

veral of the Enemy's Parties being come on this side the Rhine, which was confirm'd at Grave, made his Grace alter his intended Route, and pass through this City. His Grace has been receiv'd and treated in every Place he came through with all the Marks of Respect imaginable. To Morrow he pursues his Journey as far as Weert, about 50 Miles from hence. The Elector Palatine is now at his Country-Seat at Bamberg, and intends to meet his Grace in his Way to Brouck. The Duke designs to be at Mayence on the 21st, and to return with the same Expedition with which he goes thither, either to the Army or the Hague, according to the Intelligence he receives here in his Return.

Brussels, October 22. N. S. The French Army, which was encamp'd near Lille, separated the 20th into Winter-Quarters: One part of them march'd towards Cambrai, where the Garrison of Namur was expected yesterday. Most of their Horse are gone for Picardy and Normandy, the being great Plenty of Forage in those Parts; and the rest distributed along the Frontier. The Wallons and Bavarians in the Service of the late Electors of Bavaria and Cologne are posted in the Duchy of Luxemburg, and in several Places of the Bishoprick of Liege; between the Sambre and Meuse: The Advice from Mons say, That several Regiments which are weak will be broken, and incorporated into others. The Confederate Army continues encamp'd at Aiche, but will march into Quarets upon his Grace's Return from Germany, who is expected back the 28th. The States of Brabant have agreed to furnish 8000 Sacks of Oats, to prevent the Disorders which the Troops might otherwise commit in foraging. Letters from Paris of the 21st Instant inform us, That an extraordinary Courier arriv'd there on the 18th, with Advice, That on the 4th the Town of Ciudad-Rodrigo was taken by Storm; and that the Marquis de Bay, after having left a sufficient Garrison in that Place, march'd the next Morning in order to relieve Moira, which is belieg'd by the Portuguese. Those Letters add, That a Courier was likewise arriv'd from the Duke of Orleans, giving an Account, That the Turkish were open'd before Lerida on the 2d Instant, within 50 Paces of the Wall of the Town; but they make no mention of any great Progress made in that Siege, when the Courier came away on the 8th.

Newmarket, October 4. This Day Dr. Balderston, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Cambridge, accompanied by Heads of Collegés, Doctors, Proctors, and many others, waited upon Her Majesty; and being introduc'd by his Grace the Duke of Somerset, their Chancellor, made a Speech, full of Duty and Affection to Her Majesty's Sacred Person and Government: To which Her Majesty was pleas'd to return a most gracious Answer. And they were afterwards, by Her Majesty's Order, splendidly entertain'd by the Board of Green-Cloth.
