Gidia, Ian 26. Sir Thom w Allen is In this Bay with five of his Frigars to take in Victuals, intending in few daies to pur again to Sea. His Excellency the Lord Homard expects the resolution of the Emperor of Morocco, concerning a Treaty by Commissioners, since he cannot with safety adventure his person amongst those people, who are not yet fixed in their obedience to their said Emperor, and is in the mean time arrived here to divert himself in taking a view of this country; but has ordered part of his Train to be embarqued on a Frigat bound for England.

Warfaw, Fan. 26. We are now informed from Vienna that the Arch--Dutchels is defigned to begin her journey from thence the 28th of this month, and the King accordingly intends to meet her at Czenflochow, where the Matriage is to be privately folemnized, and for whose reception and entertainment the Kings Treasurer and other Officers, are dispatched thither to make provisions.

The News of her departure was brought hither by a lervant to the Arch-Dutchels, with very obliging Lettrs to His Majesty sull of tenderness and affection, whom his Majesty immediately dilmist with an equal return of kindness, and a present of two rich Manules of Cloth of Gold lined with Erminesand Sables, and other rich desences against the coldness of the leason.

The Marriage being thus far advanced, the opposition appears not so great as before, and the Bishop of Grac vie who declared himself most averse to it seems now to be more satisfy'd, as does also the High Chancellour, though they both pretend to be highly concerned for the liberty of the Republick, which they intend to demonstrate in the ensuring Diet, though its feared much to the diminution of the Royal Authority.

The preparatory Diets in the feveral Provinces are many of them met, this of Warfam affembled the 22, and ended in three days as happily as could be expected, not only with an allowance but an approbation of the Kings Marriage, and tis hoped many of the other Dietives may follow this good xar ple

The affairs in Ukrania have not so good an aspect, a great number of the Tartarshaving made an incursion into Podolia, si ing several Towns and Villages, and carrying off with them much plunder, a great drive of Garde, and many Men Women and Children into Captivity, leaving a considerable part of the Country without inhabitants.

Marshal Esbissai upon intelligence of this irreption, lent out a strong party of Horfe to attend them, but the Enemy kept so close together in a body, that they made good their cetteas Without any considerable damage.

The Bassa of Silistria by whose command this proof was made, ordered as the same time a body of the Ottoman specific march rowards Kanients. - From Otranto we are informed that a Turkish Galeot was run on ground near that City, having on board 120. Turks, who escaping to land, were all of them taken prisoners, by command from the Duke d'Alesano, and are after they have finde their usual Quarantine to be sent hither.

The affairs of Sardigna being not yet letted, Galleys are specify to be defined there with some Companies of foot; to be sent to the Duke me St. German the Viceroy of that Island Julie better to e attle him to reduce the factious spirits of the sai Island to Obschence.

Ou Viceroy is treatiff with the most principal Marchan s of this place for a return of the sum of 500, thousand Crowns for the service of his most Cardonck Maje-sty in Milan and Flanders; and has hited a Genous thip which is sitting up to stamport 25 Bacellent horses, and o her presents which he has designed for Don Itam of Austria.

The Viceroy has commanded all the Officers of the forces belonging to this Kingdom to take care of their respective charges, and to have all heir companies in realistics, to obey that orders Mollibe sent them by the right of the next moneth, and has in the mean white disposed of some Troops of Hote and Companes of Foot for the security of the Kingdome.

Venice, Feb., 7. Our forces returning from Candia have had ill and dangerous returns, and a great number of them cast away at lea; besides others formerly men ion'd we have now information of the loss of a Tartan, and a man of War called the Indgement of Salomon with above 2000 men,

most of them Bavarians.

Most of the forreign companies arrived from that service are district with satisfaction, and their Officers with chains of Gold and Medals, in testimony of their merits in the late war.

For the future it is ordered that no ships arriving from the Levant, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine; those parts being now known to be free from all infection.

We have advice that the Grand Seignior has lately ordered the railing of 25 thouland men for the encrease of his Army, without declaring upon what design; but that he had caused 2 Sangjacs to be empaled, for advising him to a

War with Poland.

