THe Lord Major, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of this place, having taken into their consideration the many great and acceptable favors done by his Grace the Duke of Ormond late Lord Lieutenant, and by his Son the Right Honorable the Earl of Ossory late Lord Deputy of this Kingdom of Ireland, by procuring several concessions and additions of honor and advantage to this City, and promoting the Privileges of His Majesties Royal Chamber here & Ordered that his Lordship the Earl of Ossory be forthwith presented with the freedom of this City under its common seal, and that their Records prepare a letter of thanks to accompany the same under the seal of the City Office, with their request of his acceptance thereof, as a monument of their Gratitude and Affection to his Lordship.

Ladiz, Jan 26. Sir *Thomas Allen* is in this Bay with five of his Frigates to take in Victuals, intending in few daies to put again to Sea. His Excellency the Lord Howard expects the resolution of the Emperor of Morocco, concerning a Treaty by Commissioners, since he cannot with safety adventure his person amongst those people, who are not yet fixed in their obedience to their said Emperor, and in the meant time arrived here to divert himself in taking a view of this country; but has ordered part of his Train to be embark'd on a Frigate bound for England.

Warsaw, Feb. 26. We are now informed from Vienna that the Arch-Duchess is designed to begin her journey from thence the 28th of this month, and the King accordingly intends to meet her at *Czenstochow*, where the Marriage is to be privately solemnized, and for whose reception and entertainment the Kings Treasurer and other Officers, are dispatched thither to make provisions.

The News of her departure was brought hither by a servant to the Arch-Duchess, with very obliging Letters to His Majesty full of tenderness and affection, whom his Majesty immediately dismissed with an equal return of kindness, and a present of two rich Mantles of Cloth of Gold lined with Ermine and Sables, and other rich defenses against the coldness of the season.

The Marriage being thus far advanced, the opposition appears not so great as before, and the Bishop of *Cracovic* who declared himself most averse to it seems now to be more satisfy'd, as does also the High Chancellor, though they both pretend to be highly concerned for the liberty of the Republick, which they intend to demonstrate in the ensuing Diet, though tis feared much to the diminution of the Royal Authority.

The preparatory Diets in the several Provinces are many of them met, this of *Warsaw* assembled the 22, and ended in three days as happily as could be expected, not only with an allowance but an approbation of the Kings Marriage, and tis hoped many of the other Dietives may follow this good example.

The affairs in *Ukrania* have not so good an aspect, a great number of the Tartars having made an incursion into *Podolia*, firing several Towns and Villages, and carrying off with them much plunder, a great drove of Cattle, and many Men Women and Children into Captivity, leaving a considerable part of the Countrey without inhabitants.

Marshal *Sobieski* upon intelligence of this irruption, sent out a strong party of Horse to attend them; but the Enemy kept so close together in a body, that they made good their retreat without any considerable damage.

The Basha of *Silistria* by whose command this irruption was made, ordered at the same time a body of the Ottoman forces to march towards *Kanientz*; which was before this, hindered and blocked up to which he intends to lay a formal siege; and for that end and purpose has taken to his assistance a body of the *Krim Tartars*; not only for the confirmation of *Ukrania* under the obedience of the Grand Seigneur, but with an intention to make a farther Conquest upon his Kingdom of *Polan*.

The *Moscovites* have lately together a considerable Army on the other side the *Borsthene*, and seem not only to refuse us the surrender of *Kiovia* to which they were obliged by former Treaty; but to have a design to make their farther advantages upon the civil dissensions and disorders of this Kingdom.

Naples, Jan. 28. We hear of many great Wracks which have lately happened in the Gulfe, and amongst divers others, of the loss of a great Venetian man of War, call'd away near *Baru*, where perished the remaining forces of *Davaria* which served formerly in *Candia*, with many other soldiers, 7 or 8 persons only having the good fortune to escape.

From *Oranto* we are informed that a Turkish Galeot was run on ground near that City, having on board 130. Turks, who escaping to land, were all of them taken prisoners, by command from the Duke d'Alfano, and are after they have made their usual Quarantine to be sent hither.

The affairs of *Sardigha* being not yet settled, Gallies are specially to be dispatched hence with some Companies of foot; to be sent to the Duke de *St. German* the Viceroy of that Island, to be able him to reduce the factious spirits of the said Island to Obedience.

Our Viceroy is treating with the most principal Merchants of this place for a return of the sum of 500. thousand Crowns for the reviv'd of his most Catholick Majesty in *Milan* and *Flanders*; and has hired a Genovish ship which is fitting up to transport 25 Excellent horses, and other presents which he has designed for *Don Juan of Austria*.

The Viceroy has commanded all the Officers of the forces belonging to this Kingdom to take care of their respective charges, and to have all their companies in readiness, to obey what orders shall be sent them by the 15th of the next month, and has in the mean while disposed of some Troops of Horse and Companies of Foot for the security of the Kingdom.

Venice, Feb. 7. The Senate having received from the Heydukes of *Perasho* in *Dalmatia*, an humble petition, desiring an allotment of land for their habitations since by the Treaty of peace they were excluded from making their advantages upon the Turks, have upon consideration of their Requests given them a dilatory answer, that they cannot make them the assignation desired, till of the said Commissioners on both sides had met and agreed upon the bounds of their Territories; in the mean while they have endeavoured to oblige them with fair promises, and have dismissed their Envoy with Chains of Gold, and Medals, and taken order to furnish the said Heydukes

dukes with provision for their present subsistence till greater care can be taken of them; who with those of *St George* and of *Macafca* may make up a considerable body of men to be in readiness upon all occasions.

