Last Sanday being the Prince of Piemont's Ethioday, all the Foreign Ministers avaited upon his Highness, and alterwards complimented their Royal Highnesses on this Occasion; at Night there was a great Appearance of Persons of Quality, who wite entertain'd with Firequories preparted in the Palace-Garden. The Bron de Regals, General de Battaille, with several other Imperial Officers, arriv'd here on the retain Instant, and had the Honotur to wait upon his Royal Highness.
