Turin, Dec. 7. N. S.

Major-General Belcastel, who hath lain sick at Lucern ever since the End of the last Campaign, arrived here from that Place on Wednesday last. We hear that his Imperial Majesty hath been pleas'd to give the late General Vaubonne's Regiment of Horse to Prince Emanuel, eldest Son of the Count de Soissons; and that he hath made Prince Maurice, the second Adjutant to Prince Eugene, who hath taken up the Care of that young Prince, as well as his elder and younger Brother. Last Week a Party of the Enemy came to Pignerol, and took a Captain and a Lieutenant coming from the Vallies; where the French have also burnt 3 or 4 Houses; for the Vaudois have since set on Fire a much greater Number of theirs, and taken many of their Soldiers Prisoners. Our last Letters from Genoa bring us Advice, That the Duke of Tellefia and Count Castelli, who were on board the Enterprize, with several other Persons that went for Spain, were all lost at the same time with the Ship.

Venice, Dec. 24. Don Francisco Cornaro, Ambassador from this Republick to the Court of Great Britain, is made Councillor of State, and Signior Marco Loredano appointed General of the Venetian Forces in Morea. A Muscovite Prince is arriv'd here, who is reported to be commission'd from the Czar, to offer his Master's good Offices towards composing the Differences between this State and the City of Rome. We are inform'd by Letters from Genoa, That the Palatine Troops which marched out of Italy were arriv'd in Bavaria; and that the Regiment design'd for the Imperial Forces which serve in Lombardy and Naples, will be ready at the Beginning of the next Spring. Letters from Bologna say, That the Pope has at last prevail'd with the Emperor to permit the Passage of the Imperial Troops through the Ecclesiastical Territories into Naples, provided that they pay for all Necessaries on their March. They write from Leghorn, That Admiral Dilks is on Board Ship in that Road on the 13th Instant; and that the Squadron of Men of War late under his Command was sail'd towards Genoa. These Letters add, That the Great Duke was expected from Florence at Leghorn within few Days; and that the Prince Hereditary, accompanied by his Princes, would pass the Time of the Carnival at Pisa. The Genoese Advices say, That the Palatine and some Imperial Troops, with the Regiment of Bozesana, were marched from their Quarters, in order to be embark'd at Vado and Final. There are Letters which report, they were already sail'd for Catalonia; and that the Fortresses of Orbitello and St. Stephano, which are situated in Tuscany, but belong to the Crown of Spain, have declared for King Charles.

Berlin, Dec. 31. His Majesty omits no Opportunity of promoting the Work he has long had at Heart, of composing the Minds of his Subjects, and chaying all Antinomies which arise from Difference in Divine Worship. He has wrote to the Clergy of Geneva on that Subject, and, by all gentle Methods, brought those of the Lutheran and Reform'd Per-

suasion among his own People to so gentle a Temper towards each other, that they communicate together, the Reform'd on one Sunday receiving from the Hands of a Lutheran Minister, and the Lutheran on the next from one of the Reform'd. This is the present Practice at Konigsberg, the Capital City of Prussia: And the King has declared, That when he is in that Place, he will himself receive the Sacrament according to the Ceremony both of the Lutherans and the Reform'd. Baron Stein has taken his Audience of Leave of the King, in order to return to the Margrave his Master at Bareith; and only attends this Court till his Majesty has sign'd an Order for the Departure of 2000 Men, belonging to the King, who quarter in that Country. Monsieur Schmettau sets out this Day, and returns to the Hague, as Envoy and Plenipotentiary from his Majesty to the States General, with full Instructions relating to the 8000 Men which serve in Italy, the Garrison which the States keep in Meurs, and the Differences between the King and the Prince of Nassau-Prize. The Imperial Court has return'd a very obliging and satisfactory Answer to his Majesty's Demands concerning more punctual Payments of the Troops. The States General have made the young Prince, their Godson, the usual Present, which is a Gold Box, and in it an Assiguation of 4000 Guilders a Year during his Life. The Duke of Saxe-Barby is now at Dresden; and King Augustus has sign'd an Order for banishing all the Reform'd or Calvinists within 3 Months out of the Country of Barby. Letters from Warsaw of the 20th Instant say, That a Proclamation is published, to declare the Advancement of Monsieur Siniowski to the Dignity of Grand Marshal to the Crown, and to forbid all Payment of Contributions in the Palatinates, unless to Persons authorized for making such Demands by Instruments under his Hand. These Provinces have held an Assembly, and deput'd Monsieur Sacrotin to congratulate King Stanislaus, in their Name, upon his happy return out of Saxony, and humbly desire he would ease them in some measure from the Contributions exacted by the Swedes.

