This Assistance they have sent to Zurich, who, 'tis not doubted, will be of the same Opinion, and will join with Berne in this Reply; which, its thought, will effectually silence the Canton of Switz. In the mean time his Electoral Highness is obliged to defer any Design which may be formed against the Enemy, 'till the Floods are abated, and the Ways become more passable. There have march'd through Veterania about 1500 Horse, among which are some Dragoons and Hussers, in order to join Prince Ru-

gene's Army. On the 16th Instant two Troops of Cuirassiers, of the Regiment of Palsi, pass'd through this City, towards Brabant, and are to be follow'd by 8 or 16 Regiments of Saxons, who are also in motion towards the Camp of that Prince. We have just now receiv'd Advice, That his Electoral Highness of Hanover hat detach'd Count Merci, at the head of a very great Body, towards the Upper Alsatia, while another Party of 800 Men is sent from Frillourg into the Black-Forest. The Elector of Bavaria is now indispos'd at Strasburg. He hath order'd the greater part of the Troops which guarded the Lines of Croon-Weissenburg to march thither, to prevent the Passage of the Imperial Army over the Rhine near that Place We have made publick Rejoicings for the Glorious Victory obtain'd over the French near Audenarde; but are very impatient to hear surther Particulars of a Battel, which was won after so long a March of the Allies to come to the Action, so great an Inequality of Numbers when it began, together with such sudden and fortunate Councils taken in the Eugagement it felt.

From the Camp at Wervick, July 16. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough continued the 13th at Audenarde, as well to repose the Troops, after the Faugues of a long March, and a Battel, as to give the necessary Orders for the disposal of the great Numbers of Prisoners, who were found then to amount to near 7000, besides above 700 Officers, among which are a Lieutenant-General, 3 Majors-General, and 4 Brigadiers; they are all General 3 Majors-General and 4 Brigadiers; they are all order'd to Brussels, and will be sent from thence to several Towns in Holland. At Midnight the Comte de Lottum was detach'd with 40 Squadrons and 30 Battalions towards Menin, with Orders to pursue his March from thence directly to the Enemy's Lines, between Ypres and Warneton; the Army march'd at fix in the Morning, and came to the Camp of Helchin, from whence they continued their March vesserally works. nu'd their March yesterday Morning, and encamp'd with the Right at Menin, and the Left near the Lines, which our Detachment had forc'd at seven in the Morning, and taken about 500 Prisoners, being all the Men left for the Guard of their several Posts. Monsieur de Vendosme, after he had retir'd to Ghent, posted his Army behind the Canal between that Place and Bruges, their Head-Quarters being at Lovendeghem; where, according to our last Advices, they still continue. The last of the Foot of Prince Eugene's Troops arriv'd the :4th at the Camp near Brussels, where they have join d the rest of his Army, and are to remain 'till further Orders. His Highness continues still here, The Colonel, who commanded 2 Detachment of 300 Men at Warneton, some hoers before he was oblig'd to furrender, had receiv'd a Letter from the Duke of Berwick from Tournay, exhorting him to defend their Lines, in order to preserve their Communication, and affuring him he would be with him as this Day with a confiderable Reinforcement. We are told he is tince gone to Lifle. We have Advice that Monfieur la Motte is come from Bruges to Ypres with nine Battalions, two Regiments of Horse, and one of Dragoons. Orders are given for levelling the Enemies Lines with all possible Diligence.

From the Camp at Wervick, July 19. N. S. Since we began to demolish the Lines, several Detachments have been sent into the Enemy's Countries. One of 500 Horse and 300 Dragoons, commanded by Brigadier Dewitz, advanc'das sar as Arras, 12 Leagues off, and burnt the Subburbs of that Place, which has struck a great Consternation through the whole Country; they are return'd this Morning with a good Number of Hostages, besides 40 Prisoners, having lost only nine Men in their March. The German and Palatine Troops of the Prince of Savoy's Army are advanc'd this way, and are expected to him our Army in five Days; but the Hessians and Saxons con-

tinue near Bruffels, under the Command of the Hereditary Prince of Hesse, for the Security of those Parts. This Day being appointed for a solemn Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the Victory obtain'd near Audenarde, was observed very religiously through the whole Army; and in the Evening we rejoye'd with a triple Discharge of our Arrillery and small Arms. Notwithstanding that the Ca-

nal is between us, the Enemy continue to entrench be-tween Ghent and Bruges.

The Imperial and Palatine Troops of Prince Eugene's Army a.e advanced as far as Acth, where they last 'till further Order. The heavy Baggage of our Army which came with them from Brussels, continues their March this Day, conducted by six Battal ons of our Troops, which were lest for their Guard, and 1000 German Horse; the latter will be reliev'd to morrow Morning by 2000 of our Horse, who have Orders to pass the Schelde this Evening, and to attend the Baggage to the Camp to morrow. The Duke est Berwick having put part of the Troops he brought from the Moselle into Tournay and Lise, is with the rest at Doway. The Passe of our heavy Artillery up the Lys, or the Schelde, being prevented by the Enemy's keeping Possession of Ghent, all possible diligence is using to bring part of it by Water to Antwerp, and so to Brussels; the rest is order'd from Maestriest, and great numbers of Horses are providing for this Service. Yesterday our Parties beat two of the Enemies, of which they kill'd 20, and brought in 30 Prisoners.
