# REFERENCE TO THE NATIONAL BOARD FOR PRICES AND INCOMES

Prices of Household and Toilet Soaps, Soap Powders and Soap Flakes, Soapless Detergents

Over the past year the manufacturers' recommended prices of a wide range of household and toilet soaps, soap powders and flakes, and soapless detergents were increased by 8 per cent. to 12½ per cent. Some further increases have been announced in the course

of the last month.

The Government understand that these increases The Government understand that these increases have been considered necessary by the manufacturers largely as a result of continuing increases in their costs of production. In view, however, of the aggregate amount of the increase in the price of these household commodities over the past year, the Government consider that it is in the national interest that the increases should be investigated by the National Board for Prices and Incomes in order to establish publicly the justification for them.

The Board are accordingly requested to put in hand the necessary enquiries.

### Road Haulage Charges

April, the Road Haulage announced that it had advised members in favour of an increase of 5 per cent. in their rates from 1st June. The justification for this recommended increase was stated to be the effect on hauliers' costs of the Budget increase in vehicle excise duties and of the increase of 6 per cent. in minimum wage rates proposed by the Road Haulage Wages Council,

This recommendation for an increase in rates followed two others in the preceding seven months, one of 5 per cent. in September 1964 and the other of 2½ per cent in November 1964.

The Government understand that recommended increase by the Peal Haylage Association are

increases by the Road Haulage Association are not automatically adopted by their members, but that road haulage rates continue to be subject, in the usual way, to negotiation with customers. Nevertheless, the fact that an increase of a certain size has been recommended by the Road Haulage Association must influence the new rates proposed by individual hauliers. In view of the importance of road haulage as an element in the cost of manufacture and distribution of so wide a range of goods for the home and export markets, the Government consider that it is in the national interest that the justification for the increases recommended to their members by the Road Haulage Association in September 1964, November 1964 and April 1965 should be investigated by the National Board for Prices and Incomes.

It is also desirable that the Board should enquire

into the increases in their rates actually made by individual hauliers following the recommendations.

The Board are accordingly requested to put in hand the necessary enquiries with the Road Haulage Association and with such of their members as may be considered desirable.

### Prices of Bread and Flour

On 2nd November 1964, the retail price of the standard  $1\frac{3}{4}$  lb. loaf as recommended by the principal plant bakers was increased by 1d.; the increase was from 1s. 1½d. to 1s. 2½d. for the unwrapped loaf and from 1s. 2½d. to 1s. 3½d. for the sliced and wrapped loaf.

The Government understand that this increase

The Government understand that this increase was necessitated by accumulated cost increases, particularly increased wages, since the previous price increase in December 1963. Bread is however a staple food and in view of the importance to their general policy for prices and incomes of stability in the price of basic foodstuffs, the Government consider that it is in the national interest that the justification for the increase in November and the present level of prices of standard bread should be investigated by the National Board for Prices and Incomes and made publicly known. It will also be desirable to include within the scope of the investigation an examination of the present level of flour tion an examination of the present level of flour prices so far as this may be relevant.

The Board are accordingly requested to put in hand the necessary enquiries.
