Plymouth, Ian. 21.

N Wednesday last arrived here 6 small Ships from Ireland, their Lading Hides, Tallow, and Butter; two of them intend to unlade here, the rest of them bound for Holland, and other parts. Yesterday put in here a ship of London from Lisbonne, and another of Yarmouth, both of them Laden with Oring's and Lemmo s. One ship of London, and may put in here with the sit wind.

Dance Law of This last night about the Clock

Dover, Ian. 25. This last night about ten of the Clock his Excellency the Lord Falconbridge sailed hence in the

Merlin Yacht for Callis, with a fair VVind.

In the late Storm were cast away between Callis and Eollogue two Dutch Merchant Ships, with their Ladings of Vvine and Brandy; one a Vessel of 300 Tuns, the other of 80 Tuns, but the Men escaped to Land. Several ships are put in here by contrary VVinds.

Lisbonne, Dec. 23. The 15 hinftant the French man of war which brought over the Count de Schomberg from Rochelle, went out to sea intending for st Christophers, but we are fince advised that this ship is cast eway by some missfortune upon our coasts, and about 30 of the men lost.

The 17th instant, Sir Edward Sprage with the Dragen and a Ketch came into this River to clearle, and the next day the Warwick and Garland two other of his squadron with one Fireship naving, conducted a Fleet of about 40 sail of Merchant thips to the Northwards, and given chace to 7 Turkish men of War, which their soulness would not give them leave to reach; Two of these men of War may in sew days put out again to sea for the security of our Merchants.

Four lusty ships are here sitting up for the Indies and many hands employed about them, but the want of Moneys gives us reason to doubt they will scarcely be ready to put to sea this sollowing Spring as was intended.

Madrid, Dec. 27. The Queen Regert went some days fince to the Church of Our Lady d' Attoche, where she heard a solemn Mass by way of Thansgiving for her re-

covery from her late fickness.

The Queen has ordered four men of war to be sent from Calis to the Isle of Sardignia with soldiers to the affistance of the Viceroy, the Islanders being there inclining to oppose him, especially those who had formerly their hands in the death of the Viceroy his predecessor.

The King enjoyes a perfect health, and daily delights birafelf in his Exercises, wherein he is accompanyed by

the young Marquis de Mortara.

The Charge of General of the Sicilian Gallies is conferred on the Marquis de Cartanajerta, Son to the Cardinal de Moncada; and his Charge of Captain in the Regiment of Guards given to Prince Lodowick de Piombino, who is now at the Court.

Upon the arrival of the Newes of the Popes death, Cardinal Portocarrero was immediately fent for from Toledo, and ordered with all diligence to haften away for Rome, to be present at the Conclave for the new Election; and several Courriers dispatcht away, with Orders and Instructions for the Marquis de Astergas our Ambassadour.

Rome, 7a. 4. The French Cardinals are here arrived with the Duke de Chaulnes, Ambassisdor extraordinary from His most Christian Majesty; the Cardinals are entred into the Conclave, where Cardinal de 1 ouillon had the Ceremony performed of Opening his mouth according to the usual Form and Custome.

The Factions are great, and as yet little appearance of a sudden agreement in the election of a new Pope, the French interest is much advanced upon the arrival of these Cardinals from France, who came well furnish with instructions and have already gained to their parry divers of the Squadtonists; the Spanish section which hitherto has seemed the most powerful, leaves nothing undone for the advantage of their interest, but expect with impatience farther instructions from Spain by the Cardinal de Porto Carrero who is on his way hither. The faction of the Rospigliosi has upon the late match between Don Gio. Battista Rospigliosi and Segnota Pallavicina, joyned their interests with the Barbarini, and are thereby grown very considerable.

The Cardinals Chigi and Rofetti are lately fallen into a milunderstanding, which has proceeded to sharp language, the latter telling the other, that he ought not to expect to bear so great a sway in this, as he did in the former Conclave, and to carry the election at his pleasure.

