

complying with their Resolution to raise a double Militia; the greatest part of those who are proper to bear Arms flying into the Fields and Woods to avoid the Service. The Court has been so wrought upon by this Representation, that they have stinted their intended Levies of the Militia to 10000 Men. The States of Holland being of Opinion that no Regard should be had to the Duke of Vendosme's Letter, by which he threatens to give Colonel Gunthem the same Treatment that Gautier, who contriv'd to carry off the Sicur Hugueran, should meet with here; our Court of Justice hath re-assum'd their Process against the said Gautier.

**Falmouth, Novemb. 24.** Yesterday failed to cruise 4 Dutch Privateers; and the same Day came from cruising Her Majesty's Ships the Southampton, Lizard, and Arundel. This Day failed to cruise the Bar of Middlebourg, Captain Abraham Sampson, and the Welfare of the same Place, Captain Andrews Nanchor.

**Dartmouth, Novemb. 25.** The two Dutch Men of War which came last Week from Plymouth, with several Merchant-Ships laden with Drapery under their Convoy, bound to the Eastward, and put into Torbay, the Wind having been strong at North-East these two or three Days, are all now come about for this Port. The Resolution, Captain Burton, the Employment, Captain Waller, from Jamaica; and the Hoblon Galley from Leghorne, are at the Mouth of this Harbour. The Packers from Topham are not come out.

**Kensington, Nov. 28.** This Evening Baron Spanheim, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Prussia, conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies; had a private Audience of Her Majesty; wherein he acquainted Her Majesty with the grateful Sentiments of his Master for the Queen's Support of his Pretensions, in asserting, by Her Minister at Berne, the Right of his Majesty to the Sovereignty of Neufchatel, which was acknowledg'd by the Sentence of the States of that Principality on the 3d of November, N. S. At the same time his Excellency notified to Her Majesty, by Order of the King his Master, the Birth of a young Prince his Grandson; and presented to Her Majesty a Letter from the King, and another from the Prince Royal of Prussia, Father of the young Prince; in which they desired Her Majesty would do them the Honour to be Godmother to the young Prince. His Excellency on both these Occasions was very favourably received by Her Majesty. The Ambassador was afterwards conducted to an Audience of His Royal Highness, to notify the Birth of the Prince; and deliver'd a Letter to His Royal Highness from his Prussian Majesty on that Subject.
