Whereas the following Agreement hath been made with the Court of France, viz. That all Fisher-boats of both Nations, which shall be employed in catching Herrings, Mackarel, Oysters, Lobsters, and all sorts of flat and fresh Fish, shall not be molested, from the Oreades to the Land's End of this Kingdom, the Islands of Guernsey and Ferzey included, and from the height of Ostend to Bayone; but that if any Fishing-boats be found with Salt, or Barrels; or any salted Fish of both size, and taken, they shall be made lawful Prize; His koyal Highness, Lord High-Aamiral of Great Britain, &c. does hereby strictly change and require all Captains and Commanders of Fier Majest's Ships and refise sels, as also all Persons who now have or shall have prished commissions or Letters of Marque, not to molest any of the Fishing-Vessels belonging to the Subjects of France, within the Limitations before-mentioned, as they will answer the contrary at their Peril.