Cardinal Azzelino some days since visiting Cardinal Albici at his Cell or Apartment, after some discourse told him that it was his design to contribute his best endeavours to raise him to the Papacy 3 whereupon Albici asked him what Reward he would expect if his design should prove successful; who answering, that he desired nothing, the other immediately reply'd, that he could not but take this as an argument, that whatsoever he pretended 2 he had really no intention to raise him to that Dignity.

Rome, Ian. 11. Yesterday it was confidently reported, that Cardinal Vidoni would be chosen Pope, but it now appears to the contrary. This day upon a Scrutiny it was found, that Cardinal Albici had 19 suffrages, Cardinal

Benvisi 20, and Cardinal d' Elci 25.

The last night a fire happened in the Cardinal of Heffe's apartment, which occasioned so great a confusion in the Conclave, that the Cardinals were thinking of breaking down the walls, and deserting the place, but in little time affishance was given, and the fire happily quenched.

Malaga, Ian 6. Here is larely fentante this Port the Kirg. David, which some time fince had the ill fortune to be engaged by the Algier Pirits off he Cape St. Vincent, where, after three dayes flout relistance, from one of their Men of VVarr he was laid aboard with about 70 Moores, who were all of them either killed upon the Deck, or foreced over-board into the Sea and drowned; but the same day meeting with five more of those Pirates, was forced to Surrender. After some sew dayes Captain Kempthorne redeemed him, but falling afterwards among 6 of the Corfairs, whom the Captain engaged for several houres, and in the end gave chase to, this Vessel sell again into the Enemies hands, but at the entring the Streights, was retaken by Sir Thomas Allen, and sent into this Port much torn, and full of VVater.

Dantzig, Ian. 15. From Warfaw we have Letters of the 3d Instant, which inform us of the arrival there the day before of Sir Peter Wich, Envoy from His Majesty of Great Brittain, who departed hence the 2t past, and was on his way entertained by the Magistrates of Thorne with

great Civili y and Respect.

The King of Polind is yet at Warfan, where he may continue all this Monerh, and, at the beginning of the next go thence to Czentochom, that eminent place of D votion, where he intends to lolemnize his Marriage with the A ch-Datchels the Emperours Sifter.

The Poles seem very apprehensive of a Warr with the Turks, in fo much, as a general Mandate is fent out to the Nobility, to put themselves into a Military Posture, and to be ready to March upon the first Orders.

On the First Instant the People of Thorne were put into superdictious apprehensions, upon the Appearance of 3 Suns about Eleven of the Clock in the Morning, at a time. when the Sky was to all appearance clear, and free from

Clouds, and the weather cold and frofty.

The Body of Prince Radzivil, whose sudden death in his Coach gave an occasion of a Report, and a Suspicion of his being Poylon'd, has been fince open d, and all perone convinced of the fellenels of the Rumour, his in-ward parts appearing found, his Physi ins attributing his Death to a Catarth, which cheacked him.

Hambourg, In 24. The Commissioners are not yet entred upon Aldrewsen about the Pretentions to the

County of Oldenbourg.

From Franckfort they write, That great Differences and Diffurbances are lately rifen in the Neighbourhood between the Counts of Hanaw; the chief of which Family had, contrary to an Agreement between the Brothers, alienated some of the Dependences on the County of Muntzerberg; and was engaging Liebtemberg to the Dake of Lorrain for a confiderable fumm of Moneys: VVhich to prevent, the other Princes of the same Family had taken possession of that County, and had put strong Garrisons into the principal Towns; both parties endeavouring to gain the Neighbouring Princes to their parties. But, the Elector of Brandenbourgh, and the Landtgrave of Heffe are interpoling in this Affair, and 'tis hoped may prevent any faither Disturbances.

Paris, Jan. 29. A great man of War built by His most Christian Majesties Order for a voyage into Persia, Madagascar and other parts in those seas, being a thip of 800 Tuns and carrying 85 Guns, failed lately out of the River from Havre de Grace with internion to get to the Rendezvous at Port Louis in Bretagne, but was by a sudden gust of wind driven on those and staved in pieces, the Lieutenant and all the men lost, only the Captain escaping to

fhoar.

