That the faid Day of Publick Thank giving be Religiously Observed by all Our Loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tenuer the Favour of Almighty God, and upon pain of Suffering such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as shall Contemn or Neglect the Performance of so Religious and Necessity a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We Charge that incontinent, this Our Preclamation sees, we Pass to the Averat Cross of Ediphyrich. clamation seen, ye Pess to the Aiercat Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend ignorance; Ana Oragins Our Solicitor to cause fend Printed *Copies thereof to the Sheriff of the several Shires, Stewarts of the Stew reries, and Baillies of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We Ordain to feethe same Published, and Apaire, the same Stewarts of the same Stewart points them to fend Doubles hereof to the several Paroch Kirks within their Bounds; That upon the Lord's Day im-mediately preceding the said Day above-mention'd, the same may he Publish'd and Read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

Vienna, July 11 N. S. On Monday last the Marriage of the King of Portugal with Mary-Ann, Arch-Dutchels of Austra, was solemniz'd at Cloyster-Neuburg, the Emperor standing Proxy for his Portugueze Majesty, and Cardinal Saxe-Zeitz, assisted by four Prelates, performing the Office of Matrimony. The Ceremony was, in all refigedts, the same with that observed in the late Marriage of the King of Spain with the Princess of Wolfenbuttel. The Queen of Fortugal took Leave of the Imperial Court at the Church Door. at the Church-Door, and went and lay that Night at Horneuburg, a Bridge having been laid over the Danube on purposs for her Passage. She continued there Yesterday the whole Day, to receive the Visits of the Imperial Court, and the Compliments of the foreign Ministers, Court, and the Compilinents of the foreign Miniters, and others. Count Traun, Marshal of Lower Austria, at the head of the States of the Country, waited on her Majesty with a Compliment of Congratulation, and a Purse of Acoo Ducars, as is usual. The Emperor and Empress returned last Night to the Favourie; but this Empreis returned in Algert Merning the Emperor went Post to take Leave of his Silver before she fir out on her Journey. Hague, July 27. N. S. The Saxon and Hessian Troops of the Army of Frince Eugene are encamped near Fort Monerry. in the Neighbourhood of Bruss L. On the 20th Instant there were a great Number of Boats, laden with Arrillery and Stores of War, fent from Delit to Ant-The great Ordnance which is at Sas-van Ghent is also to be convey'd to Answerp, from whence it will be brought to Brussels. The whole Train is to be drawn by Horses from that City, to the Grand Army of the Al-The Commanders in Chief at Sas-van-Ghent and Hulst have desir'd Leave to lay the Country around those Places under Water, which has I een consented to. Governors of the other Frontier Towns have taken the same Measures, as well to distress the Enemy in the Conveyance of Provisions, as to make a Rerreat from their present Camp less practical le. Letters of Yester-day from the Duke of Marlborough's Camp infermus, That there were 44 Standards, 42 Colours, and 10 Kettel-Drums, brought in thither, which were aken in the late Battel near Audenarde. There were several others taken by the Prussian Troops, which are to be fent to Berlin. They write from Genoa, That Sir John Leake, with her Catholick Majesty, and the Troops on Board, set Sail from Vado on the 16th Instant. A Convoy from Rotterdam fail'd Yesterday for the Thames. This Day the Envoy of Portugal left this Place, in order to meet the Queen of Portugal at Wesel; as will the Minister of his Imperial Majesty next Week. Two Battalons of the Regiment of Usel are march'd from hence towards Flanders, being reliev'd by two Swiss Companies which lay at the Brill

Oftend, July 28. N. S.
