

but others, who were Accomplices in it are apprehended. Those Advices add, that the Dukes of Burgundy and Berry will stay at Valenciennes till the French Army is assembled. We hear from Paris, that the Marechal Villars is extremely dissatisfied that he is to Command in Dauphine, at the Head of Troops to which he is wholly a Stranger. Advices from Spain say, that the Marquis de Bay was encamp'd near Badajos; and that the Duke of Orleans had set out on the seventh from Saragossa, in order to join the Army near Mequinenza. 'Tis said also, that the Duke of Noailles is to March with another Body towards Gironne; but that the great want of Money makes it at present impossible to put the Dispositions they have form'd into execution.

Bristol, May 17. Yesterday came in the Busselton Galley, John East-Master, the Drake Galley, John Eastmount Commander, and the Hunter, Captain Fleming, all three of this Port from Gibraltar. The same Tide came in the Sophia, of this Place from Lisbon; and the Kent Sloop of and frout Jamaica, but last from Kinsale, from whence she set Sail last Wednesdays, and brings an Account, that the Hastings and Shoreham had taken the Jersey, a French Man of War, and carried her into Dublin.

Whitehall, May 15. This Day the late Lord Griffin (one of the Prisoners taken on Board the Salisbury, being attainted by Outlawry for High-Treason committed in the Reign of the late King William) was brought to the Bar of the Queen's-Bench by Virtue of Her Majesty's Writ of Habeas Corpus, directed to the Lieutenant of the Tower of London, in whose Custody he is; and being ask'd what he had to say why Execution should not be awarded against him, and having nothing material to alledge, the Court made a Rule for his Execution, as is usual in such Cases.

Kensington, May 17. This Day the Excellency Baron de Spanheim, Ambassador-Extraordinary of his Majesty the King of Prussia, had Audience of Her Majesty, to notify to Her Majesty the Death of the young Prince of Orange, Grand-Son to the King his Master. He had afterwards audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Denmark, on the same Occasion; having been introduc'd by Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

That all Fish, & other kinds of sea Nations, which shall be employed in catching Herrings, Mackerel, Oysters, Lobsters, and all sorts of fish and other Fish, shall not be molested, from the Orne to the Head's End of this Kingdom, the Islands of Guernsey and Jersey included, and from the height of Ostend to Bayonne, but that if any Fishing-boats be found with Salt, or Barrels, or any salted Fish of both sides, and taken, they shall be made lawful Prize. His Royal Highness, Lord High-Admiral of Great Britain, &c. does hereby strictly charge and require all Captains and Commanders of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels, as also all Persons who now have or shall have private Commissioners or Letters of Marque, not to molest any of the Fishing Vessels belonging to the Subjects of France, within the Limitations before-mentioned, as they will answer the contrary at their Peril.
