E have received an Account of the taking of Ciudad-Rodrigo by Assault, in the following Manner: The Marquis de Bay, after having press'd the Siege for several Days, and reduced the Place by geat Extremities, sent a Trumpet to the Gormor, with a Summons to furrender, requing an Answer in 3 Hours; whereupon the Governor call'd a Council of all the Officers, who met in the Castle, to debate apon the Subject. In the mean time the Marquis de Bay ordered 400 Men to attempt the Breach, who came to the Wall without being discovered, and finding but a small Body to oppose them, forcd the Passage, and entred the Town, having put to the Sword about 50 or 60 common Soldiers in the first Fury of the Assault. They were quickly follow d and supported by fresh Detachments of the Spanish Army, who oblired the Governor and Officers, with the Garilonthat was left, to furrender at Discretion. This Action, according to the Representation of our Officers, very much reflects on the Honour of the Marquis de Bay, who attacked them before the Time was expired which he had allow'd them for an Answer to his Demand. Our Army that was before Moura, hearing that the Marquis de Bay, after having taken Ciudad Rodrigo, had passed the Tagus with Six Regiments of Horse, and would soon be joined by Four more from Andalusia, and Iwo that were near Badajos, retired from before that Place without having broken Guadiana, and are now encamped between Elvas and Olivença, in order to hinder the Marquis de Bay from making any Incursion into Portugal. The Autumnal Rains have already begun to fall; so that, in all Probability, there will be no further Action on

either Side this Year; and our Generals are ordered to distribute the Troops into their Winter Quarters as foon as the Enemy have Vice-Admiral Wallenger left the Field. arrived here with his Squadron the 19th Instant in the Morning; and in the Afternoon Captain Elways, with 6 British Men of War and a great many Transports under his Command, which are designed for Great Britain with the first Convoy from hence. By the freshest Advices we have from Catalonia we hear, the Enemy have opened their Trenches before Lerida, the Prince of Hesse being in the Place with a strong Garison of Britains and Dutch. My Lord. Galway was endeavouring to engage the whole Country to take up Arms, and making all possible Preparations to oblige the Enemy to raise the Siege. By Letters of a later Date from Alicant we hear, That the Miquelets were drawing together in a great Body, in order to join feveral Regiments of Militia, with a De-fign to make an Irruption into Arrayon by the Way of Balbastro, and by that Means to divert the Duke of Orleans from his Enterprise upon Lerida. Some Letters also add, That it was generally thought his Royal Highness would be very glad of a Pretence for the raising of the Siege of that Place; having written feveral preffing Letters to the Courts of France and Spain, for fresh Recruits of Men and Supplies of Ammunition. The Caralonians appear more zealous than ever in the Interest of King. Charles; and feem resolved to preserve. their Liberties against the Invasion of the Enemy, or perish in the Defence of them. They are not a little animated to those Refolutions, by the Affurances they have received of being supported by speedy Succours from Italy.

Falmouth, Octob. 25. Yesterday arrived here Sir William Jumper, in Her Majesty's Ships the Lenox, Captain Johnson, in the Valeur, and Captain Sanson, in the Phosphare.

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