Vienna, Feb. 8 The Empress Eleanor with her Daughter the future Queen of Poland intended the 30th patt to have began their journey for Poland, and in order thereunto several Waggons were sent away before laden with provisions with a guard for their security, but the great Rains and Snows caused so great an innundation that it was thought necessary to defer their departure till better weather; the Council of war had then also ordered six Regiments to attend them on the way, whereof two were to have been their Guard through Moravia 3 two other through Silefia; and the other to have marched as far as Czenfiokow the place designed for the Queens Marriage; fince this, several Couriers arrived from Poland to press her departure; whereupon, although the waters of the Danube were not so much abated as could be desired, Order was given for the passing over all the Train and Bag-gage, with the Regiments of Schuid and Heister; and yesterday the Empress and Arch-Dutchels baying taken their leaves of the Emperour, passed also the River, and this night intend to lie at Ebersdorf, having in their Train 40 Coaches and 6 Horses. Yesterday His Imperial Majesty dispatche away a Courier to the King of Poland, to give him at the same time an account of the tecovery of his health, and the departure of his Royal Bride.

On Sunday last the Emperour first quitted his Chamber in perfect health, and the same day according to cu-stome received the annual Present made to him by the

Jews.

Prince Charles of Lorraine received about the same time by an Express, the news of the death of Duke Francis his Father, which he communicated to the Emperor; and has since received the Compliments of all the great personages of the Court, who condoled with him for his loss.

From Hungary, we are informed that the Governor of Gomorra, having intelligence that about 4000 of the Turks intended so take the opportunity of the frost to pass the Danube, with a delign to have committed some spoils in the Emperors dominions, the better to have obliged them to become contributary to them, caused a report to be spread abroad, that several of the Emperors Regiments were upon their march into those parts, which had the success he istended, and diverted the Turks from their insended incursion.

The Count de Montecuculi, President of the Council of War, is lately gone to Raab, to take order for the security and desence of the Kingdom of Hungary, and to quiet the spirits of the people, who are in great apprehensions of fresh disturbances; which are not a little heightned by a report spread amongst them, of a battle seen in the air about Leopoldstadt., between two plantostick armies; and at the same time athunder heard imitating the noise both of canon and musquets.

Erussels, Feb. 25. The Reformation of the Army is still advanced, care is taken for Moneys for a months pay to be given to all the forces of this Province, after which, its believed the Reform will be publisher as to the Cavalry, they are already resolved upon the disbanding of A3 Troops, besides the Regiments of the Prince de Chimas, Prince de Mavie, and Duke of Aerschar, the latter keeping up only 100 Horse as his own Troop.

The Generalthip of the Horse is not yet conserved a the Prince de Ligne continues as yet at his Countrey house preparing for his voyage to Sivily hous intends not to ket sotwards till the beginning of Markl, and then to travel by Land through Germany and to take Kame in his way.

From Besungon they seem still doubtful of the intentions of the French, since at the late Fair they bought up all the Horses which were sit for service, or to be emploied in their Train of Artillery.

Weymonth, Feb. 16. The Fourteenth inflant arrived here a vessel of this Port from St. Mallogs, and one Ketch from the Charante, telling us that about 30 French ships of War lie in that River, but the fitting them up is suspended upon the probability of a good correspondency with Flanders, and that Five new Fregats are there upon the Stocks ready to be launched, and are designed to carry from Fisty to Sixty Guns apiece.

The Fifteenth instant arrived here Four small ships from Burdeaux, Cherbourg, and other parts of France, and on the same day sailed hence Six of our Newfoundland Traders

on the account of the Fishing.

London, Feb. 29. On Monday last the Parliament affembled according to the Term appointed at their last Prorogation, whither His Majesty went in Coach preceded by His Trumpets and Kettle Drums at the head of his new Guards, and follow'd by His Horse Guards, and in his Robes took His Seat in the House of Lords, where he was attended by the House of Commons with their Speaker, to whom he made a Gracious Speech, which was enlarged on by another from the Lord Keeper, both of which have been since publisht: the House of Commons returning to their own House, and voting His Majesties Speech to be taken into confideration the Thursday following, adjourned themselves to that day.
