THE Fortifications of this City and Castle are carried on with great Application; and it is said several new raised Regiments will be sent to quarter here, in order to be disciplined by a regular Exercise, and Performance of the Duty of a Garrison. The Czar has issued a Proclamation, wherein all Persons are strictly forbid to conceal Swedish Prisoners, and commanded to give an exact Account into his Majesty's Offices, of all such Captives as have died, been received into the Russian Religion, or are still in Custody. These Precautions are thought to be taken, that, in case of any Disturbance, they may be expeditiously removed to Places of Security. On the 14th Instant a terrible Fire broke out, and burnt down 1500 Houses, among which was that of the English Consul. The Czar has lost by this Fire the Value of 10000 Rubles in Tobacco, which was burnt in his Magazines, and purchased last Year by the English Company. There happened another Fire the Day, which has burnt a Church and Gloister to the Ground.

Moscow, October 28. His Highness Prince Eugene arrived here every Day. It is said, That the Execution of an Enterprize concerted between the Duke of Savoy and that Prince, on the Side of Fenestrelles, has been prevented by the great Snows which have fallen on the Mountains, and made the Passage of them impracticable. His Royal Highness has sent 1500 Men of his own Forces into Sufa, who have relieved the Imperialists that lay in that Garrison. Monsieur Zinzerlin passed lately through this City, in his Way from Holland to Turin. That Minister has Orders for General Schellard; wherein he is commanded to direct the Troops of the Elector Palatine to march into Catalonia. Monsieur Schellard, in the Receipt of those Instructions, sent an Express to the Imperial Minister at Genoa, in order to prepare Transports for those Forces. We hear now, that they were actually on their March to Final, where they are to embark. The other Troops of the Army are to march into the several Winter Quarters which are appointed for their Reception. Those of the Emperor will be disposed of in the Cisalpine; the Prussians will be quartered in the Mantuan, and the Troops of Hesse Cassel in the Mantuan. The Horse, for the Convenience of Foraging, will lie in the Ferrarese and Bolonese. This Duchy having exempted it self from the Burthen of Quarters, by Payment of a Sum of Money, we are to have but two Regiments of Foot and four of Horse in the Milanese. It is reported, That the Count of Castell-Barco will be declared Governor of Mantua. His Royal Highness of Savoy has settled a Duty to be demanded at Cava, from all Persons who trade between this Place and Genoa, which gives some Dissatisfaction to that Republick. They write from thence, That several English Vessels are

ready to sail to the Eastward, in order to take in the Troops in the Kingdom of Naples which are designed for Catalonia, or, as some conjecture, for Sicily, which is universally disposed to declare for King Charles. Advices from Naples inform us, That the Duke of Escalona was dangerously ill. Count Thaur expressed his Concern for his Indisposition in a very handsome Manner; and at the same Time gave him to understand, That he was so far from countenancing the Behaviour of the common People when that Duke was conducted through the City, that he had the highest Indignation for their Insolence.

Hannover, Nov. 8. N. S. The Princess Louisa of Wolfembuttel arrived the 21st of the last Month at Herrenhaufe; and on the 29th the Duke of Wolfembuttel, accompanied by the Abbess of Gandersheim, came also thither, without being expected. The Electrice was very agreeably surprised to see him at her Court, and received the Duke with that Complaisance which is natural to her. On the 31st their Highnesses, accompanied by the Princess Louisa, came to the Castle, and made a Visit to the Prince and Princess Electoral: After which they were entertained with a Commedy, and returned to Herrenhaufe. Letters from Dresden of the 31st of the last Month say, That King Augustus had returned thither from Leipstick, after having dispatched Orders to his General Officers, in the different Provinces of the Electorate, for raising new Recruits; but was then gone to Lechtenberg, to visit the Electrice Dowager, his Majesty's Mother. It is said, that a Treaty is almost concluded between the Emperor and that Prince, for 6000 Horse to be received into the Service of his Imperial Majesty, which have for some Time been in Quarters of Refreshment in the Dutchy of Saxe-Eysenach, and other neighbouring Countries. Advices from Cassel acquaint us, That the Prince Hereditary was on his Journey out of Piedmont, and intended with the greatest Expedition to go into Holland, and report to the States the Condition of their Troops under his Command.

Falmouth, Novemb. 10. On the 4th Instant came in the Chelsey Galley of London, but last from Plymouth, to take in Fish for Leghorn, Edward Cook Commander. On the 5th sailed the Upton Galley, William Craige Commander, with Fish for Leghorn; as also the Lexington Galley, Captain Robinson Commander, with Bale-Goods for the Canaries. On the 9th came in Four Dutch Doggers, the Debos, Dacomena, States of Zurickzee, and the Peace, all of and for Zurickzee, from Bourdeaux, laden with Wine and Nuts. Whereas one William Sale was some Years since convicted in the Ecclesiastical Court at Canterbury, of having forged Holy Orders for himself, and for his own Father, under the Hand and Seal of the late Bishop Pearson of Chester; upon which he was deprived of the Living of Sturry in the Diocese of Canterbury: And whereas a Person of the same Name of William Sale, came lately to Eden-Bridge in the Diocese of Rochester, and there taught School, read Public Prayers, and preach'd several times, without License from the Bishop; and having been often warned to come and exhibit his Letters of Orders to the Diocesan, or his Court, he never appear'd with them, but alledg'd, that they were registred in the Court of Canterbury, and in Possession of the Arch-Deacon there. These are therefore to advise and require the same William Sale, to appear before the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury his Grace, or before the Bishop of Rochester, within the Space of one Month after the Date of these Presents, to produce his true Letters of Orders, if he has any; or else he shall be proceeded against as a heretic in the Bishop of Rochester's Court; and Notice shall be publickly given of him, to all the Archbishops and Bishops of England and Ireland, that he is justly supposed to be the fore-said William Sale, who was convicted at Canterbury for forging Orders, upon evident Proof, besides the authentic Confession of his own Father.
