The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency was pleased to give the Royal Affent to the following Acts:

An Act to Impower Justices of the Peace to determine Disputes about Servants Wages, and to oblige Masters to pay the same; and to punish idle and disorderly Servants.

As Att to prevent the Disorders that may happen by the Marching of Soldiers; and for providing Carriages for the Biggage of Soldiers in their March.

An Ast to supply the Defects, and for the better Execu-tim of an Ast, Entituled, An Ast for the avoiding of Privy and Secret Outlawries of Her Majesty's Subjets in Personal Actions.

An Act for the more effectual preventing the Taking a-usy and Marrying Children against the Wills of their Parests and Guardians.
