## A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

ANNE R.

Whereas We have received certain Information, That the Person who, during the Life of the late King James the Second, Pretended to be Prince of Wales, and since his Decease has taken upon himself the Stile and Title of James the Third, King of England, and James the Eighth, King of Scotland, being bred up in the Popish Superstition, and instructed to introduce the French Government into all Our Realms and Dominions, Openly and Traiterously has undertaken an Invasion of this Our Kingdom of Great Britain, with an Armed Force of the French Kings Troops, Our declar'd Enemies, and of divers of our Rebellious Subjects, who have Traiterously adhered to Our said Enemies, in manifest Violation of Our Lawful and Rightful Title to the Crown of these Kingdoms, and of the several Acts of Parliament made, as well for Recognizing the same, as for Settling the Succession to the said Crown in the Protestant Line: And whereas the said Pretended Prince stands now Attainted of High-Treason by an Act of Parliament made in England in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of Our late Brother King William the Third of Glorious Memory, and all manner of Correspondence with the said Pretended Prince, or any of his Adherents, is thereby forbid to all Our Subjects, upon Pain of High Treason: And although all Persons, as well Criminal as other Cases, are bound to take Notice of the Law at their Peril; yet to the Intent that none may think to escape due Punishment, by pretending Ignorance of the Nature of their Crimes, and that nothing may be wanting to Our Part, for the Defence and Preservation of Our Faithful and Loving Subjects; We have therefore thought fit by the Advice of Our Privy-Council, and in pursuance of the Humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons in this present Parliament Assembled, to Publish and Declare the said Pretended Prince, and all his Accomplices, Adherents, Abettors and Advisers, to be Traitors and Rebels. And We do hereby strictly Command and Require all Our good Subjects to use their utmost Endeavours to Seize and Apprehend the said Pretended Prince, who shall at any time be found within any Part of Our Kingdoms or Dominions, and all his Traiterous Confederates and Adherents, and all and every Person and Persons who shall be Aiding and Abetting to the aforesaid Traitors and Rebels, and to Secure their Persons till our further Pleasure shall be known. And we do hereby further strictly Charge and Command all Popish Recusants, Natives and Denizens, who shall be above the Age of Sixteen Years, that they do, according to the Statutes in that behalf made, Repair to their respective Places of Abode, and do not thence Remove or Pass above the Distance of Five Miles until Our Will and Pleasure be further Declared. And We do likewise Charge and Command all Papists, and Persons reputed so to be, except Merchant Strangers, Settled Householders, and other Persons excepted in the Statutes made in that behalf, on or before the Eleventh Day of this Instant March, to Depart out of Our Cities of London and Westminster, and from all Places within Ten Miles Distance of the same. And We do hereby Command the Lord Mayor of London, and all other Justices of the Peace, and other Officers within the said Cities, and Ten Miles of the same, that they make Search for, and Proceed against all such of them as shall presume to Remain, Repair, or Return within the Limits aforesaid, by Tending to them the Declaration mentioned in the Statute made in the First Year of the Reign of Their late Majesties King William and Queen Mary, of Blessed Memory, Intituled, An Act for the removing Papists and Reputed Papists, from the Cities of London and Westminster, and Ten Miles Distance

from the same. And We do likewise Charge and Command all Justices of the Peace, who shall know or be informed, That any Person is Suspected to be a Papist, or Disaffected to Our Government, to Tender to such Person the Declaration aforesaid, and Proceed thereupon by Seizing the Horses and Arms of such Person, and otherwise, according to One other Act made in the said First Year of the Reign of their said late Majesties King William and Queen Mary, Intituled, An Act for the better Securing the Government by Disabling Papists and Reputed Papists. And for the better Discovery of Persons who are Disaffected to Our Government, We do likewise Command all Justices of the Peace, and other Officers in that behalf Authorized, to Tender unto such Person or Persons, as they shall find or be informed are Suspected not to be Well-affected to Our Person or Government, the Oaths that are Appointed by an Act made in the said First Year of the Reign of Their said late Majesties King William and Queen Mary, Intituled, An Act for the Abrogating the Oaths of Supremacy and Allegiance, and Appointing other Oaths: And in case any such Person or Persons shall Refuse to take the same, We do hereby Require due Prosecution to be made thereupon: And in Order thereunto, the said Justices of the Peace are to make and keep Entries and Records of such their Proceedings, that the said Oaths may again be Tended to the Person or Persons who shall so Refuse the same. And we do hereby particularly Charge and Require all Deputy-Lieutenants and Justices of the Peace, That they do frequently meet to Enquire into, and Inform themselves of the Affairs of their respective Counties in relation to the Premises, and take special Care to Preserve the Peace, and Prevent all Unlawful Meetings and Assemblies; and that from time to time they do give Information of their Proceedings and Discoveries to the Lords of our Privy-Council. And We do likewise hereby Charge and Command all Our Lord-Lieutenants, Deputy-Lieutenants, Sheriffs, Bailiffs of Regalities, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Provoests, Bailiffs, and all other Our Officers Civil and Military, strictly to put in Execution all Laws and Statutes whatsoever now in Force within Our Kingdom of Great Britain, against such Persons as have Refused, or shall Refuse to take the Oaths Required by Law.