The Grand Visir has not yet removed from *Candia*; nor the Grand Seignor from *Ibessalonique* or *Larissa*, whete he spends his time in divertisements, but with dissatisfaction to the Countrey, who are burden'd with the Quartering of about 30 thousand persons attending on the Court; many new Gallies are building at *Constantinople* against the next Spring.

Our forces returning from *Candia* have had ill and dangerous returns, and a great number of them cast away at sea; besides others formerly men ion'd we have now information of the loss of a Tartan, and a man of War called the *Judgement of Salomon* with above 2000 men, most of them *Bavarians*.

Most of the foreign companies arrived from that service are dissist with satisfaction, and their Officers with chains of Gold and Medals, in testimony of their merits in the late war.

For the future it is ordered that no ships arriving from the *Levant*, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine; those parts being now known to be free from all infection.

We have advice that the Grand Seignor has lately ordered the raising of 25 thousand men for the increase of his Army, without declaring upon what design; but that he had caused 2 *Sangjacs* to be empaled, for advising him to a War with *Poland*.

Vienna, Feb. 8 The Empress *Elsanor* with her Daughter the future Queen of *Poland* intended the 30th past to have began their journey for *Poland*, and in order thereunto several Waggonns were sent away because laden with provisions with a guard for their security, but the great Rains and Snows caused so great an inundation that it was thought necessary to defer their departure till better weather; the Council of war had then also ordered six Regiments to attend them on the way, whereof two were to have been their Guard through *Moravia*; two other through *Silesia*; and the other to have marched as far as *Czenstokow* the place designed for the Queens Marriage; since this, several Couriers arrived from *Poland* to press her departure; whereupon, although the waters of the *Danube* were not so much abated as could be desired, Order was given for the passing over all the Train and Baggage, with the Regiments of *Schuid* and *Heister*; and yesterday the Empress and Arch-Duchess having taken their leaves of the Emperour, passed also the River, and this night intend to lie at *Ebersdorf*, having in their Train 40 Coaches and 6 Horses. Yesterday His Imperial Majesty dispatcht away a Courier to the King of *Poland*, to give him at the same time an account of the recovery of his health, and the departure of his Royal Bride.

On Sunday last the Emperour first quitted his Chamber in perfect health, and the same day according to custom received the annual Present made to him by the Jews.

Prince *Charles* of *Lorraine* received about the same time by an Express, the news of the death of Duke *Francois* his Father, which he communicated to the Emperour, and has since received the Compliments of all the great personages of the Court, who condoled with him for his loss.

From *Hungary*, we are informed that the Governor of *Gemorra*, having intelligence that about 4000 of the *Turks* intended to take the opportunity of the frost to pass the *Danube*, with a design to have committed some spoils in the Emperours dominions, the better to have obliged them to become contributory to them, caused a report to be spread abroad, that several of the Emperours Regiments were upon their march into those parts, which had the success he intended, and diverted the *Turks* from their intended incursion.

The Count *de Montecuculi*, President of the Council of War, is lately gone to *Raab*, to take order for the security and defence of the Kingdom of *Hungary*, and to quiet the spirits of the people, who are in great apprehensions of fresh disturbances; which are not a little heightened by a report spread amongst them, of a battle seen in the air about *Leopoldstadt*, between two phantostick armies; and at the same time a thunder heard imitating the noise both of canon and musquets.

Brussels, Feb. 25. The Reformation of the Army is still advanced, care is taken for Moneys for a months pay to be given to all the forces of this Province, after which, tis believed the Reform will be publisht; as to the Cavalry, they are already resolv'd upon the disbanding of 43 Troops, besides the Regiments of the Prince *de Chimay*, Prince *de Navie*, and Duke of *Aerschbar*, the latter keeping up only 100 Horse as his own Troop.

The Generallhip of the Horse is not yet conferred, the Prince *de Ligue* continues as yet at his Countrey house preparing for his voyage to *Sicily*; but intends not to set forwards till the beginning of *April*, and then to travel by Land through *Germany* and to take *Rome* in his way.

From *Besunçon* they seem still doubtful of the intentions of the French, since at the late Fair they bought up all the Horses which were fit for service, or to be employed in their Train of Artillery.

Weymouth, Feb. 16. The Fourteenth instant arrived here a vessel of this Port from *St. Maloes*, and one Ketch from the *Chbrante*, telling us that about 30 French ships of War lie in that River, but the fitting them up is suspended upon the probability of a good correspondence with *Flanders*, and that Five new Fregats are there upon the Stocks ready to be launched, and are designed to carry from Fifty to Sixty Guns apiece.

The Fifteenth instant arrived here Four small ships from *Burdeaux*, *Cherbourg*, and other parts of *France*, and on the same day sailed hence Six of our *Newfoundland* Traders on the account of the Fishing.

London, Feb. 20. On Monday last the Parliament assembled according to the Term appointed at their last Prorogation, whither His Majesty went in Coach preceded by His Trumpets and Kettle Drums at the head of his new Guards, and follow'd by His Horse Guards, and in his Robes took His Seat in the House of Lords, where he was attended by the House of Commons with their Speaker, to whom he made a Gracious Speech, which was enlarged on by another from the Lord Keeper, both of which have been since publisht: the House of Commons returning to their own House, and voting His Majesties Speech to be taken into consideration the Thursday following, adjourned themselves to that day.
