Turin, May 5. N. S. The Prince of Wirtemberg arriv'd here last Night from Milan. He is to command a Detachment of 6000 of the Emperor's Troops at *Suzza*, which are already upon their March for that Place. By our last Letters from Milan we hear, that Prince Eugene's Equipage went lately from thence, and is to take its Rout thro' *Bavaria*, in order, as we suppose, to join the Army, which according to some late Advices is to be form'd upon the *Moselle*, under the Command of that Prince. The General who is to be at the Head of the Imperial Troops in these Parts this Campaign, is not yet nam'd; but, it's generally believ'd, that Honour will be conferr'd on Count *Dawn*. We every Day expect Major-General *Stanhope* at this Court, having had News of his passing by *Frankfort* on the 25th of the last Month.

Vienna, May 9. N. S. Prince Eugene of *Savoie* returned hither on the 6th Instant in the Evening, having visited the Courts of *Dusseldorp* and *Hanover* in his Return from *Holland*. They write from *Presburg*, that Prince *Esterhazy*, Palatine of *Hungary*, having gone to perform his Devotions on a Mount *Calvary*, a little way out of *Town*, he narrowly escap'd falling into the Hands of a Party of Malecontents, who seiz'd on his Coach and six Horses, they send daily from hence by *Water*, Provisions, Ammunition, and all other Necessaries for their Army in *Hungary*, where they propose very suddenly to open the Campaign. The Body of the *Danish* Troops, which have been, for some time, quarter'd in *Banah*, is shortly expected here in their way to *Hungary*. Our last Advices from the Queen of *Spain* were of the 4th Instant, and left her Majesty at *Braunau*, on the River *Inn*. The next Day her Majesty was to lye at *Oering*, where she was to meet her Mother, and rest the Day following. When the Queen arriv'd on the Frontiers of *Bavaria*, she was complimented by Deputies from the States of that *Dutchy*, who presented her with a Purse of 2000 Ducats. In her Passage thro' that Country, her Majesty had a Guard of *Danish* Cavalry.

Bern, May 12. N. S. The French Ambassador delaying still to exchange the Ratifications of the Treaty of *Neuchatel*, this Canton has writ a Letter to desire him to appoint a time and place for that Purpose, to which he has not yet return'd any Answer; however, they rely so much upon the Solemn Assurances he has given them, that they have recall'd all the Troops they have kept in *Neuchatel* for the Defence of that County since this Difference, and Count *Metternich* has disbanded the Regiment he had rais'd for the same Service. The Deputies of this Canton that were sent to *Zurich* about the Business of *Tockenburgh* are return'd hither, but not having yet made their Report to the Council of their Negotiation, it is not particularly known what they have done in it; however, it is said in general they have compos'd the Differences which have so long disturb'd that Country.

Berlin May 12. N. S. Letters from *Warlaw* of the fifth Instant give the Palatine of *Sandomir* had suffer'd so much by the March of Troops thro' their Country, that they have been under great Difficulties to furnish their Consingent for the Augmentation of the Crown Army. The Nobility of the Palatine of *Lublin* have offer'd their Personal Service in the next Campaign, and Commission'd

the Castellans to acquaint the General of the Crown with that their Resolution. General *Mazeppa* has notify'd to the Grand General, that he is willing to deliver up the Fortress of *Bialozerkiow*, and desires him to send the Commissaries of the Republick to take possession of it. Letters from *Wilda* of the 29th of *April* inform us, that the Kings of *Sweden* and *Poland* continu'd in their former Quarters; and that his Swedish Majesty, at the Request of King *Stanislaus*, had remitted the Contribution of 10000 Crowns which he demanded of that City.

Brussels, May 21. N. S. The Troops which have had their Quarters upon the *Maese*, and in other remote Garrisons, as also those of *Louvain*, *Mechlen*, and *Liere*, encamp'd this Day at a small distance from the Walls of this Place. His Grace the Duke of *Marlborough* rid out in the Morning to see them on their March, and afterwards took a Review of the Camp; which extends the Right at *St. Ann Bede*, to the Left at *Veevay* near the Grand Causeway. On Thursday the 24th, his Grace designs to advance towards *Enghein*, and will there be join'd by the British Troops, and the rest from *Flanders*; the Forces already encamp'd are all compleat, and in very good Condition. We have no further Account of the Enemy, than that they continue encamp'd in different Bodies, and propose to join to Morrow, or on Wednesday.

Hague, May 22. N. S. We hear the Elector of *Hanover* intended to set out on the twenty first Instant to join the Army upon the *Rhine*. His Son, the Prince *Elector*, is expected here in his way to *Flanders*; where, 'tis said, he will make the ensuing Campaign. Advices from *Hamburg* tell us, that the Troops of *Sweden*, *Prussia* and *Hanover*, to the number of 10000 Men, had Invested that City, being sent thither to put an end to the Animosities between the Magistracy and People. We have receiv'd fresh Intelligence of an Advantage obtain'd by the Muscovites over the advanced Guard of the Swedish Army. The Prince of *Nassau*, Hereditary Governor of *Friesland*, arriv'd at *Amsterdam* on the 18th Instant, and proceeded the same Day on his Journey into *Flanders*, where he is to Command in Quality of General of the Foot. 'Tis said the Duke of *Bavaria* will stay at *Metz* till he can make some probable Conjectures which Way the Allies will bend their course on that side.

Kensington, May 15. On the 11th Instant the Comte de *Briancan*, Envoy-Extraordinary from his Royal Highness the Duke of *Savoie*, had Audience of the Queen; and afterwards of his Royal Highness the Prince of *Denmark*, to congratulate the Disappointment of the Pretender's Invasion on North-Britain with French Troops; being introduc'd by *Sir Charles Cottrell*, Master of the Ceremonies.

That all Fisher-boats of both Nations, which shall be employed in catching Herring, Mackarel, Oysters, Lobsters, and all sorts of flat and fresh Fish, shall not be molested, from the Orcaides to the Land's End of this Kingdom, the Islands of *Guernsey* and *Ferzey* included, and from the height of *Offend* to *Bayone*; but that if any Fishing-boats be found with Salt, or Barrels, or any salted Fish of both Kinds, and taken; they shall be made lawful Prize; His Royal Highness, Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, &c. does hereby strictly charge and require all Captains and Commanders of Her Majesty's Ships and vessels, as also all Persons who now have or shall have private Commissions or Letters of Marque, not to molest any of the Fishing-Vessels belonging to the Subjects of France, within the Limitations before-mentioned, as they will answer the contrary at their Peril.