Given at our Court at Kensington the Sixth Day of March, in the Sixth Year of Our Reign.

Berne, March 3. N. S. Answers are return'd from all the Cantons, to the Circular Letters they receiv'd from hence, concerning the Alterations that Berne desires may be made in the Project of Neutrality for Neufchatel; most of them advise this Canton to agree to the Project as it was deliver'd to the French Ambassador, without insisting any longer upon Amendments. They make it an Argument for acquiescing in the Affair, That the French King has agreed to the Project as now stated; which has been signify'd by his Minister. This Canton hereupon call'd a great Council, and consider'd what Infructions they should give their Deputies against the next Diet. In order to which two Points were propos'd; one was, That they should send to Count Metternich to know his Sentiments about the Project, and what Terms he was willing to agree to. The second, That they should know of him in what manner the King of Prussia and his Allies would reimburse their Charges in maintaining 4000 Men for the Safety of Neufchatel, with relation to past and future Occasions. The first of these Points was carry'd, and Orders sent to the Deputies at Neufchatel to confer with Count Metternich on that Subject; but it was thought fit to defer the Consideration of the second Point till a more seasonable Opportunity.

Offend, March 16. N. S. Advices from Dunkirk of the 14th say, that the pretended Prince of Wales arriv'd there

there on the 18th Instant. He had embark'd the next Day, but that the British Ships appear'd at Grave-ling. They were suppos'd by the Enemy to be the Fleet design'd for Portugal. On the 11th the British Squadron sail'd, and the Enemy disembark'd 12 Battalions that Night; but on the 14th in the Afternoon began again to embark all the Troops which they had landed, and gave out that they would sail without further delay. There are in the Road of Dunkirk Ships of the following Force and Number ready to put to Sea, which are provided with all Sorts of Instruments of War, and Provisions for six Months.

The Mars of 54 Guns, the Jersey 54, the Blackwall 52, the Salisbury 50, l'Auguste 50, le Prothée 46, le Griffon 42, l'Adriade 40, le Tigre 32, la Galère de Venise 32, la Galere d'Amsterdam 32, la Syrene 32, la Trompe Galère 28, la Fidelle 28, le Comte de Tholoufe 28, le Duc de Vendosme 28, l'Escureuil 28, l'Americain 28, le Marquis de Berniers 28, la Comtesse de Fourbin 26, la Revanche 26, la Victoire 26, le Barentin 26, la Subtile 24, le Zephire 24, le petit Soleil 24, la Princesse du Zephire 24, la Diane 22, le grand Soleil 22. Four more of 28 Guns are given to the French King by the Society of Trade. The Hampton-court and Grafton, each of 70 Guns, are making ready with all Expedition; Monsieur Fourbin is to be on board the former of the two last mention'd. This Fleet will be mann'd by 7000 Sailors, five of whom come from Brest and other Ports, the rest belong to Dunkirk. 300 Irish Officers, and as many French Gentlemen; follow the Fortune of this Enterprize. They make no Secret that the Design is on Scotland; but Name the Place in that part of Great Britain where they design to Land, and report that the Country is ready to take up Arms for the Pretender. They give out also, that they have Hostages from those by whom they are invited, now at Paris.

*Drums*, 6th of March at Noon. The Fleet under the Command of Sir George Bingham is under sail, on a Signal given by one of our Scouts, who observ'd Ships to the Westward.

**HIS** Royal Highness, Prince George of Denmark, &c. Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, Ireland, &c. is pleas'd to direct, That all such Seamen who are in, or absent from, and do immediately repair to their Duties aboard the said Ship, where they will be paid their Wages due in her, before she sails from the Nore; otherwise they will be taken up and prosecuted as Deserters.

Whereas all Merchants, Commanders of Ships and others who have Commissions or Letters of Marque, or Commissions for private Men of War against the Enemy, are, by the 21st Article of the Instructions delivered to them with their Commissions, oblig'd from time to time, to observe all such other Instructions and Orders as Her Majesty shall think fit to direct; and whereas Her Majesty hath been pleas'd to direct, by Her Order in Council, dated the 20th of the last Month, That during the present War, Neutral Ships shall be permitted to load Tobacco in this Kingdom on the Account of Foreign Merchants in Amity with Her Majesty, and to carry the same directly to France, in regard the same is no Contraband Commodity; All Persons concerned are to take Notice thereof, and to conform themselves to the same accordingly.

Whereas by the late Act of Parliament, for the better Recruiting Her Majesty's Land Forces and the Marines, the Justices of the Peace are directed to issue their Warrants to the Constables, Tythingmen, Headboroughs and other Parish Officers, to bring before them, on the 18th Day of this Instant Month, such Persons as are within the Description of the said Act, for Recruiting the Land Forces and Marines; Her Majesty has directed, That Officers shall be attending in each respective County-Town by the 15th of this Month at furthest, that they may timely inform themselves of the respective Meetings of the said Justices, on the said 18th Day; at which time the said Officers, or other proper Persons, are directed to attend them, in order to receive such Recruits as shall be then ready to be delivered over unto them; whereof Notice is hereby given for the Information of the Justices of the Peace in the respective Counties.
