We saily more and more apprehend the iffue of four sffairs at Trivola between the lubjects of this State and thole of the Dake of Savay, little hopes yet appearing of an accommodation; fome days fince happened a Duel on the fromplets, between a Genoufe and a Savoyard Captain, in which the latter was kiled, which has not a little encrealed the animofity of both parties.

From Turin we are told, that the young Prince of Pield mons has loft his Feavour and is reffored to his perfect health to the great joy of the Court 3 and that the Duke has conferred on the Marquis de Livorno, the charge of Righ Chamberlain, which has been yold for three-years by the refignation of the Marquis de Pidnezza who relited himfelf from the Coart to fpend the relt of his time among the Fathers of the Daiflion.

Calais, Reb. S. The Katherine Ketch having on board the Marques de Maffei, after much ftorm at lea arrived here on Mundsy night, he Marquis and his attendants going then the next morning on his return for Savoye. On Tuesday arrived here his Excellency the Lord Faitonbridge with his Train, where he was treated with much respect by the Prefident Monfiett de Constbonne the Governour and chief Customer 3 the Ketch which transported him riding in the Port with the King of Englands Flag in her Main top, and her falutes civilly answered from the Castle.

Hague, Feb. 7. The whole affair of the Triple alliance being now concluded, the ratifications from the Princes (5.6. therein concerned, may in liule time be expected 3 after which, the Spanish Ambasilador is ordered to see payment made to the Swedes of their Moneys, which in the mean time a.e to be secured to them upon the Bank.

Fhe States of Holland and h of Friefland have had fome conference with the D pu ies from the great Cities and Towns about the proj & for an imposition upon forraign Merchandiles, and particul ly upon the French Manufactures, and the states of Holland are faid to be agreed upon the point.

The affairs of those parts of Christendom, carrying not now the face of danger and diffurbance as formerly, we have no fatther dic unes here of any preparations for war, except only for the fatt gup a Fleet to be lent lato the Meditegranean, for the lecurity of our Merchants against the Pyfors of Barbary.

The Provinces of Ho land and Zealand have had foreral conferences by their Deputies about the trade to Surinam, which, 'tis believen will in the end be to ordered, then all the Provinces Itall have the freedome of trade to the place, for the better encreale, and advantage of that Cotony.
