**T**HE great Rains which are fallen here had render'd the Roads impracticable, so that the greatest part of our Troops that were on their March from Pignerol and Suza into Lombardy were forc'd to halt for some Days; but the Waters being fallen, they now continue their March to their respective Quarters. His Royal Highness having thought fit to reform the Regiment commanded by Monsieur Meyrolle, which was rais'd at the beginning of the War, has incorporated the Soldiers into the Regiment of Depoite, which is of the same Nation, and an elder Corps. His Royal Highness has been oblig'd to this Expedient from the Difficulty of filling up both Regiments with French Recruits. There will be a Reform likewise in the Regiment of Monsieur Cavalier, which, according to the first Agreement, was to have consist'd of French Protestants; but the Colonel having been employ'd in other Parts, his Inferior Officers have not been able to compleat it. On the first Instant Prince Eugene left this Place, and went by Water to Pavia, where his Equipages were order'd to wait for him, in his Journey to Milan. His Highness hath taken with him Prince Maurice, one of his Nephews, second Son to the late Count de Soissons, in order to procure him a suitable Post in the Service of the Imperial Majesty. The other two Sons of the Count de Soissons continue in the Court of his Royal Highness, who has promis'd to take Care of them. His said, That Prince Emanuel, the eldest of them, is order'd for the first Imperial Regiment of Horse which shall become vacant. This young Prince hath had the Honour to make three Campaigns with his Royal Highness, and was dangerously wounded in the Action of Saluffes. On the 3d the Regiment of Piedmont was embark'd on the Po, in order to be transported to Valence, where his Royal Highness hath appointed them to be in Garrison all Winter. The same Day the Regiment of Savoy, consisting of two Battalions, arriv'd here from the City of Aost, on their way to Suza, where his Royal Highness designs to quarter a Body of 10 Battalions, consisting of 5 German Regiments which Prince Eugene hath left in those Parts. It is said, the Enemy seem to be very strong on that Frontier, and that they have order'd some Lines to be made in Savoy, in order to hinder the Allies from entering Dauphine the next Campaign, of which they seem to be very apprehensive. On the 9th the Baron Rhebin, Commander of the Palatine Troops in the Pay of the Queen of Great Britain and the States General, set out for Genoa, after a stay of five Weeks. On the 11th the Regiment de Poite, which was rais'd by that of St. Jule, march'd from hence to Alexandria, where it is to be in Garrison this Winter, with the Regiment of Massey, under the Command of the Marquis d'Andouze, Major-General, whom his Royal Highness hath been pleas'd to appoint Commander in the Montferrat, Alexandrine, and the neighbouring Parts. This Officer designs to go from Alexandria within a Day or two to take upon him that Command, and is to keep his chief Residence at Alexandria; the Marquis de Courtañce, who commands there at present, being order'd to march with the Regiment to Suza. The Enemy having impos'd upon the Officer Prince Eugene had appointed to regulate the intended Neutrality to the House upon the top of great Mount Genis; so as to include all the Ways on the adjacent Hills; his Royal Highness hath

sent Orders to the Count de la Rocque, Governor of Suza, to disown what that Officer had agreed upon, and declare to the Enemy, That his Royal Highness only intended the Neutrality of the aforesaid House; and that if they did not approve that, to leave Things on the same foot they are at present. The Princesses of Carignan and Soissons have been to wait on his Royal Highness and the Dutchess Consort at the Vennerie, where the Court designs to stay as long as the Weather continues fair. The Count of St. Agnes, whom the Prince of Carignan had sent to Neufchatel to take Care of his Interests, is arriv'd there, and late Election of a new Sovereign; in arriv'd here, and has had the Honour to give his Royal Highness, as well as the Prince of Carignan, an Account of his Negotiations. Advices from Milan say, That Prince Eugene hath augmented the Regiment of General Rautlau to the Number of 1200 Men; and that his Highness had order'd them to begin their March on the 15th Instant for Final, where they may arriv'e on the 25th, in order to be embark'd for Spain. Letters from Genoa of the 10th Instant advise, That 4 British Ships came in there that Evening from cruising, and brought in along with them two small French Sattees, laden with Corn from Cap Nero. There are now eight British and two Dutch Ships in that Port. The same Letters add, That a Genoese Ship arriv'd there from Barcelona reported, That a British Ship from Gibraltar had inform'd 'em, a Squadron of Men of War, with two Flags, departed thence four Days before them; and heard also at Barcelona, that a Squadron of British Ships were arriv'd at Altea.

*Frankfort, Dec. 1.* General Thungen, who quarters at Bruchsal, to be in a readiness at any Alarm, has order'd the Magazine of Philippsbourg to be furnish'd with Provisions, and is making new Magazines at Eclingen and Muhlberg. Count Wratilaw is gone from Duffeldorp to Hanover, from whence, after a Conference with his Electoral Highness, he is to proceed to Dresden, in order to treat with King Augustus for the 6000 Men which that Prince has offer'd to his Imperial Majesty. Letters from Swisserland advise, That the two little Towns of Landeron and Cressier, who refus'd to submit to the Determination of the States of Neufchatel, and acknowledge the King of Prussia for their Sovereign, have at last taken the Oaths of Fidelity to him before Count Metternich. 'Tis said, the French King has order'd some Forces to march into Franche Comté, and join the Troops that are already in those Parts.

*Hague, Dec. 6. N. S.* The King of Prussia, and the Prince Royal his Son, have notified to this Republick the Birth of the young Prince; and at the same time desir'd the States to be his Godfathers, in conjunction with several other Princes and States. Monsieur Ducker, Envoy Extraordinary from the Bishop of Munster, is upon his Departure for the Court of the Prince his Master, having had his Audience of Leave from their High-Mightinesses, with the usual Ceremonies. On the 20th past the Prince d'Auvergne was married to the Princess of Artemberg at Berg-op-Zoon. Monsieur de Cronstrom is arriv'd at Brussels, in order to assist at the Conference which are to be held at Nivelles, concerning the Exchange of the Prisoners which were made at Hochsted, Ramelies, and Aimanza. We hear from Saxony, That Count Wratilaw was arriv'd at Leipzig; from whence he intend'd, after a short stay at Dresden, to pursue his Journey to the Imperial Court. Those Letters add, That the Swedish Army was advanc'd toward Thorn; and that it was believ'd the greatest part of them would Winter in the Polish Prussia. His Swedish Majesty was expect'd at Dantzick with King Stanislaus the Czar was gone from Misk, and upon his Return to Moscow. Prince Menzikoff was still near Tikoczin with a Body of Mulcovites. They write from France, That the Intendants had represented to that Court the Impossibility of
