

there Attend to Receive such Persons into Our Service, and to Pay the said Incentives: And all such Persons so Appointed to Receive such New-raised Men, are by the said Act required also to Pay unto the Constables, Headboroughs, Tythingmen, or other Parish-Officers, the Sum of Six-pence per Diem, for every Man that such Constable, or other Parish-Officer shall Deliver unto such Officer or Officers of Our Forces, or other Persons so Appointed, according to the Number of Days that such Constable or other Parish-Officer shall have kept such Man in Custody (pursuant to the Powers granted by the said Act) until such Delivery; but no Justice is singly to Levy or Deliver any Man in pursuance of the said Act, under the Penalty of One hundred Pounds, as in and by the said Act may (amongst other Things therein contained) more fully appear: Now for the better Expediting of this so Necessary a Service, and that all Justices and Magistrates, and all High-Constables, Petty-Constables, Tythingmen, and other Parish-Officers, and Persons whom it may concern, may be the more speedily Informed of their several Duties in relation to the Premises, of the Incentives given by the said Act, and the Penalties thereby Imposed for the Neglect thereof, We have thought fit (by and with the Advice of Our Privy-Council) to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby strictly Require and Charge all Our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, and other Officers, who shall be Authorized to put the said Act in Execution, that they use their utmost Diligence in the due Execution of the said Act; and that all High-Constables, Petty-Constables, and other Parish-Officers, within this Our Kingdom of Great Britain, be Aiding and Assisting therein, on Pain of Our High Displeasure, and incurring such Punishments as may by Law be Inflicted on those who shall Neglect so necessary a Service; and particularly that the said Justices and other Magistrates (whosoever Impowered by the said Act) do take Care that their First Warrants be so timely Issued, before the said Eighteenth Day of March next, That the said Constables, Tythingmen, Headboroughs, and other Parish-Officers, may make a General Search for all Persons within the Description before mentioned, and bring them before the said Justices and Magistrates, at some certain Places within the said respective Limits and Divisions, throughout Our Kingdom of Great Britain, on the said Eighteenth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and seven, (which Day and Place is to be Express'd in such Warrants;) and the said Justices and Magistrates are hereby strictly required to attend at the said Time and Place accordingly, to execute the Powers wherewith they are by the said Act intrusted. And that there may not be wanting Persons Authorized to Receive such Recruits, as shall from time to time be Raised in any part of Our said Kingdom, We have given Directions, that a Competent Number of Officers of Our Forces, or other Trusty Persons, shall be Appointed to be ready at all times, to attend the Meetings of such Justices and other Magistrates as shall in any Place Assemble to put the before mentioned Act in Execution. And We do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Our Loving Subjects, that they do in no wise hinder and Obstruct any Person or Persons in the due Execution of the said Act, as they will answer the contrary at their Perils of being Prosecuted for such Offences according to the utmost Severity of Law.

G O D Save the Q U E E N.

Vienna, Febr. 18. N. S. An Imperial Courier arriv'd here some Days ago from Constantinople, who brings Advice, That all Things there were in a peaceable Disposition, and that nothing appear'd which might be thought to tend to a Rupture, either with the Emperor or the Venetians; nor did they seem to make Preparations for any Enterprize of Consequence, except that the Port has been oblig'd to equip Five Men of War to clear the Seas round the Islands of the Archipelago, and rake Satisfaction of the Maltese, who have of late made Descents on several of those Isles, and carried away all the Turks they found in them. The Baron of Stralenheim, Commissioner on the Part of his Swedish Majesty in Silesia, has presented a Second Memorial in behalf of the Reformed on the 8th Instant; though the Proposals in a former on the same Subject were utterly rejected. His Master has sent him new Instructions to insist upon his Demands, and positively to assert, That the Reformed being included in the Treaty of Westphalia, which was the Foundation of the Treaty of Altranstadt, the Immunities given them in the former cannot but be understood as ratified by the latter: Wherefore his Majesty could not depart from his first Intention of seeing the Reform'd, as well as the Lutherans, restor'd to all their ancient Rights and Privileges. The Primate of Poland, accompanied by his Brother the Vice-Chancellor of the Crown, and a small Train, is arriv'd at Olmutz in Moravia. Monsignor Spinola, the new Nuncio to Poland; as also Monsignor Piazzola, whom he is to succeed in that Office, have been in frequent Conference with the Primate. Marshal Staremberg has receiv'd the Emperor's last Orders, and is to set out within few Days to take upon him the Command of the Army in Catalonia.

Berne, Febr. 18. The Deputies of Berne are return'd hither from the Diet of Baden, and have made their Report of what pass'd there to the General Council. All Negotiations relating to the Neutrality of Neuchâtel are suspended till the 11th of March: And the Troops which Monsieur Villars had drawn together, with a Design to surprize Fribourg, are return'd to their Winter-Quarters.

Ratisbon, Febr. 20. The Colleges which compose the General Diet, have come to an unanimous Resolution upon the

Affairs of the War, and transmitted that Resolution to the Imperial Court for Ratification of it. A Copy of the Instrument is sent to his Electoral Highness of Hanover; and in the same a Letter, full of Expressions of the great Satisfaction they take in the Hopes they conceive from his Conduct. They assure the Elector, they will use their utmost Endeavours to make every Prince and State of the Empire concur in their Preparations for an early Campaign. They have oblig'd every Part of the Empire to bring in the Contingent demand'd from it before the 15th of March; and have lodg'd in his Electoral Highness a Power to proceed to Military Execution on such as shall not effectually obey this Act of the Diet within the Time limited.

Kensington, Febr. 23. Her Majesty has been pleas'd to appoint Robert Forder Esq; High Sheriff for the County of Southampton.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c. Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, is pleas'd to direct, That all Men shall be impress'd from any Merchant-Ships or Vessels whatsoever, who shall have Protections from his Royal Highness dated since the 23d of this Month, unless such Men or do belong to Her Majesty's Ships: And all Commanders and Officers of Her Majesty's Ships, Press-Masters, and all others whom it may concern, are hereby required to take Notice thereof accordingly, any Orders to the contrary notwithstanding.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c. Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. is pleas'd to direct, That all the Foremast Men belonging to Her Majesty's Ship the Sunderland, do forthwith repair aboard the Experiment at Deptford, to serve in her; where they will be paid the Wages due to them in the Sunderland, aboard the said Ship Experiment, before she sails from the Nore.
