



elles is Dead. General Zumjungen arriv'd here on the 17th from Milan; to give his Royal Highness an account of the Condition of the Imperial Troops, and to receive his Orders for their Dispositions as to their March out of their Quarters. This Officer return'd yesterday Morning, carrying Orders from his Royal Highness to General Visconti for the Troops to begin their March the next Week for these Parts, the Prussians first, and then the Imperialists, so that we hope our Army may be assembled by the end of the next Month at Bussio, which is appointed for the place of Rendezvous. The Regiment of Colonel des Portes march'd from hence this Morning for the Vall-d'Aost, to reinforce the Troops which his Royal Highness has in those parts. His Royal Highness has already hired 4000 Mules, and given Orders for the hiring of 3000 more, which are thought sufficient for the use of the whole Army during the Campaign. We do not yet hear, that the Marechal de Villars is arriv'd on our Frontier; but are inform'd, that the Duke of Berwick's Equipages were on the way as far as Grenoble, when they receiv'd Orders to return and join him on the Rhine, where he is to Command under the Elector of Bavaria.

*From the Camp at Ferbanck, June 4. N. S.* On Friday the 1st Instant, about 10 at Night, the Enemy decamp'd from Soignies without any Noise; of which His Grace the Duke of Marlborough having Notice at four the next Morning, gave Orders for our Army to be immediately in a Readiness to march; but part of our Horie being already gone out for Forage, the Signal was made for their Return, by firing three Pieces of Cannon. However it was almost Noon before the whole came in, at which time the Army march'd from St. Renelde, and came in the Evening to the Camp of Anderlecht; where his Grace receiving further Advice that the Enemy was continuing their March towards Genappe, his Grace order'd the Army, without halting, to pass the Canal, the Bridges being already made for that Purpose, and to proceed towards Louvain. We march'd accordingly the whole Night, and came yesterday to this Camp, with the Right at the Abby of Corteberg, and the Left at Ferbanck. The Enemy, who had given out the Design of their March was to possess themselves of Louvain, to prevent our passing the Dyle, upon notice of our advancing this way, encamp'd on Saturday Night with their Right near Genappe, and their Left at braine L'Aleu, where they still continue. The Enemies marching in the Night gave an Opportunity to great Numbers of their Men to desert, and several small Bodies came over to us on the March, with Sergeants and Drums at their Heads. The Convoy and Transports from Harwich, having on Board a Battalion of Her Majesty's Guards, and two Regiments of Foot, arriv'd the first Instant at Ostend; the Men landed the next Day, and march'd to Bruges, where Bows were ready to transport them to Ghent, from whence, after a few Days rest, they are to march to the Army.