Hague, Jan. 6. N. S. Baron Bothmar, Envoy from the Elector of Hanover, has had a long Conference with the Deputies of their High Mightinesses, concerning the Troops of his Electoral Highness in the Service of this State. They write from Brussels, That Mr. Cadogan is returned from Nivelles; and that the Conferences relating to Exchange of Prisoners are wholly laid aside. Letters from Paris advise, That the Duke of Orleans arriv'd at Court on the 30th of the last Month; and that the Duke of Berwick was every Day expected. Spanish Letters say, That the Garrison in the small Town of Morella had held out 10 Days after the opening of the Trenches before it; and that on the 11th they retir'd to the Castle, from whence they capitulated to surrender with Arms, Baggage, and all Marks of Honour, if they were not relieved within 5 Days; and have march'd out according to those Articles.

rary Winds 17 Sail of Dutch Ships, bound for Rochel, Bourdeaux, Nantz, and Lisbon.

Plymouth, Dec. 25. On the 24th Instant came in the Loan of and from Hamburg, for Nantz, and 5 Dutch Ships from Holland, bound for Bourdeaux. This Day came in the St. Peter from Dram, and the Saffana from Rotterdam, both for Rochel.

Dartmouth, Dec. 25. On the 24th Instant came in here two small Vessels of and for Topham from Lisbon, which parted from the Fleet, under the Convoy of 10 Men of War, and have been 19 Days in their Passage.

Bristol, Dec. 27. Yesterday came in the Flying-Horse, John Duffel Master, in 20 Days from Lisbon, who came out with the homeward-bound Lisbon Fleet. This Day came in Her Majesty's Ship the Hastings, and brought in as Prize, the Marguerite of Nantz, which she took coming from the Banks of Newfoundland.

Yarmouth, Dec. 29. Her Majesty's Ships the Mermaid and Lime, with the Fleet under their Convoy, bound for Holland, continue in our Road, waiting for a fair Wind.

Portsmouth, Dec. 30. Yesterday sailed from Spithead into this Harbour Her Majesty's Ship the Dartmouth. Sir John Norris continues still at Spithead, with the outward-bound Virginia Fleet.

Whitehall, Dec. 31. On the 22d Instant was perform'd the Interment of Sir Cloudfly Shovell, who was unfortunately lost in the Association, on the Rocks call'd the Bishop and Clarks, off of Scilly, on the 22d of October last; and his Body taken up under the Rocks of St. Mary's. He was at the Time of his Death Rear-Admiral of Great Britain, and Admiral and Commander in Chief of Her Majesty's Fleet, one of the Council to his Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c. one of the elder Brothers of Trinity-House of Deptford-Strond, and one of the Governors of the Royal Hospital for the Maintenance of aged and disabled Seamen at Greenwich. He acquitted himself in these Stations with an universal Reputation; and through the whole Conduct of his Life, was honour'd for a certain peculiar Frankness and Honesty of Behaviour. The Body, after having lain in State for many Days at the Queen's Expense, was convey'd from his late Dwelling-House in Soho-Square to the Abbey of Westminster, where it was interr'd with all the Pomp and Magnificence suitable to so mournful an Occasion, and Her Majesty's high Regard to the Remains of so brave and faithful an Officer.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c.
