At the Court at Kensington, June 26, 1708.

Present the Queen's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day, by Her Majesty's Command, Charles Duke of Bolton, Thomas Duke of Leeds, Thomas Earl of Wharton, and Henry Earl of Bindon, were sworn of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, pursuant to an Act of Parliament in that Behalf pass'd the last Session; Entitled, An Act for rendering the Union of the two Kingdoms more Entire and Compleat.

And also this Day the most Noble Evelin, Marquis of Dorchester, was, by Her Majesty's Command, sworn one of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Lisbon, June 26. N. S. The Marquis de Fronteira having Advice. That the Duke of Ossuna was returning into Andalusia with his Troops, and that the Marquis de Bay had sent the Conde d'Aguilar with a Detachment of 2000 Foot and 1000 Horse, to fall upon our Troops, who are demolishing Valença, thought it a proper Opportunity to attack the Marquis de Bay in his Camp, and accordingly march'd the 22d, early in the Morning, a League and a half, to the Xevora, before he was discover'd; but the Enemy having Advice of his passing that River, struck their Tents, and march'd away with great precipitation and confusion, sending some Squadrons of Horse to observe our Army, and favour the Retreat of their own; upon the appearance of which Squadrons, it was thought fit to form our Army, and march in order of Battel to the Enemy; but whilst this was doing, the Enemy got off in great disorder, and retir'd to Montejo. The Conde d'Aguilar finding us at Valença better prepar'd to receive him than he expected, return'd without making any Attempts; thus in all probability the Campaign is at an end, tho' the Marquis de Fronteira has Orders from Court to keep the Field as long as it may consist with the Preservation of his Troops.

Milan, June 16 N. S. There fell so great Rains here on the 10th Instant, that her Catholick Majesty deferr'd her publick Entry 'till the Afternoon of the next Day, which was accordingly made in the most solemn manner. The Pomp was open'd by four Troops of Curassiers, who were follow'd by the Chancellor, Rector and several Orders of the University in their proper Habits, with Gold Chains, and other Ensigns of Distinction, according to their respective Quality. After these came eight Trumpets richly dress'd, preceding the 60 Decurions, the great Chancellor, the Privy-Council, and Senare, attended by all the other great Officers of the State and City. When these had pass'd, a Troop of Gentlemen and Persons of the first Rank immediately preceded the Prince of Lorraine, Bishop of Osnabrug. He was follow'd by her Majesty's Household, and a Guard of Swiss, in the middle of whom appear'd the Queen her self in an open Chariot, under a magnificent Canopy supported by four Doctors, one of each Faculty. From the Roman Gate to the Palace, the Houses were adorn'd with rich Tapestries, and the Street lin'd with the Militia under Arms. The Queen return'd the Salutations which were given her by the People in the most graceful and condescending manner. Her Majesty was receiv'd at the Gate of the Metropolitan Church by the Cardinal Archinto, at the Head of the Chapter. After Te Deum was Sung the Queen went to the Palace, at the Entrance of which the Canopy and all its Ornaments were giv'n to the Plunder of the Soldiers upon Duty. All the Publick Places of the City were beautify'd with Illuminations; and two great Eagles were erected before the great Church, and the Palace, with proper Devices, in the midst of which were plac'd the Arms of the King of Spain. On the 12th Instant Cardinal Grimani and Cardinal Morigia had Audience of her Catholick Majesty. The former is lately arriv'd here from Rome, and is preparing for his Journey to Naples in quality of Viceroy. 'Tis said her Majesty will not leave this Place 'till the Troops design'd for Catalonia are land-ed there.

