WHEREAS all Merchants, Commanders of Ships, and others who have Commissions or Letters of Marque, or Commissions for private Men of War against the Enemy, are, by the 21st Article of the Instructions deliver'd to them with their Commissions, oblig'd from Time to Time to observe all such other Instructions and Orders as Her Majesty shall think fit to direct to be observ'd for the better carrying on of Her Majesty's Affairs; and though it is to be understood that all Persons concerned are to take Notice of and conform themselves to the same accordingly.

IT is therefore commanded, that all such Letters of Marque, or Commissions for private Men of War, which shall be taken abroad by any Person, shall be afterwards oblig'd to put into the Hands of the French Consul or Agent at the Place where they shall be taken, and to be delivered to the French Consul or Agent, who shall be demanded and taken for them, and shall be liable to the same, except such as shall be taken by the Commanding Officer of a Ship with Letters of Marque, which shall be taken in order to be examined, in order to be taken, and the Receipts for such Letters of Marque shall be taken, by the very first Opportunity which shall offer, in Her Majesty's Commissioners for Sick and Wounded, or the Exchange of Prisoners of War, at their Office in London, the better to enable them to demand from Time to Time the said Officers of the French King, the like Number of Her Majesty's Subjects, in lieu of them. But if there shall be no French Officers at the said Ports where the said Ships shall arrive, that then the like Receipts shall be taken by the Commanding Officer of the Prize Ship, where the said Prisoners shall be put on Shore at the said Ports, and shall be delivered to the Commissioners for the Exchange of Prisoners of War, as aforesaid.

London, December 20. N. S. The Viceroy has demanded 4000 Ducats for the Use of the Troops; and the Collateral Council have answered his Excellency, that it was not in their Power to enter upon the Consideration of that Subject, except in a General Assembly of the States of the City. Don Don Tomacelli is made Captain of his Excellency's Horse-Guards. There are at present in this City 176 Tartans, which came in laden with Corn and Oil, under Convoy of two Dutch Vessels of War, which are hired for that Service. But we are now building two Ships, which, added to the Boats we have already, 'tis hoped, will enable us to guard the Coasts against the Privateers of Sicily without Foreign Assistance. The Count de Montero is to return to Spain. His Catholick Majesty has given him the Lieutenantcy of the Province of Valencia, with an Annual Pension of 4000 Ducats. Her Majesty has been pleas'd also to make his Father, who is a Prisoner in France, Grandee of Spain, and permitted the Count to offer in Exchange for any Prisoner taken at Gaeta, except the Duke of Sicily.

Dec. 27. On the 25th of this Month the Ship *Sancti Matheara* arrived here from Bar-

celona, and brings Advice, That the Marquis Arberri had received a Commission from his Catholick Majesty to be Field-Marshal and Governor of Pavia. The Marquis de Prié and Count Vefnon are expected within few Days, to act on the Part of his Royal Highness of Savoy, in relation to his Demand of the Vigevano and Novareze. But we are not yet inform'd who will have the Honour of being his Imperial Majesty's Minister on that Occasion. There are very great Preparations made for the Reception of the Consort of his Catholick Majesty. The Imperial Troops continue their March through the Boloneze, in the Ecclesiastical State, to Naples. The Commissaries have taken Care for the exact Payment of their Quarters. Letters from Turin inform us, That his Royal Highness takes all possible Measures for being early in the Field; and that his new Levies are carried on with great Success. They are adding new Works to the Fortifications of Susa; and very frequently relieve the Garison. His Royal Highness intends to make the Place before the Citadel of Turin into a Square, according to the Model of his Ancestors. He has accordingly given Directions for pulling down a long Row of Houses which suffered in the late Siege of that Town. They write from Genoa, That the Fleet of British and Dutch Men of War and Transports have failed to Vado, in order to receive the Troops designed for Catalonia. They add, That the Infantry was already embark'd; and that all those Auxiliary Troops would be ready to sail in the Beginning of January. Count Lecherain, who is lately come from Spain, is suddenly expected here from Genoa. The Elector Palatine has been pleas'd to give him the Command of his Regiment of Guards. He is commission'd from his Catholick Majesty to go to Vienna, Dusseldorp, the Hague, and Great-Britain, with proper Instructions to try the present State of his Majesty's Affairs before the Potentates in his Alliance. 'Tis said, That the Governor of Orbitello being very zealous for the Interests of the Duke of Anjou, the Garison took the Advantage of his Absence, when they declared for his Catholick Majesty, and deny'd him Entrance at his Return.

Hague, Jan. 13. N. S. There are some Differences in Zealand, occasion'd by the Death of the late Bailiff of Flushing; the Council for the Domains of the late King of England having named a Successor to that Office, at the same time that the States of Zealand have given their Nomination to another; the late King's Council have enter'd their Action in the Court of Justice, which the

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Some of Zealand have protested against, and alledge, That the Appeal is made to an improper Tribunal for the Decision of that Affair; and that, upon the Death of his Majesty, who was Marquis of Flushing, they have the Right to fill up all vacant Offices in that Marquisate. The young Prince of Friseland hath written to the States General on this Occasion, desiring, That they would not suffer any thing to be done in Prejudice to the Rights of the Marquis of Flushing; and 'tis thought, that his Prussian Majesty will write to the same Purpose. Monsieur Itersum is preparing for his Departure hence, in order to compliment the Bishop of Munster, and to renew with him and his Chapter, the several Treaties which have been made between them and the States General. The Hereditary Prince of Westfriseland hath taken the Oath before the Council of State as Colonel of a Regiment. Monsieur Hetterman, Envoy of the Elector Palatine, had yesterday a Conference with the Deputies of the States General. A Placart will suddenly be published, offering a general Pardon to all such Deserters as shall return to their respective Regiments within a limited Time: And we hear the Bishop of Munster hath already published one of the same Nature, relating to those who have deserted out of his Troops.

Bainouth, Jan. 5. Yesterday came in the Bristol Galley, Thomas Giles Master, of and from Bristol, to take in Fish for Venice.

Plimouth, Jan. 6. Yesterday came in the Mary Magdalen of Amsterdam, and the Gerrard of Stockholm, both for France; and the Juffrow Christina of and from Stockholm, Alexander Gowen Master, laden with Iron and Deals for Bristol.

Yarmouth, Jan. 7. On the 6th Instant, came into our Road Her Majesty's Ship the Flamborough from the Southward.

Deale, Jan. 9. Yesterday Her Majesty's Ships the Sunderland and Experiment sailed towards the River. Here remain Her Majesty's Ships the Northumberland, Essex, Ranelagh, Le Ferme, and Gosport.

The Dutch Mails of Tuesday and Friday last are not yet come in.
