Royal Highness hath sent for all his Jewels from hence, with Design to mortgage them at Madrid for a Million of Livres. We hear, That, besides other Damages sustain'd in Provence, the Enemy's Fleet, while they lay at Hieres, had destroy'd the King's Salt-Works about that Place; and that great Quantities of Salt had been carry'd to the Country of Nice on board some Transport-Ships, which the Duke of Savoy had desir'd the Admiral of the British Fleet to employ for that Purpose.

From the Camp at Helbin, Sept. 8. Yesterday the Army commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough march'd in Four Columns from Pelegem to this Camp, having the Right at Rollegem, and the Left near the Schelde, a small Distance from this Place. The Enemy, who had given out That the Reason of their Retreat from the Camp of Cambron, and pressing their March in an extraordinary manner towards Tournay, was in order to possess themselves of the Pont d'Espierre; upon Notice of our passing the Schelde, and advancing to this Camp, pass'd that River on Seven Bridges above Tournay, the 6th at Night, and retir'd behind the Marque, where they are now encamp'd, with their Right at Pont à Trefin, and their Left at Lille. Baron Sparr has Orders to march to Morrow, with the Detachment of Six Battalions and Eight Squadrons under his Command, from Courtray, to Haldwyn near Menin.

Hague, Sept. 9. N. S. Yesterday a Person was seiz'd here, by Order of the Government, for being an Accomplice in the Design against Monsieur Hugetan; and 'tis said the Tryal of those Criminals is to come on very suddenly. Monsieur Ducker, Envoy-Extraordinary from the new Bishop of Munster, had Yesterday his Publick Audience of the States-

General; being conducted to it with the usual Ceremonies. The Confirmation of an Agreement between the Emperor and King of Sweden is receiv'd here with general Satisfaction among all the Foreign Ministers, as well as the Inhabitants of this Country.

Whereas the Men belonging to Her Majesty's late Ship the Hampton-Court were some time since ordered on board the Salisbury; but she being now Maimed, His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c. Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, &c. is pleas'd to order, That all the Foremast-Men, belonging to the said Ship Hampton-Court, which are lately returned from France, do forthwith repair on board Her Majesty's Ship Oxford, now in the River Medway, and suddenly expected at the Buoy of the Nore, to serve in her; where they will be paid the Wages due to them in the Hampton-Court, before the said Ship Oxford sails from the Nore.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c. Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. is pleas'd to direct, That all the Men belonging to Her Majesty's Ship the Chatham, at Chatham, do forthwith repair to their Duty on board her at that Place; otherwise they will be taken up and tryed as Deserters: Orders having been given for paying the Wages due to them before the said Ship sails from the Buoy of the Nore.
