**H**IS Highness Prince Eugene of Savoy is preparing all Things for his Departure hence, in order to return to the Court of Vienna; several of his Domesticks being already on their Way thither. There is a Fund of 50000 Livres for the Voyage of the Prince of Wolfembutel; and it is said, a Sum of 300000 Crowns will be demanded of the Chamber of this Duchy for the same Service. Count Konigsleck, who is to command the Palatine Troops design'd for Catalonia, is arriv'd at this Place. Those Troops, with the Imperial Forces that are to serve in Spain, are drawn together, and will be ready to embark at Genoa and Final towards the latter end of this Month; having already receiv'd the necessary Remittances from the States, which have taken them into their Pay. The Priests, both Regular and Secular, are very much press'd to bring in their Contributions, which this Government hath laid on them, in Consideration of their being exempted from furnishing Winter-Quarters. Cardinal Archinto, our Archbishop, hath already pay'd his Share, as well to give a good Example to the rest, as to shew his Zeal for the Interest of his Catholic Majesty.

Frankfort, December 1. The Deputies of the Circle of the Upper-Rhine are very busie in finding out Methods to raise their Proportion of Money for the supplying the Military Chest of the Empire. Letters from Vienna advise, That Count Illiershafi, Great Chancellor of Hungary, Count Alexander Berdedy, and the Sieur Samogi the Hungarian Secretary, had left the Court, in order to meet the Cardinal of Saxe-Zeits at Presbourg, who is again to propose an Accommodation with the Malecontents of Hungary. General Palfy, Ban of Croatia, was return'd to Oedenburg, after having provided all Things necessary for the Defence of Schavar, and other Posts in the Rabau. They write from Transylvania, That the General Baron de Tige had put several Malecontents to the Sword, and given Notice to those of the Territory of Halmad, That if they any longer deferr'd making their Submission to his Imperial Majesty, they were to expect the same Treatment. We hear from Oedenburg, That on the 18th past the Sieur Bercedi had burnt the Town of Marrerdorf, belonging to Prince Esterhafi, Palatine of Hungary, and afterwards plunder'd the Villages of Perzin, Kronstorf and Sicklos, situated up on the Leytha, with Stunkerbrun, and others, near the little River Wulha, having ruin'd the Churches of that Country, and brought away 3000 Head of Cattle. The Malecontents have committed the same Disorders near St. Marguerite, where they have pillag'd Iregendorf and Croisbachi, and massacred all those who oppos'd them. We have Advice from Switzerland, That the Deputies of the Catholic Cantons were assembled at Luzern; but that the

Result of their Conferences was not yet known. The same Advices add, That the Embassy which the Canton of Bern had sent to Neufchatel had been receiv'd with very great Magnificence, and had left that Place on the 24th past, after having renew'd the Treaties of Alliance and Combourgeoisie with Count Metternich, the King of Prussia's Plenipotentiary. The Republick of Geneva hath likewise sent Deputies to compliment the Count on the Succession of his Master the King of Prussia to the Principality of Neufchatel. Deputies are expected there from all the Protestant Cantons on the same Occasion.

Paris, Nov. 28. N. S. Yesterday was spent in publick Rejoycings and Bonfires for the taking of Lerida; the Siege whereof it is certain the Duke of Orleans carried on at his own proper Charge; and that the last Campagne cost that Prince three Millions. The same Letters which brought us the good News of our Advantage there inform us, that his Royal Highness and the Duke of Berwick will be here on the 8th or 10th of the next Month at farthest. The Baptism of the Prince of Asturias was celebrated with all the Ceremony and Magnificence imaginable; and it was observable, that the King, Queen, Grandees, Ladies, and all Persons who appear'd at Court on that Occasion, were dress'd after the French Manner. There will be no further Action in Spain till the next Spring. The Duke Noailles is coming from Catalonia, and expected here very suddenly. The Court seems at present intent only on Pleasure and Entertainment. There have lately been two Marriages, one of the Prince de Talemion to the younger Sister of the Duchesse Duras; the other of the Marquis de Ferivic to the Daughter of Prince Tzerclas Tilli, who is now in Spain. This Lady is the only Child of that Prince, and brings with her into the Family of her Husband the Quality of a Grandee of Spain, of which her Father divests himself in her Favour. Monsieur Catinat has receiv'd 40000 Livres for an Equipage; which makes us believe he is to be at the Head of an Army the next Campagne. Here are Deputies from Lyons and Bourdeaux, who make very loud Complaints, and declare those Cities unable to carry on their Trade, if they are not reliev'd from the Miseries they lie under by the Introduction of Money-Bills. However, the King's Declaration on that Subject will be put in Force; tho' at the same time it is said, the most hopeful Prospect in that Expedient was the Probability of making the Trading Cities purchase an Exemption from it, by Advancement of Money for the Necessities of the War.

Falmouth, Dec. 4. On the first Instant arriv'd here the St. George of and for London; James Osborne Commanded, from Jamaica, with Sugar, Indigo, and Ginger. She parted with the Fleet five Weeks

Weeks since in bad Weather, and hath been 24 Weeks in her Passage. The same Day came in the John of Stockholm, Peter Claufon Master, for Bourdeaux, in Ballast; as also the Prince Packet-Boat in 14 Days from Lisbon. The Cominander reports, That the Queen and Expedition Packet-Boats were arriv'd there before he came away.

*Hull, Dec. 6.* Yesterday arriv'd here the Rochester Prize and Postillon, with a Fleet of light Ships from London, consisting of 12 Sail.

*Chester, Dec. 6.* His Excellency the Earl of Pembroke came to this City on the 3d Instant, where he din'd, and in the Afternoon went to Wrexham, intending to be at Shrewsbury the next Day. His Excellency was saluted with the Discharge of the Cannon from the Castle, and waited upon by the Magistracy and Clergy of the City in a most respectful manner.

*Plimouth, Dec. 9.* On the 3d came in a Dutch Privateer, bound on cruizing. On the 4th sail'd to the Eastward Her Majesty's Ships the Faulkland and Advice, and under their Convoy 7 or 8 Merchant Ships, with some Coasters. The same Day came in Her Majesty's Ships the Burford, Kent, Mary, August, Antelope, Dover, Tartar, Chatham Galley, and Terrible; from cruizing. We have had very stormy Weather for some Days; but no Damage hath happen'd to our Shipping.
