danger the Quiet of Swifferland more than that of Neuf-chatel, as it is a Religious as well as Civil Concern, and for that Reason will doubtless be pursu'd with great Heat in a Country where the People of both Religions are extreamly animated against each other upon that account. The State of that Case is this: The County of Tockenburgh is Subject to the Abbot of Sr. Gall, having been purchas'd by one of his Predecessors of the last Lord of that Country and Name, who had no Heir, and be-fore the Sale of it gave large Privileges to his Subjects, for the Security as well of their Religious as Civil Rights. These Rights, tho fully secured before their Lord's alienation of his Title, had the further Sanction, at the time of the Treaty, of the Abbot's being oblig'd for himself and Successors to preserve them. Notwithstanding which, all the Abbots ever fince, and particularly the present, have endeavour'd to undermine both, by all the Arts imaginable; so that the People of both Religious, in that County, finding Matters grow worse every Day, united for their common Defence, and last Year apply'd themselves to the Canton of Zurich for Protection against their Abbot, to which Canton this of Berne join'd in the same Cause; upon which they order'd 6000 Men to be in a readiness to march, that in case the Deputies they were sending to the Abbot could not obtain reasonable Terms of him for the Security of the People of Tockenburgh, those Troops might march into the Country, and force him to When the Deputies came to the Abbot to a Compliance. make their Demands, he finding that the People of both Religions in Tockenburgh, as well as the two Cautons, were united in the Caufe, and refolved to maintain it by force, feemingly granted their Demands, and confented to leave those People in the Enjoyment of their Religion and Li-berty, and so that Difference was compos'd the last Year. But the Abbot laving since found Means to perswade his Catholick Subjects, that it is purely an Affair of Religion, and that his only Design is to abolish Heresie, he has, under that Pretence, divided the Catholicks from the Protestants; of whom the former now join with the Abbot against the latter, whereupon he refuses to suffer any longer the Exercise of the Protestant Religion in that Country. The Cantons of Zurich and Berne are again fending Deputies to the Abbot; and if they cannot pre-vail with him, by fair Means, to leave the Protestants there in the peaceable Enjoyment of their Religion and Liberties, are resolv'd to oblige him to it by force of Arms, which may probably produce a War in this Country, if the Catholick Cantons shall think fit to espouse the Abbot's Calife. The Deputies of this Canton fetout from hence Yesterday to confer with Zurich, where they are to agree upon the Measures that are proper to be taken upon this Occasion.