His Majesty at present enjoys his health and has not had any late his of his diftemper in his head, he feenis at prefent in suspence, whither he shall first go into Flanders to visit his new Conquests, or to Bourbon to drink the waters which his Physicians have prescribed him for his health, bur seems rather inclinable to the former.

Hague, Ian. 31. The Heers Vander Toche and Vryberghen, the States Deputies employed to the Constable of Castille at Bruffels, have with much earnestness sollicited the Constable of Castille to come to a resolution in point of giving satisfaction to the Swedes; whose negotiation has had fo good an effect, that an Express yesterday arriwed here from the Constable, affuring us, that those affairs which concern the Triple alliance are in logood a poflures that there is no doubt to be made but that the Swedes will luddenly have payment made to them of the Moneys which were fome moneths fince returned from Spain to Amferdam.

The faid Deputies were likewise ordered to demand sarissaction for several insolencies and violencies committed by the Spanish soldiers in the Country about Valkenbourg, where they fer fire to feveral houses, and in the Majoralty of Boisteduc, where they plundered a Ministers house, of which they have not yet given an account-

Monsieur Guldenlewthe Danish Ambassador serived here from England the 27th instants and intends the next week to depart from hence on his return homewards.

The Corlairs of Barbary being numerous at lea and much disturbing our Trade in the Mediterranean, the Admiralties have ordered several ships to be fitted up to be lent to the Streights for the lecurity of our Merchants, and tis faid the Command of this Squadron will be difpoled of to Vice-Admiral Vant Chent.

From Munster we are told that the Bishop is well

pleased with the arrival of the Heer Mortaigne, Envoye from the States General of thele United Provinces, to whom he intends to give a favourable Audience, and in tends to fend hither a Deputy with several proposals, which shall all of them tend to the settlement of a close Union and Alliance between him and the States.

The Heer Frederick Carets who was formerly employ ed by the East-India-Company, as Governour of the Island Formofa; and, upon some misunderstandings condemned by them to a perpetual Imprisonment: Upon the Interceffion of his Electoral Highness of Brandenbourg is to have liberty given him to come hither, and to make his Appearance and Defence against such Charge as shall be brought in against him.

London, Jan. 26. His Majesty was lately pleased with the advice of the Lords and the rest of His Privy Council to Order His Proclamation to be issued out, publishing and declaring, That whereas according to the Statute of 28 H. VIII. now in force, the Lord Keeper of the Great Seal. Two of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, the Lord Chief Justice of the Kings Bench and the Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas, met together the 21 of December last past to set the price of Wines: His Majetry by His faid Proclamation doth declare, that according to the Rates fet by them for the next year following, to be accounted from the First day of February next ensuring, Canary wines. Alegant and Muscadels shall not be fold in Gross, at above Twenty four pounds the Butt or Pipe, and at Nine pence the Pint by retail; and that Sacks and Malagoes be not fold in gross at above Twenty two pounds the Butt, and Eight pence the Pint by Retail; and that French Wines be not fold at above Twenty three pounds the Tun, and Eight pence the Quart by retail; and that Rhenish wines be not fold in Gross at above Six pounds the Aulme and Twelve pence the Quart by retail, and according to these proportions for greater or lesser quantities, either in Gross or by Retail; befides the Impositions laid on Wines which may be received by the A& of Parliament in that behalf, which Rates and Prizes, His Majesties pleafure is, shall be duly obs rved in all his Ports and other places within His Realm where Wines are landed, and within Ten miles of those Ports and places: and it is His Majesties pleasure, that in those places where Wines by Land-carriage shall be conveyed more then Ten miles from the next Port, the several sorts of Wines aforefaid shall and may be fold according to the Rates aforefaid, with an allowance not exceeding Four pounds the Tun, and one penny the Quart, for the Carriage thereof upon Land every Thirty miles, and according to that proportion, and not at greater Rates, under such penalties as by the Proclamation at large will more fully ap-