Hamburg, June 26. N. S. On the 23d Instant, the Charges of the Expedition which was undertaken to compose the Disturbances of this City, were sett'd by the Magistracy and Count Guildenshiern. The Swedes are to receive 75760 Crowns, the Prussians 55111, the Hanoverians 29042, they of Wolfenbutter 46343. It was then agreed, that all these Forces which were employ'd in this Service, should forthwith retire, except the Guards appointed for the Security of the Imperial Commission. A Battalion of the Troops of Hanover began their March yesterday to the Upper Rhine. To Morrow, and the Day following, all the rest of the Forces are to decamp and move towards their several Countries. The Council has appointed 100 Boats for Transporting such as are to pass the Elbe. Count Guildenshiern sent, on this Occasion, a Letter to the Ministers of her Britannick Majesty, wherein he acknowledg'd their part in this Negotiation in the most obliging Terms. The Magistrates of the Town have also made their Compliments to these Ministers for their good Offices to the City, during their unhappy Divisions. The Imperial Commission meet every Day, and as soon as the Magistrates and Citizens shall have laid before them their several Grievances and Demands, they intend to proceed with all possible Diligence, 'till the Affair is brought to a satisfactory Conclusion. The Ministers of Denmark and Holstein have left this City. The former are gone to meet the King their Master, at Gluckstadt in Holstein; and those of Holstein direct their Course to Gottorp. We hear from Poland, that the Negotiation of the Sieur Bonac, Minister of France, was very unsuccessful; the Party of the Crown's General Sieniawski being resolv'd against acknowledging Stanislaus for their King.

Edinburg, June 20. Yesterday there came into the Road of Leith three English Frigots with a French Prize, laden with Sugar, Indigo and Logwood; valu'd at 16000 l. Sterling.

Falmouth, June 21. On the 19th Instant came in nine Sail from Swanzev, laden with Coals, under Convoy of her Majesty's Ships the Southampton and Lizard, who are now gone to the Eastward, with about 50 Sail more.

Plumouth, June 22. Yesterday came in the Royal Ann and Triumph, and a Fireship from the Westward, with 14 Merchant Ships for Ireland and the West-Indies. This Day came in her Majesty's Ship the Pembroke, with a French Merchant Ship of about 130 Tuns, which she hath taken, laden with Wine, Brandy and Salt, for Newfoundland.

Yarmouth, June 25. Yesterday pass'd through our Road divers laden Colliers to the Southward, who came from Newcastle. This Day sail'd hence her Majesty's Ships the Tilbury, Chatham, Newcastle, Ruby and Gosport, with the Russia Fleet under their Convoy; as did at the same time a Fleet of light Colliers for Newcastle.

London, June 25. We have receiv'd the following Advice from Fort St. George by way of Denmark, dated September 25, 1707.

In February last the Mighty Aureng-Zeb departed this Life, in the 91st Year of his Age, and the 51st of his Reign, and left behind him four Sons. Upon his Decease his second Son Azzum-Shaw took upon him the Title of King, and immediately march'd towards Dely, the Capital City of Indufan, to ascend the Throne; but Shaw-Alern, the eldest Son, sent an Army against him, headed by one of his Sons, and gave him Battel near Agra, in which Action were slain Azzum-Shaw and his two Sons, and on both sides fell about 80 Omrahs, and above 10000 Men: But tho' this Battel took away the Life and Pretensions both of Azzum-Shaw and his sons, there is still a Competitor for the Empire; for the great Aureng-Zeb having a peculiar Fondness and Affection for his youngest Child Cavne-Bux, deliver'd up to him some time before his Death the Kingdoms of Vizipour, Golconda and Carnata, which were all his own Conquests towards the South

South

South. That Prince, who is, at present, possess'd of all those Nations, is join'd by one of the most powerful Omrahs of the Country, as well as by Ram-Rajah the Son of Sevijah, with 40000 Morotta Horse. Shaw-Alem, who is now upon the Throne, is marching at the Head of a formidable Army against him, with a design to put an end to the Contest for the Crown by a decisive Battle with Cawne-Bax. The other Son Egbert remaining a Refugee in Persia, without Interest to make any Head, or Genius to conceive any great Undertaking.

Whitehall, June 26. This Day Her Majesty and his Royal Highness went from Kensington to Windsor.
