The Garison of Elvas gined lately a confiderable Booty from that of Badajox by Stratagem: A Party of 50 Men marched in the Night close to the Walls of that Town, where several Thousand Sheep and Oxen were feeding; our Men begin to drive them off in very great Herds and Flocks; whereupon the Enemy took the Alarm, but our larry, who had prepar'd for such an Ascident a great Number of Days and Tours an Number of Drums and Trumpers, beat and founded together in such a Manner, that the Garison, suppoing a proportionable Number of Troops before the Town, did not think fit to make a Sally, but flood other Arms within their Walls till the Break of Day, by which Time the Portuguese had carried off their Prey to Elvas.

Twin, Dec. 10. They Wind has blown fo violently for some Days, that it has done very much Damage to this Country, especially at Rivoli, a Village not far from hence, which was anciently the Seat of the Dukes of Savey; where, during she tempestuous Wearher, a fire unhappily broke out, and burse down feveral

Houses. Prince Eugene hath lest the Administration of Civil Affairs of the Milanese to the Care of the Great Chancellor of that Dutchy; and the Management of all Matters relating to the War to General Visconti, who is the eldest Officer in his Imperial Majesty's Service in Lombardy. We hear from Genoa, That the Men of War and Transports designed to convoy and carry the Troops to Catalonia, are still detained there by contrary Winds. Those Advices add, That Baron Rhebender, who commanded in Cherch Polaring. Troops designed for Spain had received a Palatine Troops designed for Spain, had received a Courier from Dusseldorp, with the Elector's Leave to enter into the Service of his Royal Highness, with whom that Officer is in high Esteem for his Bravery and Conduct at the Battle of Turin. It is said, That he Elector Palatine hath been pleased to give his Regiment of Guards, formerly commanded by Baron Rhebender, to the Count of Lecheraine, who arriv'd at Genoa with the last ships from Bartelona. Letters from Lephon say That Sir Thomas Dille trace of Selventing ghorn say, That Sir Thomas Dilks was safely arrived there, after having suffered some Damage by ill Weather. He was refitting his Ships, and doubted nor but he should be ready time enough to join the Convoy with the Troops off of Final or Vado, where he hath appointed their Rendezvous in case they should be separated before he can come up to them. The Regiment of Wolsembuttel, which hath served here in

Regiment of Wolsembuttel, which hath served here in the Emperor's Pay, is ordered to match for Germany. Vinice, Dec. 9. The Electres of Bavaria, the Duke of Mantua, and some other Persons of Quality, who had been absent for some time, are returned hither. The Republick intends to send Cardinal Cornaro to Rome, who is to reside there in Behalf of this Mare. General Steinau, who commands all our Forces, is some to Venice. Letters from Rome say, That the Duke of Atti, who detended Pescara, was arrived there; and that about 2000 Men were on their March for Naples, to recruit the Imperial Regiments in that Kingdom. We hear from theace, That 1000 Germans and other regular Troops have been embacked there on board several small Vessels, under the Command of General Vetzel.
